## Dear APA Members and Guests,

It is my great pleasure to welcome you to this year's IPS: The Mental Health Services Conference, in New York City, October 8-11, 2015. Our profession and the many demands placed

upon us have led to a dilemma we all face in wanting to deliver the highest quality of behavioral healthcare while continuing to meet the overly rigorous demands of regulatory agencies and their requirements for documentation. This year's meeting theme reflects the predicament we face, "When Good Care Confronts Red Tape: Navigating the System for Our Patients and Our Practice."

For example, included again this year are the community psychiatry fellowship sessions that, in the past, have shown how education in dealing with public sector challenges decreases frustration with the complexities of the system and helps the practitioner to develop strategies to accomplish system wide changes. Also on the program this year are offerings in how to integrate behavioral with physical healthcare and how to

evaluate electronic medical records. And, responding to the feedback from last year's IPS attendees, the Scientific Program Committee has increased the total number of CME selections available this year.

You will also find that the 2015 IPS is an excellent one-stop resource for those attendees needing to meet maintenance of certification requirements with interesting and varied professional CME offerings. And, as always, you will have numerous opportunities to network with experts, colleagues, advocates, and people with lived experience of mental illnesses.

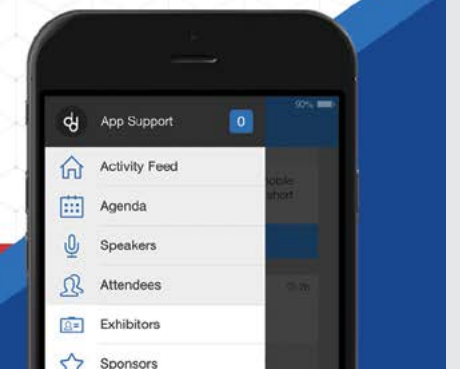
## Mission Statement

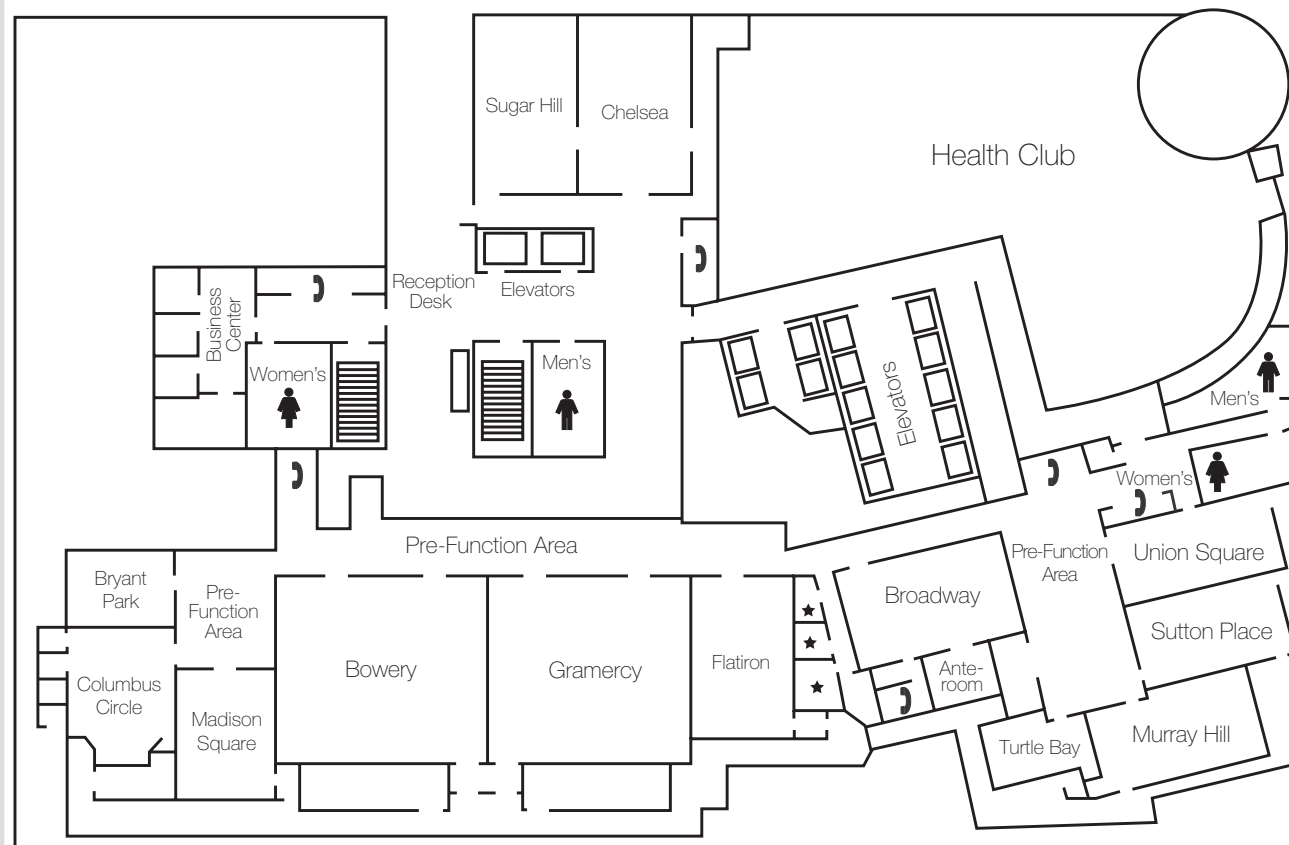

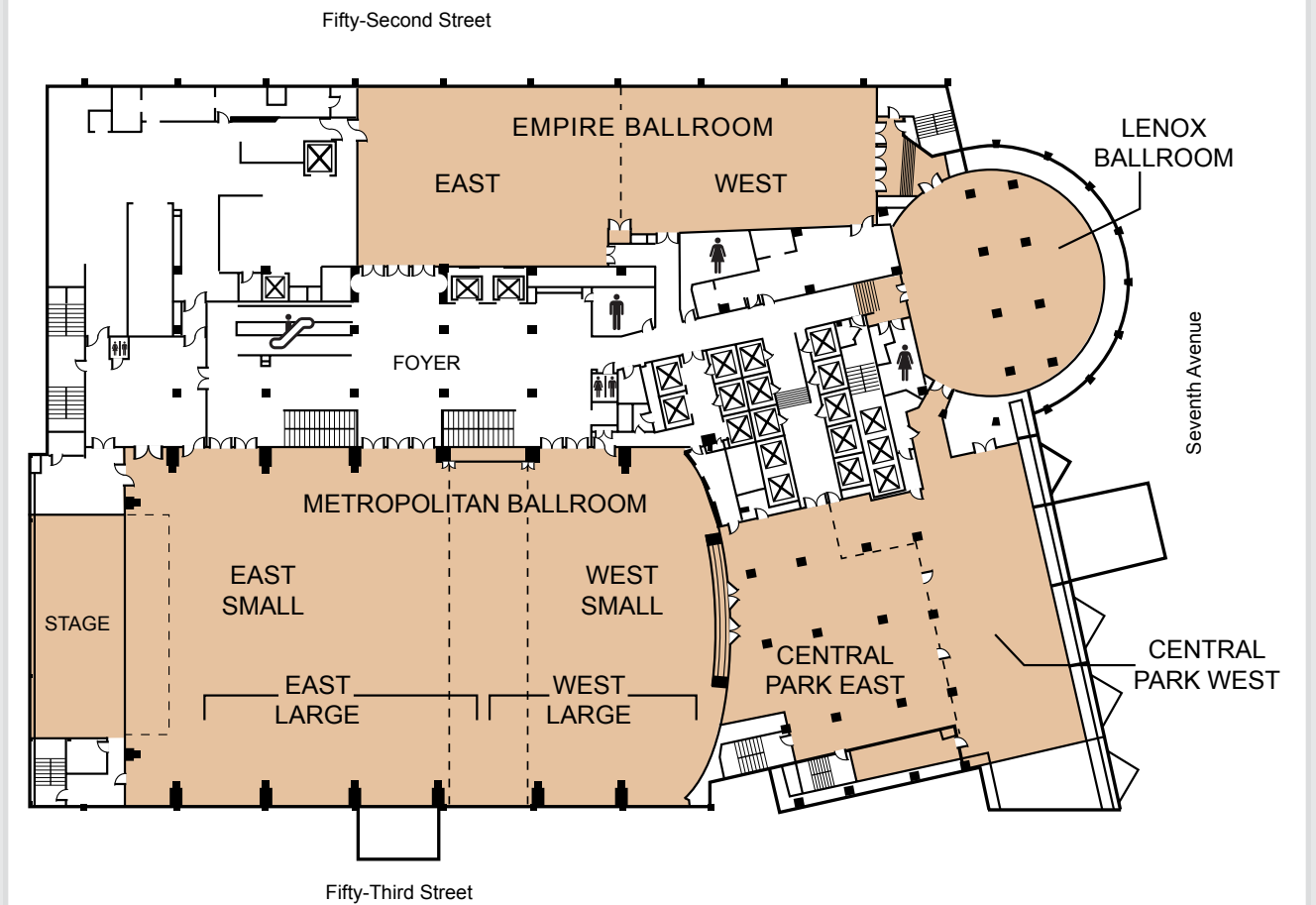
# Floor Plans



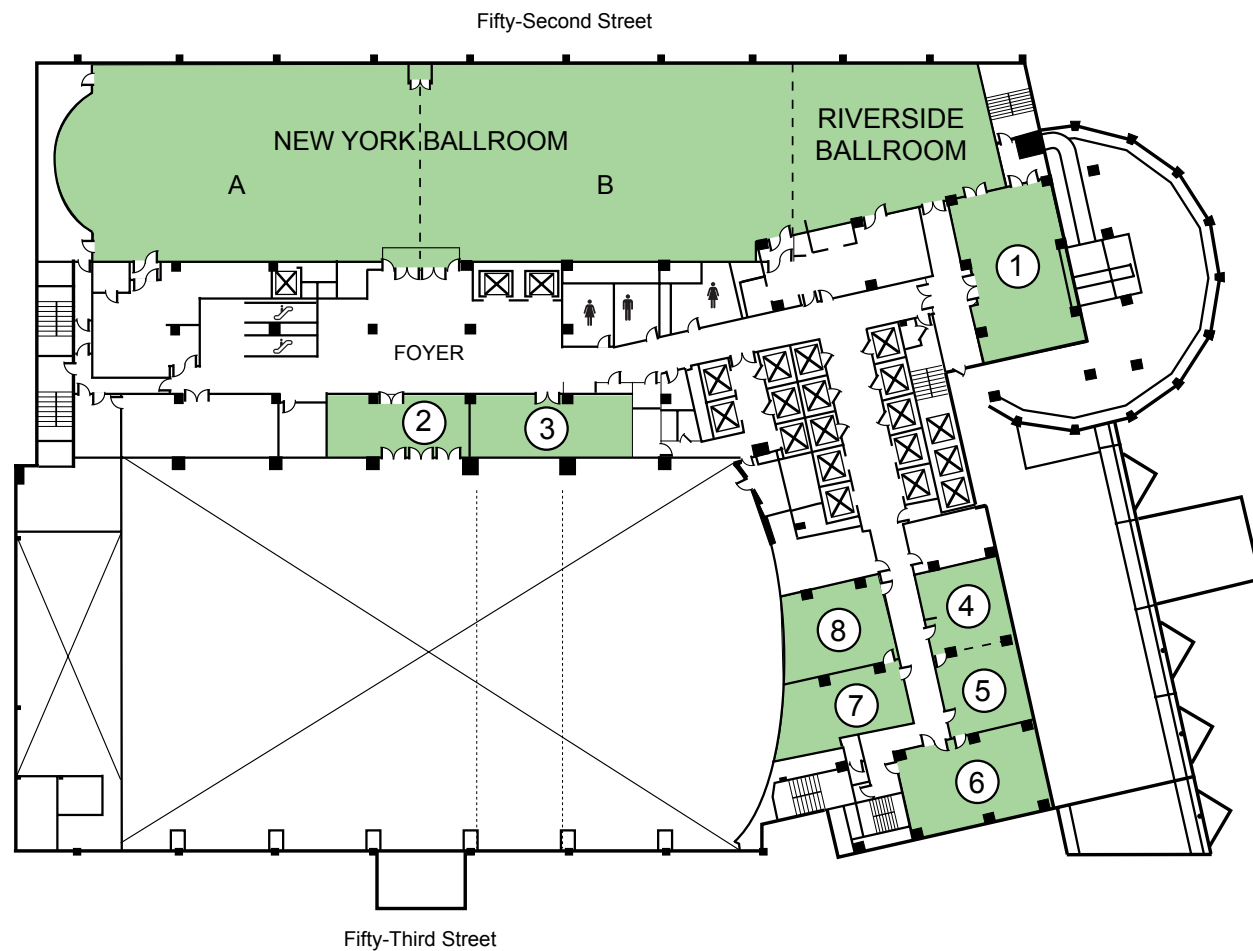

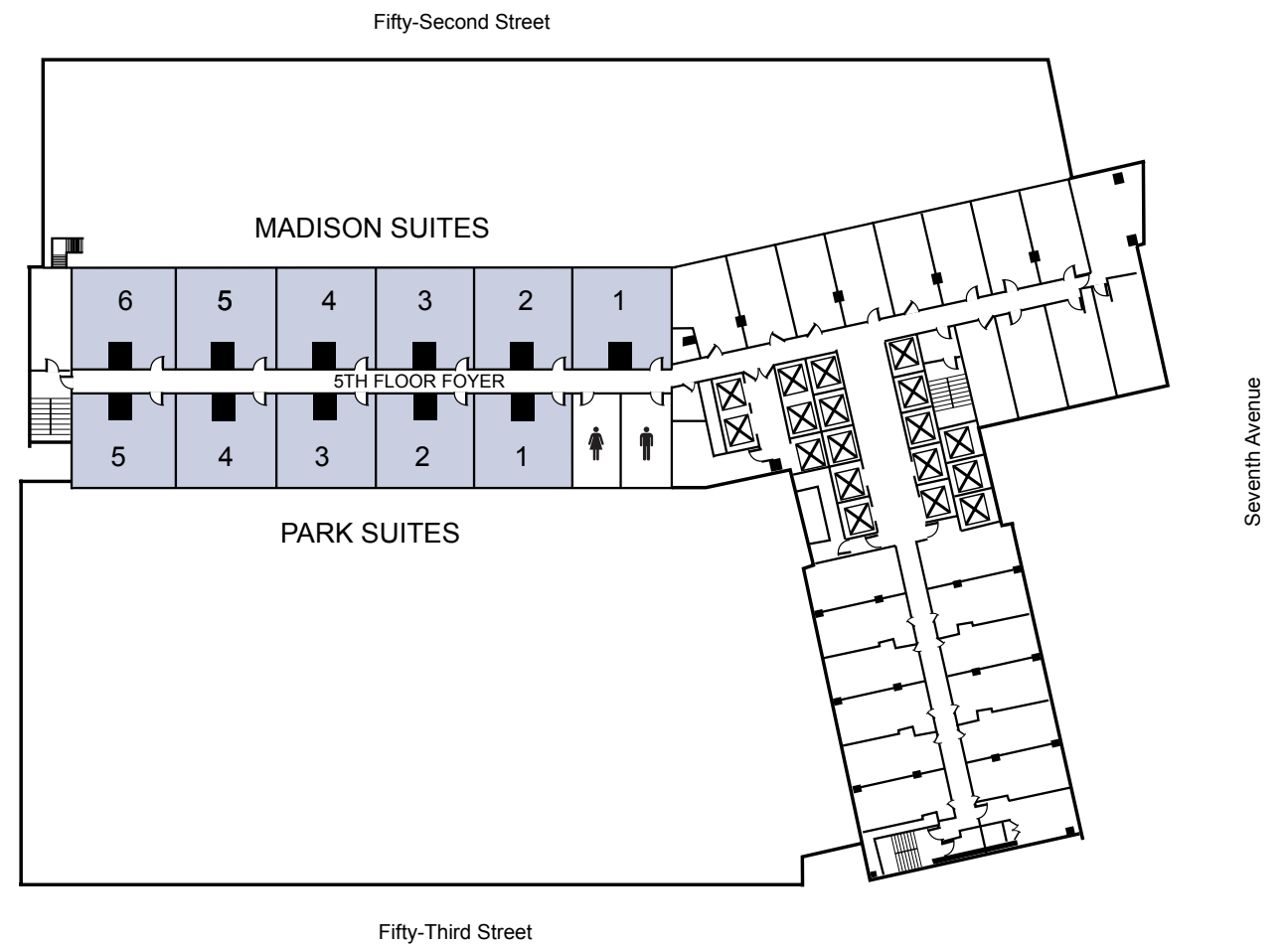

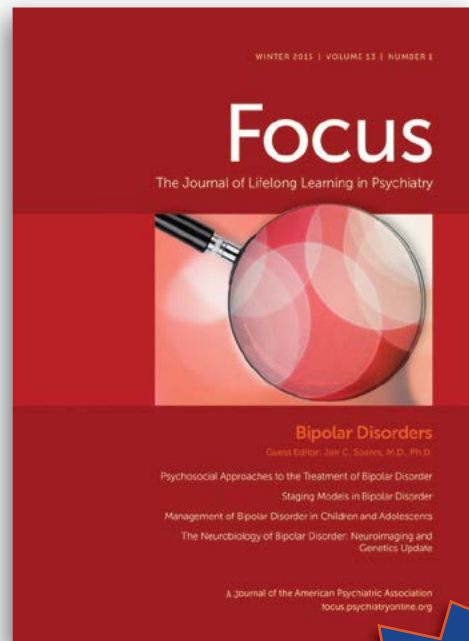

## Program Format Descriptions



### Courses

Courses are designed so that the attendee will be able to master new material in depth. Courses offer practical learning experiences that actively involve attendees and include the opportunity for informal exchange with the faculty. Offered in four—or eight—hour sessions, Courses either review basic concepts in a specialized subject area or offer advanced material on a circumscribed topic. Courses require an additional fee.

### Forums

This format provides attendees with an informal setting to share information, discuss concerns and develop possible solutions related to challenges faced in specific areas of mental health care.

### Innovative Programs

These presentations will describe creative, effective and provocative programs that work in their facilities. Each presenter is allotted 20 minutes to present a description of his/her work, followed by 10 minutes of audience discussion. This format is grouped, by topic, with one or two other proposals and presented at a 90-minute session.

### Lectures

This format features a small number of distinguished speakers who will make formal presentations on scientific and cultural topics, which extend our understanding beyond the usual limits. Lecturers are invited by the Scientific Program Committee.

### Posters

These informal presentations provide presenters the opportunity to post new results, research advances, new program features or model program information. Posters do not provide CME credit.

### Symposia

These three-hour or 90-minute sessions are thematically linked and focus on a specific topic relevant to clinical psychiatry or systems of care. They are designed to provide a more formal, didactic approach to the topic and present it from several points of view to stimulate discussion.

### Workshops

These sessions typically involve brief presentations from individual panel members, followed by the opportunity for lively and informative discussion. This format provides for substantial audience participation and should be highly interactive.

**Rebecca Weintraub Brendel, M.D., J.D.,** is the Director of the Master's Program at the Center for Bioethics. She bases her clinical work in psychiatry at Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH) where she is the Medical Director of the One Fund Center for Marathon bombing survivors and provides medical oversight for the hospital's inpatient guardianship team. Becca has served in multiple roles at MGH over the past decade including as a psychiatrist on the Law & Psychiatry and Consultation Psychiatry Services, as the Director of Law and Ethics at the Center for Law, Brain, and Behavior, as Clinical Director of the Red Sox Foundation/ MGH Home Base Program for post 9/11 service members and their families, and as Associate Director of the MGH-based Harvard Forensic Psychiatry Fellowship . Becca is an Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School.

Becca graduated from both University of Chicago Law School and Pritzker School of Medicine. She completed her psychiatry residency at MGH and McLean Hospital and a forensic psychiatry fellowship at MGH. From 2006 – 2007, Becca was the Edmond J. Safra Faculty Fellow in Ethics at Harvard University. Becca is also admitted to the Massachusetts Bar.



**Eric Plakun, M.D.,** is Associate Medical Director and Director of Admissions at the Austen Riggs Center, and former Harvard Medical School clinical faculty member. Editor of 2 books, including *Treatment Resistance and Patient Authority: The Austen Riggs Reader* (Norton, 2011), and author of fifty published papers and book chapters, he has presented over a hundred scientific papers. Dr. Plakun is a Distinguished Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, past chair of its Committee on Psychotherapy by Psychiatrists and its Bylaws Committee, and leads its Psychotherapy Caucus. He is a past member of the APA Assembly Executive Committee, and past chair of the Assembly Task Force on Psychotherapy by Psychiatrists. Dr. Plakun has been honored as the Outstanding Psychiatrist in Clinical Psychiatry by the Massachusetts Psychiatric Society. He is a leader in organized psychiatry and an advocate for the value of psychotherapy and other psychosocial treatments.



**Marvin Swartz, M.D.,** is Professor and Head of the Division of Social and Community Psychiatry, Director of Behavioral Health for the Duke University Health System and Director of the Duke AHEC Program. Dr. Swartz has been extensively involved in research and policy issues related to the organization and care of mentally ill individuals at the state and national level. He was a Network Member in the MacArthur Foundation Research Network on Mandated Community Treatment examining use of legal tools to promote adherence to mental health treatment and led the Duke team in conducting the first randomized trial of involuntary outpatient commitment in North Carolina and the legislatively mandated evaluation of Assisted Outpatient Treatment in New York. He co-led a North Carolina study examining the effectiveness of Psychiatric Advance Directives and the NIMH funded Clinical Antipsychotics Trials of Intervention Effectiveness study. He is currently a co-investigator of a study of the cost of criminal justice involvement of mentally ill individuals and a study of implementation of Psychiatric Advance Directives in usual care setting. He also serves as the Director of the National Resource Center on Psychiatric Advance Directives. Dr. Swartz was the recipient of the 2011 American Public Health Association's Carl Taube Award.

She works with individuals, couples, and families, from infancy through old age. She teaches life-span development courses, both locally and nationally. Areas of academic interest include development of innovative multimedia teaching methodology (particularly in psychiatry and life-span development); the use of narrative in teaching to promote empathic understanding, faculty academic advancement; improving child and adolescent psychiatry training in undergraduate medical education.



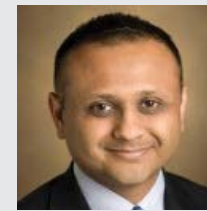
**Allan M. Josephson, M.D.,** received his M.D. degree from the University of Alberta in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada in 1976 and completed residencies in psychiatry and child and adolescent psychiatry at the University of Minnesota. Dr. Josephson subsequently held academic appointments at the University of Minnesota and the Medical College of Georgia, in addition to two years in the private practice of psychiatry. In 2003, Dr. Josephson assumed the position of Chief Executive Officer of the Bingham Clinic in Louisville, Kentucky where he currently is Professor and Chief, Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry of the University of Louisville School of Medicine. He is a Distinguished Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association.

Dr. Josephson has lectured widely throughout the country in major universities on how worldview, spirituality and religion intersect with psychiatry. His educational emphasis has been to make the consideration of religious and spiritual factors a fundamental aspect of the psychiatrist's work, both diagnostic and therapeutic. The "Handbook of Spirituality and World View in Clinical Practice" (APPI, 2004), which Dr. Josephson coedited, is now used in the curricula of many psychiatric residencies throughout the U.S. and Canada.



**James C. Harris, M.D.,** a professor in the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, received his medical degree in 1966 from George Washington University. He trained in pediatrics at the University of Southern California Children's Hospital and the University of Rochester before joining Johns Hopkins for his psychiatry residency and fellowship in child psychiatry, 1972-1974. The author of the textbook, *Development Neuropsychiatry*, Harris' research focuses on behavioral phenotypes in neurogenetic disorders and psychopharmacology in neurodevelopmental disorders. Today at Johns Hopkins, he directs the developmental neuropsychiatry clinic.

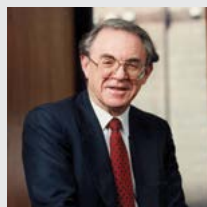

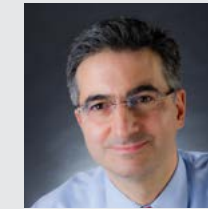

**Elizabeth Ford, M.D.** is currently a Clinical Associate Professor of Psychiatry at New York University School of Medicine and the Executive Director for Mental Health for Correctional Health Services for the New York City Department of Health. In that role, she is responsible for oversight of the mental health care of approximately 11,000 individuals incarcerated in the country’s second largest and perhaps most infamous jail, Rikers Island. She was formerly the Director of the Division of Forensic Psychiatry at Bellevue Hospital and the Program Director for the Forensic Psychiatry Fellowship at NYU. After spending much of her life overseas, she graduated from Yale University and completed her medical degree at the University of Virginia. She completed her internship and residency in psychiatry, as well as a fellowship in forensic psychiatry, at NYU, receiving multiple leadership and public psychiatry awards from various national organizations. She has spent years working on the jail inpatient psychiatry service at Bellevue and in the Bellevue psychiatric emergency room, specializing in the care of individuals with mental illness in the criminal justice system. Dr. Ford teaches extensively about topics related to the interface of mental health, law, and correctional settings.

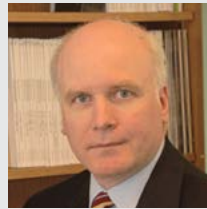


**Robert Klitzman, M.D.** is a Professor of Psychiatry and founder and Director of the Masters of Bioethics Program at Columbia University. He co-founded and for five years co-directed the Center for Bioethics, and directed the Ethics and Policy of the HIV Center for 10 years. He has published over 100 articles, and eight books, examining ethical, policy, and related issues concerning research, psychiatry, genomics, assisted reproductive technologies, HIV, physician-patient communication, and other areas. His books include *The Ethics Police?: The Struggle to Make Human Research Safe*, *Am I My Genes?: Confronting Fate and Family Secrets in the Age of Genetic Testing*, *When Doctors Become Patients*, *Being Positive: The Lives of Men and Women with HIV*, *Mortal Secrets: Truth and Lies in the Age of AIDS* (with Ronald Bayer), *A Year-long Night: Tales of a Medical Internship*, *In a House of Dreams and Glass: Becoming a Psychiatrist*, and *The Trembling Mountain: A Personal Account of Kuru, Cannibals and Mad Cow Disease*. He has received several awards for his work, including fellowships from the John Simon Guggenheim Foundation, the RobertWood Johnson Foundation, the Aaron Diamond Foundation, the Russell Sage Foundation, the Rockefeller Foundation, the Commonwealth Fund, The HastingsCenter and others.



**Christopher Racine, M.D. M.P.H.** is a board certified general psychiatrist. He attended medical school at the University of North Carolina where he graduated with honors. He then completed his General Psychiatry Residency at New York University where he was Chief Resident. He also completed a forensic psychiatry fellowship at New York University and is board-eligible in forensic psychiatry. He is currently employed as an emergency room psychiatrist for Carolinas Healthcare System in Charlotte, North Carolina. He has several past publications in the fields of psychiatry and forensic psychiatry. His research interests include mental health service delivery for the incarcerated population, ethical and legal issues in psychiatry, and stalking behaviors.

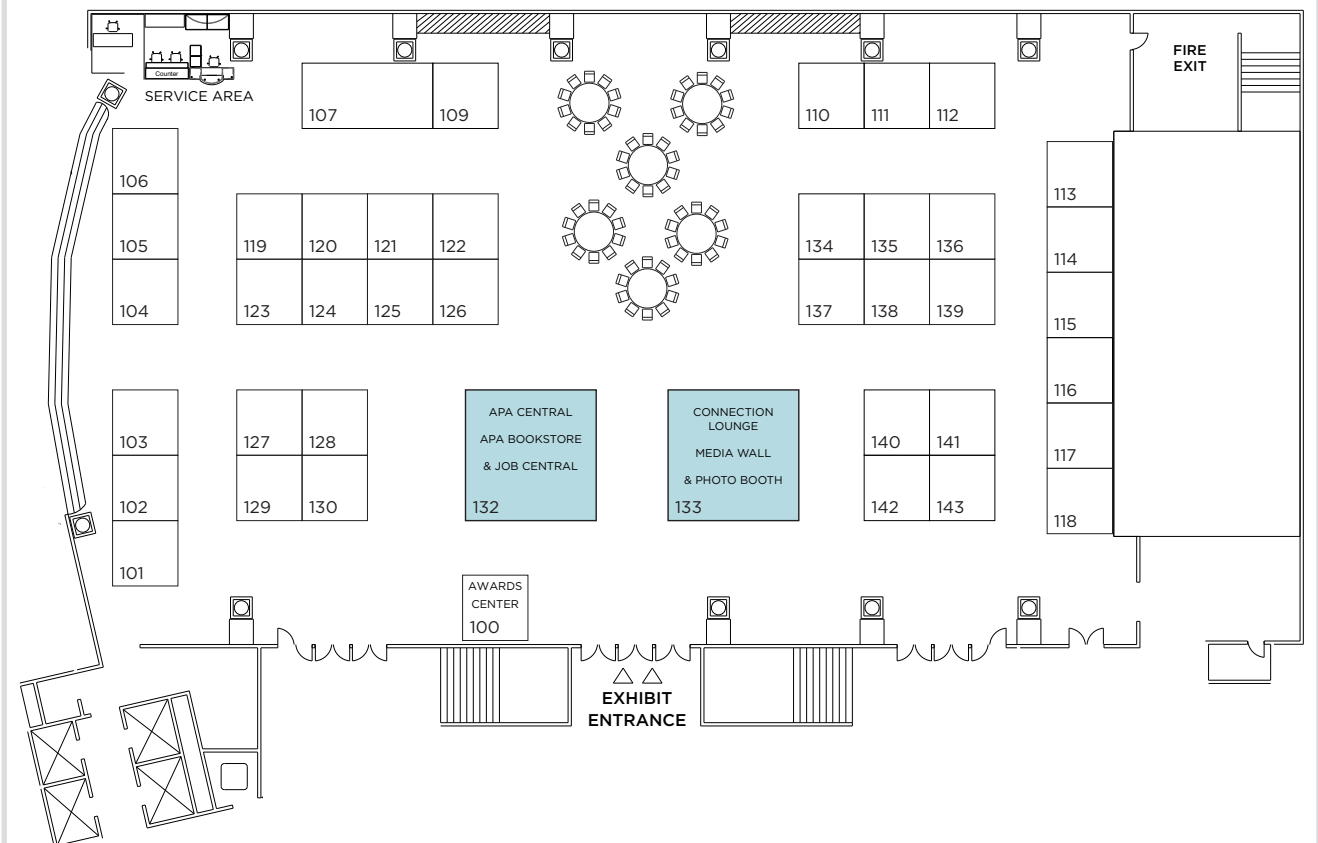

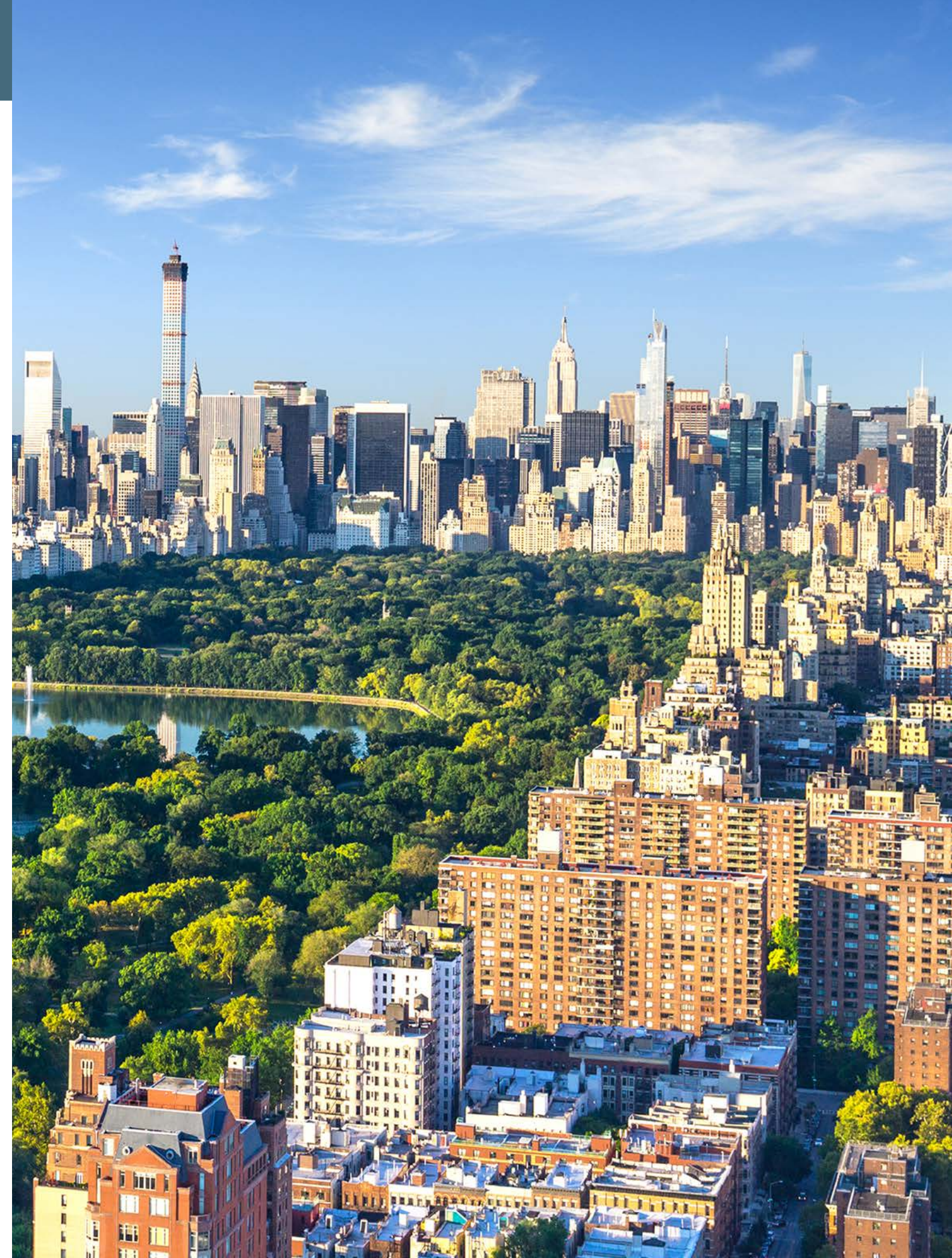
