## GENERAL INFORMATION

ADMISSION TO ALL SESSIONS BY BADGE ONLY

## REGISTRATION

All registration will take place at Brooks Hall during the following hours:

Saturday, May 3—1:00 p.m.-5:00 p.m.

Sunday, May 4—8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.

Monday, May 5 through Thursday, May 8—7:30 a.m.-5:00 p.m. Friday, May 9, 8:00 a.m.-10:00 a.m.

A registration fee of \$20/day or \$50/week is required from all members with the exception of members-in-training and provisional members who may pay a fee of \$25 and be registered for the entire week. This fee covers admission to the sessions and includes a badge, a copy of the official program, courtesy transportation and one (1) copy of the Syllabus.

A registration fee of \$25/day or \$100/week is required from all non-members. Non-member interns, residents, students in the mental health professions, mental health chaplains, military personnel on active duty and foreign visitors outside of the U.S. and Canada may pay a fee of \$25 and register for the entire week. Students must present a letter from their school or training facility instructor. This fee covers admission to the sessions and includes a badge, a copy of the official program and courtesy transportation on the APA shuttle system. Full week registrants will also receive one (1) copy of the Syllabus.

Full time registrants both member and non-members may register a spouse or guest (1) for \$15. There is no fee for children aged 12-17. Children under 12 may not register. FEES EXEMPT: CME COURSE FACULTY ONLY.

Badges are required for all sessions including the opening session and for the exhibit area. However, only a member badge will cover admission to the business session of the Association, which is open to voting members only.

## AMERICAN JOURNAL OF PSYCHIATRY

The office of the American Journal of Psychiatry will be Room 312. The office will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and on Friday until noon. (This represents a change.) Authors of papers that are in final form and ready for review are asked to bring three copies of the paper to the Journal office. It is the author's responsibility to submit the paper; officers of sessions will not collect papers for submission to AJP. Staff will be available to discuss any questions that authors may have.

The Journal has first refusal rights for all numbered papers. Permission must be secured from the Editor, John C. Nemiah, M.D., before a paper may be submitted elsewhere. The Journal will accept for review only papers that are in final form and conform to the requirements listed in "Information for Contributors." The Journal does not hold first refusal rights for new research papers and papers presented at morning and evening panels; however, authors may submit them for publication if they wish.

It is the policy of the *Journal* to publish only original material that has not been published elsewhere in any form and that is not being considered for publication elsewhere.

## TO PARTICIPATE IN THE 1981 ANNUAL MEETING

To present a scientific paper, request a symposium, course, issue workshop, evening panel, video, or film at the 1981 APA Annual Meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana, May 9-15, 1981, obtain a Form for Proposed Contributions in the publications display of the Membership Resource Center (Lower Level, Civic Auditorium). The 1981 theme is: Tomorrows Psychiatrists. This form will also be mailed to the entire membership in May.

The form contains complete instructions. However, PLEASE NOTE NOW that all proposals for the 1981 meeting must be in the Office of the Chairperson of the Scientific Program Committee by August 15, 1980. Otherwise they cannot and will not be processed for the Committee's consideration. Also, the full text and abstract must accompany the proposed paper submission.

## CME COURSE REGISTRATION

Course registration will take place in the Membership Resource Center, Civic Auditorium, Lower Level. Registration hours are as follows:

## CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT

The official annual meeting program, with a few exceptions, meets the criteria for continuing medical education Category I credit. One hour of credit may be claimed for each hour of participation. As an organization accredited by the Liaison Committee on Continuing Medical Education (LCCME) to provide continuing medical education, the American Psychiatric Association certifies that these continuing medical education offerings meet the criteria on an hour-for-hour basis of LCCME Category I CME credit, provided they are used and completed as designed. Continuing medical education sessions are open to all meeting registrants. Sessions that offer Category II are starred throughout the program book.

In addition to these sessions, the program offers courses which are also certified as meeting the criteria for LCCME Category I credit. These courses are divided into half-day, one-day, two-day, and one-and-one-half-day session. One hour of credit may be claimed for each hour of participation. Eight two-day premeeting courses have been arranged for Saturday-Sunday, May 3-4, and eight one-day courses for Sunday, May 4. Admission to courses is by ticket only, and a general registration badge must be presented in order to purchase or pick-up course tickets.

One of the criteria for Category I approval is that the program "explore with considerable depth one subject or closely related group of subjects." To claim credit, registrants should attend a session or course in its entirety.

Each member is responsible for maintaining a record of attendance and credits.

One copy of THE CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION SYLLABUS AND SCIENTIFIC PROCEEDINGS in summary form is distributed with each paid registration (except guests). Additional copies may be purchased in the registration area for \$15.00 each.

## TAPE RECORDING POLICY

Members and guests at the annual meeting and new reporters are welcome to carry their own small tape recorders to any program session they wish. Larger professional tape recorders, however, will not be admitted to any sessions other than those carried by personnel representing two professional taping firms, namely Audio-Digest Foundation of Los Angeles, California, and AV/MD, a division of Steven K. Herlitz, Inc., of New York City. APA has arranged with these firms to tape selected continuing education courses, panels, papers, and other presentations. Cassette recordings of these will be made available to all interested persons for continuing education purposes following the meeting. The badges of personnel representing these two firms will clearly identify them.




