

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# Welcome Letter from the President



## Dear APA Members and Guests,

Welcome to the American Psychiatric Association's 66th Institute on Psychiatric Services in San Francisco. The meeting is focused around the theme of *Integrating Science and Care in a New Era of Population Health*.

Psychiatry and mental health are in the midst of dramatic change, and with those changes come many opportunities to improve the way we provide care and patient outcomes. APA's 2014 Institute on Psychiatric Services will address many of the challenges and opportunities facing psychiatrists, social workers and others. In the wake of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), mental health care is already undergoing shifts in practice, including new ways of working with our primary care colleagues.

The IPS Scientific Program Committee, led by Hunter L. McQuiston, M.D., has prepared an outstanding program showcasing the latest in scientific research and emerging clinical topics in behavioral health. We are very pleased to have former U.S. Surgeon General David Satcher, M.D., Ph.D., a long-time advocate of improving access to quality health care by diverse and underserved populations, present the keynote address at the opening ceremonies.

Sessions are featured in six overlapping tracks (color-coded in the program guide): Clinical; Collaborative Care; Chemical Misuse; Leadership, Systems, & Advocacy; LGBTQ; and Professional Development. Additionally, the program features key focus areas: Addiction Psychiatry; Diversity; Integrated Care; and Health Services Research (searchable on the APA Meetings App). Reflecting the integrative nature of our work and our desire to create strong bridges

with allied professions, APA has teamed up with the National Association of Social Workers (NASW) to create a special series of sessions for social workers.

The Collaborative Care Track will address clinical and evolving health care policy issues particularly relating to the ACA, including a Presidential Symposium focusing on the current state of primary care and behavioral health integration. Another area of necessary integration concerns addictive disorders. In response to many requests by past IPS attendees, the Chemical Misuse Track will address such topics as the role of psychiatrists in tobacco cessation, medical marijuana, and on non-drug behavioral addictions, such as gambling.

On Saturday from 5:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. we will have the opportunity to hear, in a Conversations format, from Keris Jän Myrick, M.B.A., M.S., Ph.D.c., the new Director of the Office of Consumer Affairs at SAMHSA, as I join her in an open-ended discussion. Myrick has been a leading mental health advocate in her positions as President of NAMI and President and CEO of Project Return Peer Support Network. I am also looking forward to the opportunity for conversations with resident-fellow members and early career psychiatrists in a special session on Saturday, 3:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

As always, we are grateful for tremendous support of IPS from the American Association of Community Psychiatrists. AACP will host a reception for all meeting attendees on Friday evening.

## Opening Session and Awards Ceremony

Featuring opening remarks from APA CEO and Medical Director Saul Levin, M.D., M.P.A., APA President Paul Summergrad, M.D., and Keynote Speaker David Satcher, M.D., Ph.D., with the presentation of the Public Psychiatry Fellows, Psychiatric Services, and Frank J. Menolascino Awards.



Appointed by President Bill Clinton in 1998 as the 16th Surgeon General of the United States, Dr. David Satcher served simultaneously in the positions of Surgeon General and Assistant Secretary of Health at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

As such, he held the rare rank of full Admiral in the U.S. Public Health Corps, to reflect his dual offices. During his service as Surgeon General, Dr. Satcher tackled issues that had not previously been addressed at the national level, including mental health, sexual health, and obesity, as well as the disparities that exist in health and health care access and quality for minorities.

Dr. Satcher established The Satcher Health Leadership Institute (SHLI) at Morehouse School of Medicine in 2006 as a natural extension of his experience in improving public health policy for all Americans and his commitment to eliminating health disparities for minorities, poor people and other disadvantaged groups. As a champion of improved health care quality and expanded health care access for minorities, Dr. Satcher found himself drawn to Atlanta, Georgia and the Atlanta University Center (AUC), the largest association of historically Black colleges and universities in the world. In an environment with a rich history of nurturing minority leaders who engineered the Civil Rights Movement, Dr. Satcher finds both the inspiration and resources to carry out his ambitious ongoing mission.

Keris Myrick is the Director of the Office of Consumer Affairs at the Center for Mental Health Services, SAMHSA. The Office of Consumer Affairs supports the inclusion of Peer/Consumer perspectives and issues throughout the agency and supports such programs as the Voice Awards, SAMHSA Wellness Initiatives and Wellness Week, Bringing Recovery Supports to Scale Technical Assistance Center and the Recovery to Practice Project. She is a national mental health leader and nonprofit executive, known for her innovative and inclusive approach to mental health reform and the public disclosure of her personal story of lived experience with serious mental illness.

Most recently, she was President and CEO of Project Return Peer Support Network, a Los Angeles-based, peer-run nonprofit, which manages over 100 self-help groups in Los Angeles County, a peer-staffed Warm Line, a Spanish language community peer and family center and Peer Run Crises Respite Home. In addition, she is immediate past president of National Alliance on Mental Illness and an advisor to the American Psychiatric Association Division of Diversity & Health Equity and has provided assistance with the psychiatry component of the SAMHSA/CMHS Recovery to Practice project.





## Yerba Buena Ballroom | Lower B2 Level





## Golden Gate Ballroom | B2 Level








# Program Format Descriptions



## Courses

Courses are designed so that the attendee will be able to master new material in depth. The Courses offer practical learning experiences that actively involve attendees and include the opportunity for informal exchange with the faculty. Offered in four- or six-hour sessions, Courses either review basic concepts in a specialized subject area or offer advanced material on a circumscribed topic. Courses require an additional fee.

## Forums

This format provides attendees with an informal setting to share information, discuss concerns and develop possible solutions related to challenges faced in specific areas of mental health care.

## Innovative Programs

These presentations will describe creative, effective and provocative programs that work in their facilities. Each presenter is allotted 20 minutes to present a description of his/her work, followed by 10 minutes of audience discussion. This format is grouped, by topic, with one or two other proposals and presented at a 90-minute session.

## Lectures

This format features a small number of distinguished speakers who will make formal presentations on scientific and cultural topics, which extend our understanding beyond the usual limits. Lecturers are invited by the Scientific Program Committee.

## Posters

These informal presentations provide presenters the opportunity to post new results, research advances, new program features or model program information.

## Seminars

Seminars are designed so that the attendee will be able to master new material in depth. They offer practical learning experiences that actively involve attendees and include the opportunity for informal exchange with the faculty. Offered in half- or full-day sessions, Seminars either review basic concepts in a specialized subject area or offer advanced material on a circumscribed topic.

## Symposia

These three-hour or 90-minute sessions are thematically linked and focus on a specific topic relevant to clinical psychiatry or systems of care. They are designed to provide a more formal, didactic approach to the topic and present it from several points of view to stimulate discussion.

## Workshops

These sessions typically involve brief presentations from individual panel members, followed by the opportunity for lively and informative discussion. This format provides for substantial audience participation and should be highly interactive.

## LECTURER BIOS



**Jill M. Williams, M.D.**, is Professor of Psychiatry and Director of the Division of Addiction Psychiatry at the Rutgers University-Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick. She also holds faculty appointments at the Cancer Institute of New Jersey and is affiliated with the Rutgers Center for Alcohol Studies. She received her medical degree from UMDNJ-Robert Wood Johnson Medical School and completed her residency training at Duke University Medical Center. Dr. Williams also completed a fellowship in Addiction Psychiatry at Robert Wood Johnson Medical School.

The focus of Dr. Williams work has been in Addressing Tobacco in individuals with mental illness. The CHOICES Program (Consumers Helping Others Improve their Condition by Ending Smoking) she co-founded has won numerous awards for innovative programming. Dr Williams has developed training curricula for behavioral health professionals and manualized treatments for treating tobacco in mental health settings.

Dr. Williams has received research funding from sources including the National Institutes on Drug Abuse (NIDA), National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), and American Legacy Foundation. Her publications have appeared in numerous journals including *Nicotine and Tobacco Research*, *the Journal of the American Medical Association*, and *the Journal of Substance Abuse Treatment*.



**Jürgen Unützer, M.D., M.P.H.**, is an internationally recognized psychiatrist and health services researcher. His work focuses on innovative models of care that integrate mental health and general medical services and on translating research on evidence-based mental health care into effective clinical and public health practice. He has over 200 scientific publications and is the recipient of numerous federal and foundation grants and awards for his research to improve the health and mental health of populations through patient-centered integrated mental health services.

Dr. Unützer is Professor and Vice-Chair in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the University of Washington where he directs the Division of Integrated Care and Public Health. He also holds appointments as Adjunct Professor of Health Services at the UW School of Public Health and as Affiliate Investigator at the Group Health Research Institute in Seattle, WA.

Dr. Unützer directs the AIMS Center (<http://uwaims.org>) dedicated to 'Advancing Integrated Mental Health Solutions' and the IMPACT Program (<http://impact-uw.org>) which has supported the development, testing and implementation of an evidence-based program for depression treatment in more than 600 primary care practices in the United States and abroad. Dr. Unützer has served as Senior Scientific Advisor to the World Health Organization and as an advisor to the President's New Freedom Commission on Mental Health.



**Matthew State, M.D., Ph.D.**, received his undergraduate and medical degrees from Stanford University, completed his residency in psychiatry and fellowship in child psychiatry at the UCLA Neuropsychiatric Institute and then earned a Ph.D. in Genetics at Yale. He joined the Yale faculty in 2001 and remained there until 2013 where he was the Donald J. Cohen Professor of Child Psychiatry, Psychiatry and Genetics and the founder and co-director of the Yale Program on Neurogenetics. In 2013 he moved to UCSF where he is the Oberndorf Family Distinguished Professor and Chair of the Department of Psychiatry and the Director of the Langley Porter Psychiatric Institute and Hospital.

Dr. State's lab studies the genetics of childhood neuropsychiatric disorders, with a particular interest in the contribution of rare mutations to autism and Tourette disorder. He leads several international collaborations aimed at gene discovery in childhood disorders and has been the recipient of multiple awards, including recently, the Ruane Prize for Research in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry as well as induction into the Institute of Medicine of the National Academies.

## LECTURER BIOS



**Mardi Horowitz, M.D.** is Professor of Psychiatry at UCSF and President of the San Francisco Center for Psychoanalysis. He has advanced integrative psychotherapy theory in his book, *Cognitive Psychodynamics* and is author of the defining book on PTSD, *Stress Response Syndromes*. Dr. Horowitz has written 17 professional books and over 280 scientific articles in the fields of psychology, psychiatry, and psychoanalysis. His recent books include *Treatment of Stress Response Syndromes*, *Understanding Psychotherapy Change*, and for a popular audience, *A Course in Happiness*. Additionally, Dr. Horowitz has provided forensic, media and governmental consultations in the fields of PTSD, stress, personality, and psychotherapy.



**Laura Roberts, M.D.** serves as Chairman and Katharine Dexter McCormick and Stanley McCormick Memorial Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the Stanford University School of Medicine. The author/editor of 7 books and monographs and more than 225 articles in peer-reviewed journals and book chapters, Dr. Roberts is a nationally recognized scholar and leader in ethics, psychiatry, and medical education. Since 2003 she has served as the Editor-in-Chief of *Academic Psychiatry*, a journal focused on innovative education, mentorship, and leadership in academic psychiatry. Dr. Roberts has performed numerous empirical studies of contemporary ethics issues in medicine, science, and health policy, including research on informed consent, ethical considerations in genetic inquiry, health care and clinical investigation involving members of vulnerable populations, death and dying, professionalism education, and related topics.

LECTURER BIOS



**Kenneth S. Thompson, M.D.**, is a public service psychiatrist and Clinical Associate Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Pittsburgh. He focuses on improving public psychiatric services, primary care and public/population health with a particular emphasis on achieving health equity, and speaks on transforming psychiatric practice to incorporate a recovery oriented approach and integrating with primary care.

From 2007 to 2010 he served as the Medical Director of the Center for Mental Health Services in the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) in the US Department of Health and Human Services, where he provided expert psychiatric consultation to public policy formation and implementation. During this time he was the co-chair of the Federal Workgroup on Primary Care and Behavioral Health Integration.

From 2010 until 2013 Dr. Thompson was the Chief Medical Officer for Recovery Innovations, a multi-state and internationally known provider of peer and professional recovery oriented crisis and outpatient services.

Today, he is a co-founder and the Chief Medical Officer of the Pennsylvania Psychiatric Leadership Council and a leader in the American Association of Community Psychiatrists. Doctor Thompson has 30 years of experience providing psychiatric care in primary care settings. At present he is the consultant psychiatrist at the Squirrel Hill Health Center (an FQHC), the HIV treatment program at Allegheny General Hospital and the Center for Aviation Medicine. He is a Physician Advocate Fellow of the Columbia University Institute of Medicine as a Profession.



**David A. Pollack, M.D.**, is Professor for Public Policy in the departments of Psychiatry and Public Health, Family Medicine, and Preventive Medicine, and the Division of Management at Oregon Health and Science University (OHSU), Portland, Oregon. His activities include teaching, writing, and consulting on policy, systems, and medical leadership issues to various local, state, and national organizations.

Dr. Pollack has worked as a community and public psychiatrist in Oregon for over 39 years. He served as a staff psychiatrist, consultant psychiatrist, or medical director for several community mental health programs in the Portland area from 1976–98. In the fall of 1998, he worked in the Health Office of Senator Edward Kennedy as a Robert Wood Johnson Health Policy Fellow. He served as Addictions and Mental Health Medical Director for the Oregon Department of Human Services from 2002–06.

Since 1989, he has been an active member of various committees and planning initiatives related to Oregon's pioneering health reform efforts. His work on the Oregon Health Plan helped to shape how mental health services were integrated into the overall benefit package. Since 2007, he has been a key participant in efforts to expand health reform in Oregon. In particular, he has worked on the implementation of Patient-Centered Primary Care Homes, integration of behavioral health with primary care, and the development of a competent and sufficient workforce to meet the needs of a reformed health system.



**John Y. Donaldson, M.D.**

2014 Award Year Recipient

**Frank J. Menolascino Award for Psychiatric Services for Persons with Intellectual Developmental Disorders/ Developmental Disabilities**

While a medical student, Psychiatric House Officer, Child Fellow, and faculty member at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, during the late 1960s through the 1970s Dr. Donaldson worked closely with Dr. Menolascino. During that time, Dr. Menolascino developed outpatient care programs for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). Together they developed psychiatric treatment programs to meet the needs of patients who combined mental illness and IDD. Dr. Donaldson devoted much of his subsequent career in private practice to meeting the needs of those patients. In his semi-retirement he continues to consult to a rehabilitation program for young adults with acquired brain injuries, many of whom have psychiatric illnesses. He has been teacher, author, mentor, and caregiver, and his work has been invaluable not only to psychiatric patients with IDD but also to others who provide care to those individuals.

## LECTURER BIOS



**Pamela S. Hyde, J.D.**, was nominated by President Barack Obama and confirmed by the U.S. Senate in November 2009 as Administrator of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), a public health agency within the Department of Health and Human Services. The agency's mission is to reduce the impact of substance abuse and mental illness on America's communities.

Ms. Hyde is an attorney and comes to SAMHSA with more than 35 years experience in management and consulting for public healthcare and human services agencies. She has served as a state mental health director, state human services director, city housing and human services director, as well as CEO of a private non-profit managed behavioral healthcare firm. In 2003 she was appointed cabinet secretary of the New Mexico Human Services Department by Gov. Bill Richardson, where she worked effectively to provide greater access to quality health services for everyone.

Ms. Hyde is a member of or has served as a consultant to many national organizations, including the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation, the American College of Mental Health Administration, the President's New Freedom Commission on Mental Health and the United States Department of Justice. She has been recognized by many groups, including the American Medical Association, the National Governor's Association and the Seattle Management Association, for her creativity and leadership in policy and program development and in organizational management issues.



**Elinore F. McCance-Katz, M.D., Ph.D.**, is the Chief Medical Officer for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). She is board-certified in General Psychiatry and in Addiction Psychiatry and is a Distinguished Fellow of the American Academy of Addiction Psychiatry. Dr. McCance-Katz has been working in the field of addiction medicine for 23 years as a clinician, teacher, and clinical researcher. Her specialty areas include co-occurring mental/substance use disorders, pharmacotherapy for substance use disorders, clinical pharmacology of drugs of abuse, drug-drug interactions, and co-occurring HIV disease, Hepatitis C, and addiction.



**Howard H. Goldman, M.D., Ph.D.**, is Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Maryland School of Medicine. Dr. Goldman received joint M.D. - M.P.H. degrees from Harvard University in 1974 and a Ph.D. in social policy research from the Heller School at Brandeis University in 1978. He is the author or co-author of 300 publications in the professional literature. Dr. Goldman is the editor of *Psychiatric Services*, a mental health services research and policy journal published monthly by the American Psychiatric Association. He has been on the editorial boards of several other journals, including the *American Journal of Psychiatry* and the *Journal of Mental Health Policy and Economics*. Dr. Goldman directed the MacArthur Foundation Network on Mental Health Policy Research for a decade ending in 2009. He served as the Senior Scientific Editor of the *Surgeon General's Report on Mental Health* from 1997 to 1999, for which he was awarded the Surgeon General's Medallion. During 2002 and 2003 Dr. Goldman was a consultant to the President's New Freedom Commission on Mental Health. In 1996 he was elected to membership in the National Academy of Social Insurance, and in 2002 he was elected to the Institute of Medicine.

LECTURER BIOS



**Renée L. Binder, M.D., APA President-Elect**, is a psychiatrist who specializes in the evaluation and treatment of patients with schizophrenia, depression, bipolar affective disorder and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). She is the founder and director of UCSF's Psychiatry and Law Program. In 2003, Binder served as a Congressional Health Policy Fellow in the U.S. Senate. Her research focuses on violence and suicide risk assessment, and criminalization of the mentally ill.

Binder earned a medical degree from UCSF and completed an internship and residency in psychiatry at UCSF Mount Zion. She is the recipient of numerous awards, including the UCSF Royer Award for excellence in academic psychiatry and the American Academy of Psychiatry and the Law's Seymour Pollack Award for distinguished contributions to the field of forensic psychiatry.



**Tanya M. Luhmann, Ph.D.**, is the Watkins University Professor in the Stanford Anthropology Department. Her books include *Persuasions of the Witch's Craft* (Harvard 1989); *The Good Parsi* (Harvard 1996); *Of Two Minds* (Knopf 2000); and *When God Talks Back* (Knopf 2012). She trained at the University of Cambridge (Ph.D. 1986), and taught for many years at the University of California San Diego. Prior to coming to Stanford she was the Max Palevsky Professor and a director of the Clinical Ethnography project in the Department of Comparative Human Development at the University of Chicago. In general, her work focuses on the way that objects without material presence come to seem real to people, and the way that ideas about the mind affect mental experience. These days she is comparing the way people experience God (on the one hand) and auditory psychotic voices (on the other) in San Mateo, Accra and Chennai, and has ambitions of comparing odd experience around the world. She was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2003 and received a John Guggenheim Fellowship award in 2007. *When God Talks Back* was named a NYT Notable Book of the Year and a Kirkus Reviews Best Book of the Year. It tied for first place as Religion Newswriters Award for Best Book of the year, won the Division 36 of APA (Psychology of Religion and Spirituality) Bier Award, and was awarded the 2014 Grawemeyer Award for the best book in religion, from the University of Louisville and the Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary.



**David A. Lewis, M.D.**, is the UPMC Endowed Professor in Translational Neuroscience and Chairman, Department of Psychiatry, University of Pittsburgh. He also serves as Director of an NIMH Conte Center for the Translational Mental Health Research, which is focused on understanding the role of cortical circuit dysfunction in the pathophysiology of schizophrenia. He received his medical degree from the Ohio State University, completed residencies in internal medicine and in psychiatry at the University of Iowa, and received his research training at the Research Institute of the Scripps Clinic. Dr. Lewis has published over 400 scientific articles. He has received NIMH Senior Scientist and MERIT Awards and the Lieber Prize for Schizophrenia Research from NARSAD, and is a member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences.

## LECTURER BIOS



**Garen J. Wintemute, M.D., M.P.H.,** is the inaugural Baker-Teret Chair in Violence Prevention at the University of California, Davis and director of that institution's Violence Prevention Research Program. He practices and teaches emergency medicine at UC Davis Medical Center, Sacramento and is professor of emergency medicine at the UC Davis School of Medicine. His research focuses on the nature and prevention of violence, particularly firearm violence, and on the development and evaluation of violence prevention measures and policies. **Dee Mosbacher, M.D., Ph.D.,** is a psychiatrist and a documentary filmmaker in San Francisco. Her film, *Straight From the Heart*, about religious parents coming to terms with the homosexuality of their children, was nominated for an Academy Award in 1995. Another of Dr. Mosbacher's films, *Radical Harmonies: The Story of the Women's Music Cultural Movement*, was voted best documentary at the San Francisco International Lesbian and Gay Film Festival in 2002. In 2012, Woman Vision, a nonprofit organization founded by Dr. Mosbacher to promote equal treatment of all people through the production and use of educational media, including video, launched *The Last Closet* — a web-based campaign and video project to end homophobia in men's professional sports. Dr. Mosbacher graduated from Pitzer College in Claremont, Calif., received a doctorate in social psychology from Union Graduate School and received a medical degree from Baylor College of Medicine.



**Lisa B. Dixon, M.D., M.P.H.,** is Professor of Psychiatry at the Columbia College of Physicians and Surgeons, Columbia University and directs the Center for Practice Innovations (CPI) at the New York State Psychiatric Institute. As CPI director, she oversees key activities for New York State's Office of Mental Health in implementing evidence based practices for persons diagnosed with serious mental illness.

She is currently the Principal Investigator of the NIMH-funded Recovery After Initial Schizophrenia Episode Implementation and Evaluation Study (RAISE-IES) and New York State's OnTrackNY program designed to develop and implement early intervention services for individuals experiencing nonaffective psychosis across the state.

Dr. Dixon is an established health services researcher with continuous funding from NIMH, VA, and foundations since 1992. Her grants have focused on improving the quality of care for individuals with serious mental disorders with a particular emphasis on services that include families, reducing the negative impact of co-occurring addictions and medical problems, and improving treatment engagement and adherence.

Dr. Dixon's work has joined individuals engaged in self-help, outpatient psychiatric care, as well as clinicians and policy makers in collaborative research endeavors. She practices psychiatry at a local community mental health center and has been a Vice Chair of the University of Maryland IRB for nine years.

**Joseph J. Parks, M.D.**, serves as the Director of MO HealthNet, Missouri's Medicaid authority, holds the position of Distinguished Research Professor of Science at the University of Missouri – St. Louis, and is a Clinical Assistant Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Missouri, Department of Psychiatry in Columbia. He practices psychiatry on an outpatient basis at Family Health Center, a federally funded community health center established to expand services to uninsured and underinsured patients in central Missouri.

He has served as Medical Director of the Missouri Department of Mental Health, President of the Medical Director's Council of the National Association of State Mental Health Program Director, Director of the Missouri Institute of Mental Health at University of Missouri St Louis, and as Division Director for the Division of Comprehensive Psychiatric Services of Missouri Department of Mental Health.

Dr. Parks has authored or coauthored a number of articles, technical papers, and reviews on Behavioral Health services delivery and policy. He is the recipient of several Leadership awards from the University of MO – Columbia, Department of Psychiatry; Missouri Hospital Association; Missouri Primary Care Association and Missouri Chapter of Mental Health America. He has also received Innovation and Quality Improvement awards from American Psychiatric Association; URAC; SAMHSA Science and Service Award; Missouri Governor's Award for Quality and Productivity; and the Missouri Governor's Pinnacle Award for Quality and Productivity.



**Stephen Ross, M.D.**, is an Associate Professor of Psychiatry and Child & Adolescent Psychiatry at the New York University (NYU) School of Medicine and an Associate Professor of Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology, Radiology and Medicine at the NYU College of Dentistry. He directs the Division of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse and the Opioid Overdose Prevention Program at Bellevue Hospital Center in New York City. He is former Clinical Director of the NYU Langone Center of Excellence on Addiction, and currently is the Director of Addiction Psychiatry at NYU Tisch Hospital, and the Director of the NYU Addiction Fellowship. Five years ago, working with a group of NYU and Bellevue child psychiatrists, Dr Ross established an addiction screening and treatment program at Bellevue Hospital for adolescents treated within the Child & Adolescent Department at NYU/Bellevue, the first time such a program for addicted adolescents had been established at Bellevue.

Dr. Ross has received over a dozen teaching awards related to education of medical students, psychiatry residents, and addiction fellows, locally at NYU and nationally.

His research interests revolve around exploring novel diagnostic and treatment approaches to addictive disorders. His other addiction research interests include approaches to treating addicted adolescents and interventions that have a more broad-based public health impact. He directs an NIH-funded Addictive Disorders Laboratory at Bellevue Hospital Center.



**Nick Kates, M.B.B.S.**, is Professor and Chair of the Department of Psychiatry & Behavioural Neurosciences at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada with a cross appointment in the Department of Family Medicine and a quality improvement advisor with the Hamilton Family Health Team. He is also a senior advisor to Health Quality Ontario and for 5 years he was the Ontario Lead for quality improvement in primary care. For 12 years he was director of the Hamilton HSO (now FHT) mental health program that integrates mental health services into the offices of 150 family physicians in Hamilton. He has consulted extensively on redesigning health systems of care and improving the quality of care and is the author of over 70 articles and 2 books. He is a distinguished fellow of both the American Psychiatric Association and the Canadian Psychiatric Association, and an honorary member of the Canadian College of Family Physicians.

## LECTURER BIOS



**William B. Lawson, M.D., Ph.D.,** is currently Professor and Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry at Howard University College of Medicine. Dr. Lawson was the Chair of the Section of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences of the National Medical Association and is a past president of the Black Psychiatrists of America. He has authored over 85 publications concerning severe mental illness and its relationship to psychopharmacology, substance abuse, and racial and ethnic issues. He has a long-standing concern about ethnic disparities in mental health treatment and has been an outspoken advocate for access to services for the severely mentally ill. Dr. Lawson received his doctorate in psychology from the University of New Hampshire, his medical degree from the University of Chicago and completed his residency at Stanford University Medical Center. Additionally, he completed a fellowship in clinical psychopharmacology at the National Institute of Mental Health intramural program. Dr. Lawson is certified by the Board of Psychiatry and Neurology in psychiatry with added qualifications in addictions and is currently directing a \$6.5 million contract with the National Institute of Mental Health intramural program to research mood and anxiety disorders in African Americans and other ethnic minorities.



**Altha J. Stewart, M.D.,** is a psychiatric consultant, healthcare administrator, and nationally recognized expert in public sector and minority issues in mental health care. She currently serves as Executive Director for *Just Care Family Network*, Memphis' federally funded System of Care program for children with serious emotional disorders and their families.

Prior to this she served as Executive Director of the SAMHSA/CMHS funded National Leadership Council on African-American Behavioral Health (NLC). From 1999 to 2002, Dr. Stewart served as Executive Director of Detroit-Wayne County Community Mental Health Agency, one of the largest public mental health systems in the US, with a budget of over \$500 million. She worked for over a decade as CEO and Executive Director in large public mental health systems in Pennsylvania and New York, overseeing the management and development of programs for persons with mental illness and substance use disorders.

An invited participant at the historic 1999 *White House Conference on Mental Health*, Dr. Stewart is a frequent guest on news and public affairs programs discussing mental illness and psychiatric treatment, she has been a featured guest on radio and television discussing mental illness in the African-American community. Dr. Stewart is past president of the American Psychiatric Foundation, the Association of Women Psychiatrists and the Black Psychiatrists of America.



**Philip D. Harvey, Ph.D.,** is Leonard M. Miller Professor of Psychiatry and director of the Division of Psychology at the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine, as well as Senior Health Scientist at the Research service of the Bruce W. Carter VA Medical Center, Miami, FL. He was formerly professor of Psychiatry at Emory University School of Medicine and Mt. Sinai School of Medicine and Chief Psychologist at Mt. Sinai Hospital, as well as Health Scientist at the Bronx and Atlanta VA Medical Centers. He received his Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from SUNY at Stony Brook in 1982. He is the author of over 900 scientific papers and abstracts and has written over 60 book chapters. He is a widely cited author whose work has been cited more than 1800 times per year for the past five years, with over 2800 citations of his work in 2013 alone. Dr. Harvey's research has focused on cognition and functioning and he has written extensively on aging in schizophrenia, functional impairments in severe mental illness, the cognitive effects of typical and atypical antipsychotics, as well as the effects of cognitive enhancing agents in various conditions, including schizophrenia, dementia, affective disorders, and traumatic brain injury. He directs an annual conference on cognition that is an official satellite of the International Congress on Schizophrenia Research and the Schizophrenia International Research Society.

**Terry A. Kupers, M.D., M.S.P.**, is Institute Professor at The Wright Institute and Distinguished Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association. He practices psychiatry in Oakland, California, and provides expert testimony as well as consultation and staff training regarding the psychological effects of prison conditions including isolated confinement in supermaximum security units, the quality of correctional mental health care, and the effects of sexual abuse in correctional settings. He has served as consultant to the U.S. Department of Justice, Civil Rights Division, as well as to Human Rights Watch and Amnesty International. Publications include *Prison Madness: The Mental Health Crisis Behind Bars and What We Must Do About It* (1999) and *Public Therapy: The Practice of Psychotherapy in the Public Mental Health Clinic* (1981). He is co-editor of *Prison Masculinities* (2002). He is a Contributing Editor of *Correctional Mental Health Report*. He received the Exemplary Psychiatrist award from the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) at the APA meeting in 2005, and the William Rossiter Award from the Forensic Mental Health Association of California in 2009.



**Charles R. Marmar, M.D.**, is the Lucius N. Littauer Professor, and Chair of the Department of Psychiatry, New York University Langone Medical Center (NYULMC). Prior to working at NYULMC, Dr. Marmar was Professor and Vice Chair of the Department of Psychiatry at UCSF, and Associate Chief of Staff for Mental Health and Director of the PTSD Research Program at the San Francisco VA Medical Center. A national expert and an award winning teacher and researcher in the study of trauma and PTSD for the past 25 years, Dr. Marmar has received funding from both federal and private institutions to conduct studies in psychopharmacology, psychopathology, psychobiology, quality of care, psychotherapy treatment and phenomenology of PTSD. He is a former President of the International Society for Traumatic Stress Studies and the 1999 recipient of the J. Elliot Royer Award for the Outstanding Bay Area Psychiatrist. He heads the Posttraumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) Research Program at the NYU Langone Medical Center.

### Petros Levounis, M.A., M.D.,

is Chair of the Department of Psychiatry at Rutgers New Jersey Medical School and Chief of Service at University Hospital in Newark, New Jersey. Prior to Rutgers, Dr. Levounis was on the faculty of New York University and Columbia University, where he served as Director of the Addiction Institute of New York and Chief of Addiction Psychiatry at St. Luke's and Roosevelt Hospitals from 2002 to 2013. Dr. Levounis is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Stanford University where he studied Chemistry and Biophysics as a combined BS/MS student, before receiving his medical education at Stanford University School of Medicine and the Medical College of Pennsylvania. During medical school, he researched "The effects of social class on patient-physician relationships" in Oxford, England, and received an MA degree in Sociology from Stanford. He graduated from the Columbia University residency training program earning the National Institute of Mental Health Outstanding Resident Award and went on to complete his fellowship in Addiction Psychiatry at New York University. Dr. Levounis is currently working on "The Behavioral Addictions," an innovative book that includes re-enactment video clips played by Rutgers NJMS medical students.



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
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


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
