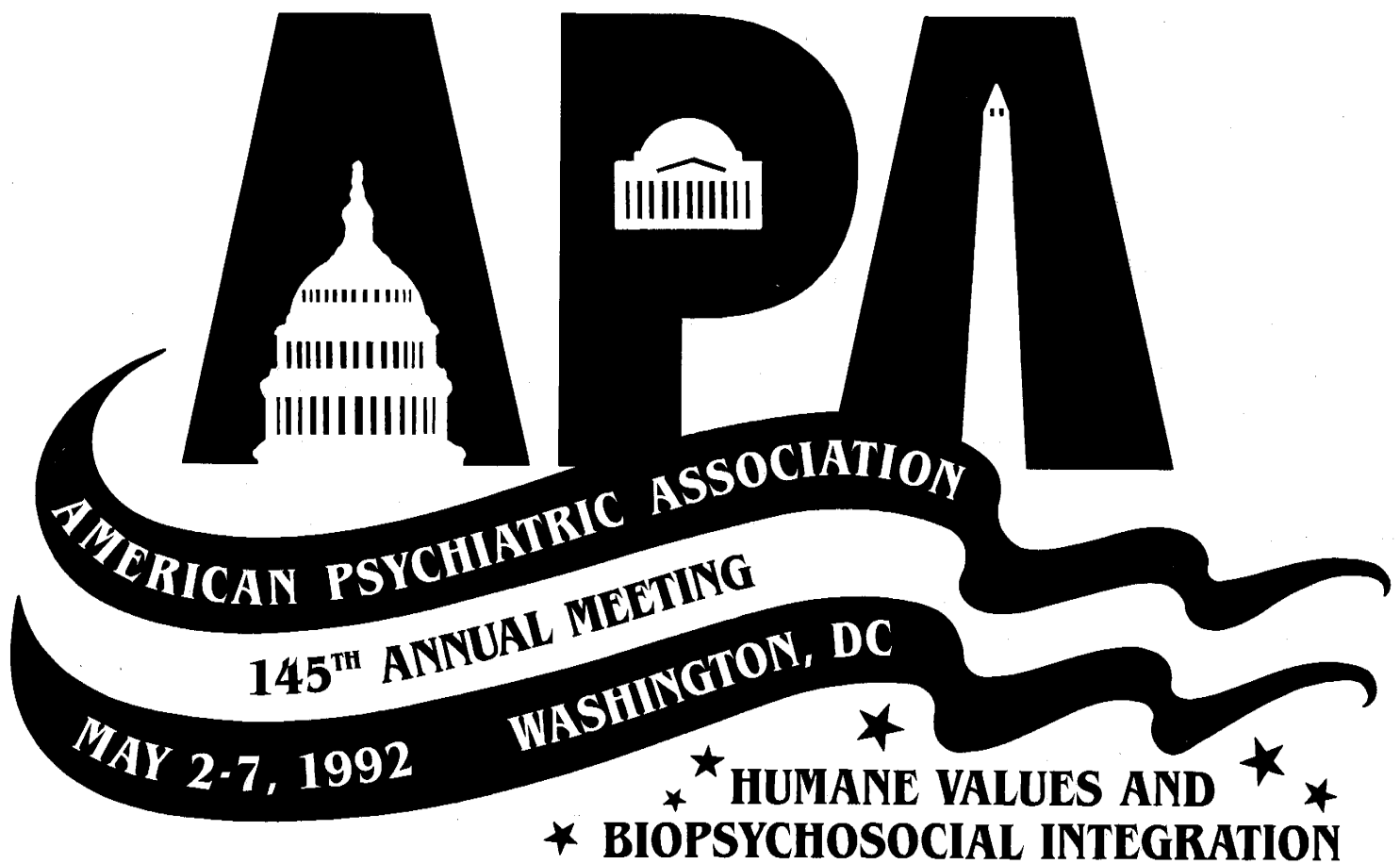

Dear Colleagues and Guests:

I am happy to welcome you to the 145th Annual Meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. The theme of this meeting is "Humane Values and Biopsychosocial Integration."

I think the theme is timely and quintessential to psychiatry. I hope it can encourage diversity but also hold onto and stimulate an important central core of professional identity. It celebrates the good psychiatric clinician; and it can serve as an organizing theme for diagnosing and treating patients, for teaching, for research, for prevention and for public policy in our field.

You may notice that this year's Annual Meeting, in its enormous diversity and energy, contains a good many sessions directly or indirectly related to the overall theme, e.g., a Presidential Symposium on psychiatry and human rights, chaired by Dr. Loren Roth; a Presidential Symposium on children, chaired by Dr. John Schowalter; and a symposium on the economic possibility of biopsychosocial care, chaired by Dr. Steven Sharfstein.

Helping plan this meeting has been stimulating and enjoyable. It is a huge task. I wonder how many of us simply take for granted our Annual Meeting, which is really the world's major psychiatric meeting, quite unusually rich in scientific and social content, and thanks to APA staff and many members' skilled effort, unusually well run.

There are lots of hardheaded practical reasons to go to the Annual Meeting, but I also have a great respect for the pleasure principle. I hope and expect that all of you who have come to this meeting in Washington, will find things to learn but also things to enjoy.

The 1992 Annual Meeting has been planned with children, families and companions in mind, and Washington in spring is both naturally beautiful and culturally and politically rich. Please study the scientific program but also the leisure time program. In addition to a unique array of practical, historic, and esthetic museums and sites, and a wide array of theaters, restaurants and concerts, Washington has a peculiar and picturesque local industry called government, a bit insular but with many of its own sites of interest, and many of its own people, who might do well to see and hear from a few, or more than a few, psychiatric constituents.

I am proud of the Annual Meeting staff, and of the Scientific Program Committee and the Local Arrangements Committee. The meeting is a marvellous conclusion to a complex and exciting year for the APA.

I hope this Annual Meeting helps us to do our work, and helps us to enjoy our lives.

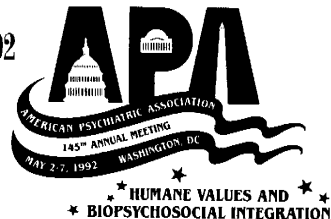

Dear APA Members and Guests:

Welcome to Washington, DC and the 145th Annual Meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. Our nation's capitol, with its vibrancy, diversity and excitement provides a fitting setting for the presentations we have planned for you this year. As you read through the *Program Book*, you will notice we have a number of sessions related to the theme, "Humane Values and Biopsychosocial Integration," chosen by our President, Dr. Lawrence Hartmann, for this year's Annual Meeting. The Advances in Research Session, entitled "Research Advances in Psychiatry: An Update for the Clinician," will be held on Monday morning from 10:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. This session highlights the latest research findings in psychiatry and summarizes their relevance to clinical practice. This has become an excellent way to start off the Annual Meeting's research programs, in conjunction with the Young Investigators' Poster Session, on Monday morning. In addition, you will find an expanded number of small group sessions, which include the Discussion Groups and Clinical and Research Consultations With.

This year, our Round Table Discussion, entitled "Psychiatry and Society: Practice Guidelines," will be held on Tuesday from 9:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. I know that you will not want to miss what has become an exciting tradition at our Annual Meetings. You will also note in the *Program Book* that we are expanding our noon Forums this year, after last year's successful reinstitution. This format allows us to schedule sessions which may not fit in the usual formats or which may focus on late-breaking topics of importance to the field.

I strongly encourage you to fill out and return the evaluation forms for this meeting. The members of the Scientific Program Committee are interested in the opinions of the members regarding the quality and content of the Annual Meeting, and use the information provided to plan for next year's program. I would also be happy to hear from you individually and would welcome your suggestions.

Once again, welcome to Washington. I look forward to sharing a week of exciting and professionally rewarding activities with you.

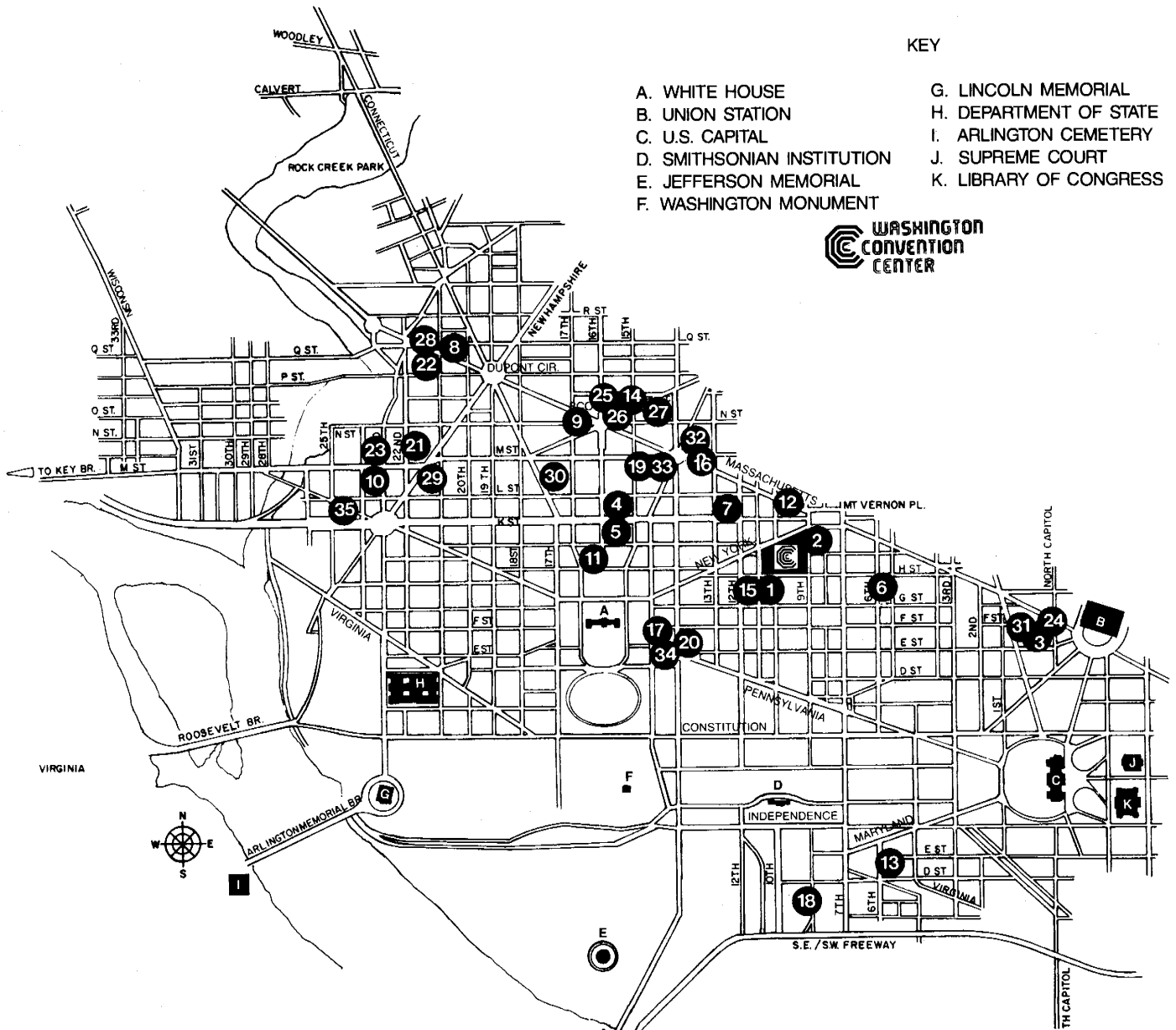

A psychiatrist's testimony in capital cases can mean the difference between life and death. In 1972, the Supreme Court overturned several capital murder convictions on procedural grounds. Many states subsequently established procedures whereby a guilty verdict in a capital murder trial precipitates a second trial to determine the defendant's sentence. The jury at the second trial must be informed about any mitigating factors affecting whether the death penalty is appropriate. Psychological damage is a potential mitigating factor. James C. Beck, M.D., will present three capital murder cases whose outcomes were influenced by psychiatric evaluations. These and other cases suggest that decisions in capital cases depend in part on the race of both the defendant and the victim, and that capital sentencing is unjust to African Americans. Dr. Beck also cites the social value of white psychiatrists defending African Americans in such cases. Dr. Beck is Director of the Cambridge Court Clinic, Chief of Forensic Psychiatry at Cambridge Hospital, and Associate Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School. He is also a member of the faculty at Harvard Law School and consultant to the Special Litigation Section of the U.S. Department of Justice. Dr. Beck is a member of the American Psychiatric Association's Commission on Judicial Action, the American Bar Association's Commission on Mental and Physical Disability Law, and the Committee on Physician/Therapist Misconduct of the Massachusetts House of Representatives. He is a past president of the New England Chapter of the American Academy of Psychiatry and the Law. Dr. Beck was educated at Harvard and Yale universities and received his medical training at Harvard Medical School.

The narration in this videotape reveals that in rural China, boy babies are called by a word meaning "big business;" for girl babies, the word is "small happiness." That is explained by the fact that for centuries, girls and women were misvalued in China because they represented a poor investment: after years spent raising them, they leave home to work for another family. A boy, on the other hand, grows up to work and produce for his parents, bringing in an extra pair of hands (a wife) to help support them in their old age. The consequences of viewing daughters as a liability and daughters-in-law as mere servants was that Chinese women suffered centuries of abuse and exploitation. In interviews, the young women of Long Bow, China discuss the "liberation" they now enjoy under China's communist regime. For all its oppressive qualities, they testify to the radical improvements the Communist Party has brought to them (not that life is idyllic even now). The young and old women of the Long Bow farming village provide an interesting

profile of their lot in China today: they tell of increased liberty to choose a marriage partner; discuss birth control and the persistence of social pressures to have at least one son; debate the merits of the government campaign to restrict population growth; complain of lazy children and rude husbands; and recount horror stories from the past when women were little more than beasts of burden, hobbled socially by cruel mothers-in-law and physically by foot-binding. They debate whether their new freedom to work in field and factory represents a real or an illusory improvement in their social condition.

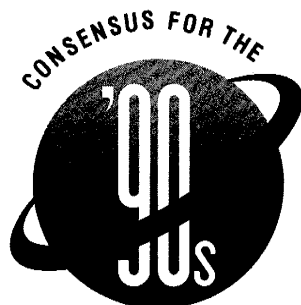

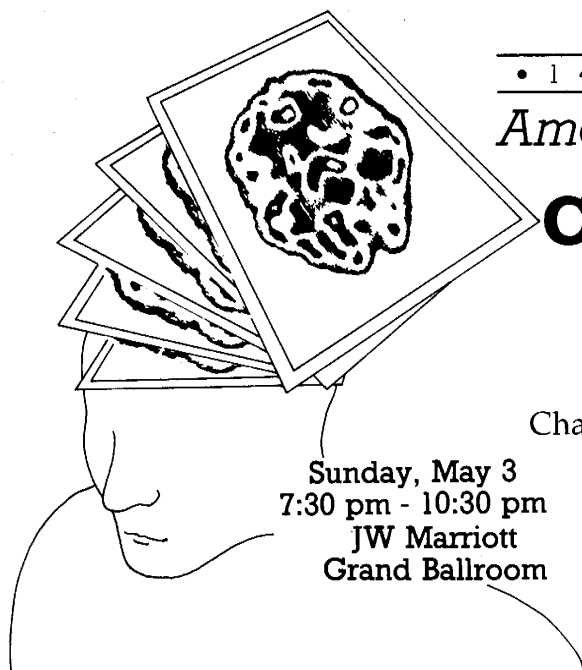

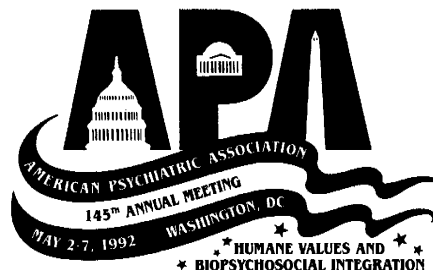

Freud's shift to the fantasy theory of neurogenesis defined the investigation of intrapsychic life as the fundamental theoretical purview of the psychoanalytic position. The designation of inner experience as a data base for scientific exploration constitutes a central epistemological innovation that profoundly alters the way we view what is real. Evelyne Albrecht Schwaber, M.D., will use clinical examples to illustrate some of the continuing challenges and far-reaching implications of this shift to "psychical reality" as the core of psychoanalytic theory. Dr. Schwaber is a Training and Supervisory Analyst at the Psychoanalytic Institute of New England, East. She is the editor of the book, *The Transference in Psychotherapy: Clinical Management*, and the author of numerous publications on aspects of clinical listening and psychic reality. Her article, "Reconstruction and Perceptual Experience: Further Thoughts on Psychoanalytic Listening," received the 1985 Journal Prize of the American Psychoanalytic Association for the outstanding paper of the year. Dr. Schwaber is a consulting editor to *Psychoanalytic Inquiry* and contributing editor to *Journal of Clinical Psychoanalysis and Proceedings of*

*the New York Psychoanalytic Institute*. She formerly sat on the editorial board of *Journal of Dynamic Psychotherapy*. A graduate of Radcliffe College, Dr. Schwaber received her medical training at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine in the Bronx, New York. She was a fellow in child psychiatry at Putnam Children's Center, Boston City Hospital, and the Thom Clinic for Children. She received her psychoanalytic training at the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute.

From the USSR to the Independent States: Where the Former Soviet Psychiatry Will Go

The Soviet Union is a country of the past. Power has shifted from the central government to the former republics. However, these independent states have also inherited the serious problems of the Soviet Union, problems that threaten their democratic development and independence. Faltering production, financial problems and the lack of food and fuel can cause social conflicts that might lead to establishment of new authoritarian regimes. Psychiatry in the former Soviet Union reflected the problems of the society as a whole. In her lecture, Svetlana Polubinskaya, Ph.D., will discuss how the future of psychiatry in the new independent states depends on their ability to solve economic problems and to nurture respect for human rights. Economic and legal reforms may improve the practice of psychiatry; on the other hand, psychiatrists in new totalitarian regimes might perpetuate old ways. Dr. Polubinskaya is Senior Research Scholar in the Department of Criminal Law and Criminology of the Institute of State and Law of the Russian Academy of Sciences in Moscow. In recent years she has been active on various commissions engaged in drafting improved Soviet laws and statutes concerning psychiatry and criminal law, and since the fall of the Soviet Union, she has assisted in drafting similar Russian laws, including laws on protecting the rights of psychiatric patients and treating alcoholics and drug abusers. In May 1991 she participated in a seminar in Moscow for members of local human rights committees, and in the past year she has travelled to the Ukraine several times to teach courses in mental health law and policy for psychiatrists. She has written many articles and book chapters. Her book, *Purposes of Criminal Punishment*, was published in Moscow in 1990. Dr. Polubinskaya received her legal training at the All-Union Juridical Institute in Moscow and her Ph.D. in criminal law from the Institute of State and Law of the Academy of Sciences of the then USSR.

M. Scott Peck, M.D., author of the best-selling book *The Road Less Traveled*, and nationally recognized authority on the relationship between religion and science, examines the roots of American psychiatry's neglect of the spiritual aspects of human behavior. As American psychiatry broadens its scientific and humanistic bases, neglect of patients' spirituality has had unfortunate consequences. These include misdiagnosis and improper treatment, alienation of patients and loss of clientele, and, for psychiatrists who seek to fully understand the human condition, a striking ignorance of spiritual dynamics and development in both themselves and in others. Dr. Peck will offer a system of relatively simple remedies for the predicament, although whether American psychiatry can overcome its traditional resistance to the spiritual remains a question. In addition to *The Road Less Traveled*, which has been translated into more than 20 languages, Dr. Peck's non-fiction works include *People of the Lie: The Hope for Healing Human Evil*, *What Return Can I Make? Dimensions of the Christian Experience*, and *The Different Drum: Community Making and Peace*. He is also the author of the novel, *A Bed by the Window*. Currently a management consultant to organizations in the public, private and non-profit sectors, Dr. Peck is writing a book on organizational behavior, to be published later this year. In 1984 he established the Foundation for Community Encouragement, a nonprofit educational organization whose mission is to promote and teach principles of community. The Foundation conducts about 60 workshops a year for the general public and for churches, businesses and other organizations. Dr. Peck received the 1984 Kaleidoscope Award for Peacemaking given by Creative Ministry Associates of Durham, North Carolina. Dr. Peck is a graduate of Harvard College and received his medical degree from Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine.

Raquel E. Cohen, M.D., has more than 20 years of experience studying and treating the mental health problems of natural disaster victims. To highlight the evolution of clinical concepts in the field of post-disaster mental health care, she will describe the interventions after the 1970 Nicaraguan earthquake, the 1978 Boston blizzard and the 1985 volcano eruption in Armero, Colombia. Patterns of mourning, stressor/stress reactions, psychic trauma and post-traumatic syndromes in disaster victims are now well documented and accepted. Survival defenses and patterns of coping and adaptation have been identified. Clinical findings support the effectiveness of treatment strategies such as crisis intervention and debriefing. Dr. Cohen will describe current research challenges in the field and developments including organizational models for public and private agencies to provide outreach to populations affected by disasters. Dr. Cohen is Professor of Psychiatry and Adjunct Professor of Pediatrics at the University of Miami School of Medicine. She is also Director of the Children's Center of the Office of the State's Attorney in the 11th Judicial Circuit of Florida. A frequent visiting trainer and consultant in mental health services for disaster victims, Dr. Cohen has provided her expertise to numerous institutions in Central and South America, as well as to the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the National Institute of Mental Health in the United States. She has co-authored the *Handbook for Mental Health Care of Disaster Victims*, written 50 articles and book chapters, and co-edited an annotated bibliography on disasters and mental health and another book on adolescent refugees. In 1976 she received the Seymour D. Westermarck Award from the American Psychiatric Association for her contributions to the education of psychiatrists. Dr. Cohen has served as chairperson of the American Psychiatric Association's Task Force on the Mental Health of Spanish-Speaking Populations, chairperson of the APA Mental Health Council, and APA representative to the Inter-American Council of Psychiatric Associations. Dr. Cohen was educated at San Marcos University in Lima, Peru, and at Harvard Medical School and Harvard School of Public Health. She was a psychiatric resident at Metropolitan State Hospital in Wal-

tham, Massachusetts, and a resident in child psychiatry at Massachusetts Mental Health Center in Boston.

### The Dopamine Receptor Super-Family and Its Implications for Psychiatry

The field of dopamine biology has expanded rapidly in the past three years, as have the implications of this research for the psychoses and the many brain disorders linked to dopamine. Stanley J. Watson, M.D., presents recent findings on the structure, pharmacology and distribution of dopamine receptors, with emphasis on their role in the motor and affective systems. Cloning of the genes and messenger RNA that code for the two main types of dopamine receptors,  $D_1$  and  $D_2$ , has spurred the recent advances. During the past year, three other types of dopamine receptors— $D_3$ ,  $D_4$ , and  $D_5$ —have been discovered and cloned. These receptors are fairly rare, but understanding how they work may hold great promise for the pharmacotherapy of motor and psychotic disorders. The five dopamine receptors can be thought of as falling into two broad classes, the  $D_1$  and  $D_2$  family and the  $D_3$ ,  $D_4$ , and  $D_5$  family. The two families have different genetic and pharmacological relationships.  $D_3$ , found in several structures including the cortex, is unusual in excluding motor systems and in its apparent preference for clozapine, a novel antipsychotic with limited effect on motor behavior. The different dopamine receptors, their structures, pharmacology and distribution, will be presented with an emphasis on motor and affective systems. Dr. Watson is Associate Director of the Mental Health Research Institute and Professor and Research Scientist in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. His contributions to the understanding of the biology of schizophrenia and other serious mental illnesses have been recognized with numerous awards, including the McAlpin Award of the National Mental Health Association. He is the author of more than 150 articles and book chapters and a member of the editorial boards of several publications, among them *Neuroendocrinology*, *Journal of Chemical Neuroanatomy*, and *Experimental Neurology*. A Fellow of the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology, Dr. Watson is currently Chair of the Program Committee of the Society for Neuroscience. Dr. Watson received his doctorate in clinical psychology from the University of Iowa in Iowa City and his medical degree from Tulane Medical School in New Orleans. He completed his psychiatric Internship and residency at Stanford University School of Medicine.

William Styron

Depression and the Creative Process

In late 1985 William Styron, Pulitzer Prize-winning author of *The Confessions of Nat Turner*, was gripped by profound depression and considered suicide. He sought treatment, including admission to a psychiatric hospital, and eventually recovered. Mr. Styron's personal account of his illness, *Darkness Visible*, was published in 1990. Mr. Styron will draw on passages from his prose fiction to show how latent depression, unrecognized consciously, has contributed to his creative process and the texture of his fiction throughout his writing career. He will stress how depression manifested itself as suicidal fantasy and then actual self-destruction in several major characters in his works. In addition to the 1968 Pulitzer Prize, Mr. Styron received the Howells Medal of the American Academy of Arts and Letters in 1970 for *The Confessions of Nat Turner* and the American Book Award in 1980 for *Sophie's Choice*. He received the American Academy of Arts and Letters Prix de Rome in 1952 for his novel *Lie Down in Darkness*. He is also the author of the novels *Set This House on Fire* and *The Long March*, as well as a collection of essays entitled *This Quiet Dust and Other Writings*. A member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, he has been decorated Commandeur, Légion d'Honneur of France. Mr. Styron served in the United States Marine Corps during World War II and the Korean conflict. He was educated at Duke University and studied writing at the New School for Social Research in New York City.

Profile self-confrontation is a powerful projective audio-visual process that enhances and clarifies the repressed residual of psychological trauma. The patient is seated in front of the television monitor with the therapist behind and to the side. Two cameras focused on either side of the patient's face send signals through a special effects generator, producing a picture of two profiles facing each other on a split screen. The therapist facilitates a dialogue between one or both profile images as traumatic memories are retrieved, projected and worked through as part of an ongoing psychotherapeutic process. Techniques derived from psychodrama, notably role reversal and doubling, are introduced to enable healthier aspects of the patient's ego to support other parts previously split off as sequelae of the original trauma. In an intensive outpatient group therapy setting, this technique is used to encourage awareness of inner processes as the patient identifies split off parts of herself, begins to understand their function and historical precedents, and attempts to integrate these parts into an intact core "self."

One of the most brilliant, controversial cinematic talents of this century was lost with the untimely death of Pier Paolo Pasolini. He was, by turns, a Marxist cultural critic; linguist; poet; novelist; screenwriter and, in his final years, a director of international reputation. To his masterpiece, *The Gospel According to Saint Matthew*, Pasolini brought the fullest strength of his art, compassion and protest over social injustice. Mr. Pasolini renounced his original Holy Land setting in favor of the rugged barrens of southern Italy, in aid of capturing the stark simplicity he deemed essential to his purposes. He employed a cast of amateurs. His Christ was Enrique Irazoqui, a young Spanish student, with a haunting face that could have inspired El Greco. The screenplay uses only the language and events recorded in the St. Matthew Gospel, to amazingly intense effect. Utterly stripping away the Hollywood epic's paralyzing spectacle, Pa-

solini presents an angrily radicalized Savior, compelling attention to his message as if uttered for the first time.

Medical students and physicians with HIV disease are a concern to all of us who treat physicians, and although their numbers are small, the challenge is great. Most, but by no means all, are gay or bisexual men whose illnesses have struck early in life when their professional lives are just beginning. As health care professionals treating physicians with HIV disease, we have a dual responsibility, to appreciate the complex biopsychosocial dimensions of this horrible disease, and to as-

sume an advocacy role with deans of medical schools, directors of residency training programs, licensing bodies, hospital boards, and the general public. *Anders als die Anderen (Different from the Others)*, made in 1919 by Richard Oswald, is considered the first explicit movie dealing openly with discrimination towards gay men. Magnus Hirschfeld, M.D., (1868-1935) was an advisor to the movie, and even appears at the end as himself and delivers a speech pleading tolerance for homosexuals, as well as condemning Paragraph 175 of the German Penal Code which outlawed homosexuality. An openly gay psychiatrist, Dr. Hirschfeld founded the first organization for gay people in 1897 called the Scientific-Humanitarian Committee. He also started the Institute for Sexual Science, as well as the *Journal for Sexual Science*, to which Freud submitted articles. Conrad Veidt stars as a gay German Jew, later famous for his roles in *The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari* and as a Nazi officer in *Casablanca*. Veidt plays a violinist who is blackmailed and eventually jailed because of his homosexuality. The movie was banned from public viewing a year after it was released due to violence and Right-Wing protesters. The Nazis were thought to have destroyed all the copies of the movie; however, in 1980 a fragmented copy was found in the Moscow film archives with subtitles in Ukrainian.

#### Human Genetics and the Human Genome Project: Scientific and Social Implications

Eric S. Lander, D.Phil., is a geneticist and mathematician with research interests in human, murine, and population genetics, and computational and mathematical models in biology. He has developed methods for the genetic analysis of complex inherited traits and has worked on the construction of genomic maps in connection with the Human Genome Project. Currently a member of the Whitehead Institute for Biomedical Research, Dr. Lander is Associate Professor of Biology at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Director of the MIT Center for Genome Research. He is Chairman of the National Institutes of Health National Center for Human Genome Research Study Section, and serves on the National Research Council Committee on DNA Technology in Forensic Science, and the Advisory Committee to the Division of Biological and Behavioral Sciences of the National Science Foundation. The author of *Symmetric Designs: An Algebraic Approach*, and several articles in mathematics and biology, Dr. Lander is a member of the editorial boards of *Genomics*, *Genetic Epidemiology*, *Human Molecular Genetics*, and other journals in the genetics field. A former Rhodes Scholar, he received the MacArthur Foundation Prize Fellowship in 1987 for his work in human genetics and was elected a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 1990 in recognition of research on the application of mathematical and statistical approaches to molecular genetics. Dr. Lander graduated from Princeton and earned his doctorate in mathematics from Oxford University.

#### Research Fields and Strategies in Developmental Psychopathology

The relatively new field of developmental psychopathology integrates knowledge about developmental stages and other age-related phenomena into the study of psychiatric disorders of childhood and adolescence. Helmut Remschmidt, M.D., discusses the use of integrative models of developmental psychopathology to generate new hypotheses about the complex process of individual development within the context of the family and other components of the external system. Among the important issues being addressed from this perspective are continuity and change in behavior, sex differences and individual differences, risk for and protection from psychopathology, and the nature of the developmental process itself. The integrative character of the work in this field requires close collaboration of researchers from different disciplines. Dr. Remschmidt is Managing Director of the Center of Neurology and Psychiatry and Director of the Department of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at the Philipps-University in Marburg, Germany. Currently Chair of the Section on Child and Adolescent Psychiatry of the World Psychiatric Association, Dr. Remschmidt also holds leadership positions in numerous local and national organizations in Germany that are concerned with child and adolescent mental health and psychiatric education. A member of the Scientific Council of the German Medical Association, he is an advisor to the German Research Association and a member of the German government's Commission for the Prevention of Violence. He has been a member of the German Academy of Natural Sciences Leopoldina in Halle since 1991. Co-founder of the journal *Zeitschrift für Kinder- und Jugendpsychiatrie*, Dr. Remschmidt is editor of the series *Klinische Psychologie und Psychopathologie*, which currently comprises 56 volumes. He is co-editor of several journals, including *Journal of Child Psychology and Child Psychiatry* and *European Child and Adolescent Psychiatry*. A former president of the German Association for Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, Dr. Remschmidt is founder of the Association's Scientific Information Service. Dr. Remschmidt was educated at the University of Erlangen in Nurnberg and the University of Tübingen.

## Masochism: Psychopathology and Clinical Observations

Otto F. Kernberg, M.D., presents an overview of masochistic psychopathology, including masochism as a sexual perversion, a personality disorder, a particular type of love relation, and a broad spectrum of self-destructive behavior. He examines biological, psychodynamic and cultural determinants of this psychopathology and the influence of ideological currents on diagnostic and therapeutic approaches. One therapeutic problem common to the treatment of all masochistic conditions is the patient's unconscious tendency to structure the treatment in such a way that the psychopathology is likely to persist. Exploring the technical implications of such developments in the transference and countertransference, Dr. Kernberg suggests that it is necessary very early in treatment to prevent, interpret and control the enactment of long-range masochistic scenarios in the transference. Dr. Kernberg is Associate Chairman and Medical Director of the New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center, Westchester Division, and Professor of Psychiatry at Cornell University Medical College in New York City. He is also Training and Supervisory Analyst at the Columbia University Center for Psychoanalytic Training and Research in New York City. He is the author of more than 100 articles and six books, including *Borderline Conditions and Pathological Narcissism*, *Internal World and External Reality: Object Relations Theory Applied*, and *Severe Personality Disorders: Psychotherapeutic Strategies*. He is associate editor of the *Journal of the American Psychoanalytic Association*, consulting editor for the *Journal of Psychotherapy Practice and Research* and a member of the editorial boards of *The Psychodynamic Letter* and *Adolescence*. Dr. Kernberg's contributions to psychoanalysis have been recognized with several awards, including the 1990 Sigmund Freud Award of the American Society of Psychoanalytic Physicians and the 1990 Mary S. Sigourney Award for Distinguished Contributions to Psychoanalysis. A Fellow of the American College of Psychoanalysts and the American College of Physicians, Dr. Kernberg is President of the Association for Psychoanalytic Medicine and a Vice-President of the International Psychoanalytic Association. Dr. Kernberg received his medical degree from the University of Chile in Santiago and his psychoanalytic training at the Psychoanalytic Institute of the Chilean Psychoanalytic Society.

Senator Edward M. Kennedy was first elected to the United States Senate in November 1962 to fill the unexpired term of John F. Kennedy and has been reelected to consecutive six-year terms since 1964. Public service is his life. He is



the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources and has a leading role in the shaping of our nation's domestic and social agenda on a variety of health, labor and education programs. He is a creative and successful legislator and, also, has a key role in Subcommittees of the Judiciary Committee, the Armed Services Committee and the Joint Economic Committee. He is also Chairman of the Senate's Technology Assessment Board and a Member of the Biomedical Ethics Board. Senator Kennedy is the author of four books, including *Our Day and Generation* and *In Critical Condition: The Crisis in America's Health Care*. He is President and Trustee of the Joseph P. Kennedy Jr. Foundation and a member of the Board of Overseers of the Children's Hospital Medical

Center in Boston. He has received numerous awards, including the Public Service Award of the Foundation of American Scientists for his leadership on nuclear arms control, and the Hubert H. Humphrey Award of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights for his service in the cause of equality. His work in immigration and refugee affairs has been recognized with Meritorious Service Citations from the U.S. Committee for Refugees and the American Immigration and Citizenship Council. He has been decorated by the governments of Greece, Italy and Peru. Senator Kennedy was educated at Harvard University, the international Law School at the Hague in the Netherlands, and the University of Virginia Law School.

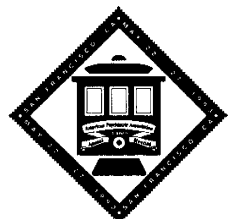

Romantic novelists, by contrast, devote themselves to developing and elaborating on every aspect of romantic love. While critics argue over whether fiction exploits women or affirms their deepest values, people from every stratum of society, factory workers, academics, psychiatrists, even men, manifest an insatiable desire for romance novels. *Where the Heart Roams* examines the phenomenon of romance writing from the unusual perspective of Shelley Kitzmiller, a fan and aspiring novelist who achieves the dream of meeting her favorite authors. Ms. Kitzmiller organizes "The Love Train," a cross-country excursion for novelists and fans travelling together to a writers' convention in New York. The film chronicles her transformation from diffident California housewife to the realities of romance writing and publishing. Such prominent novelists as Janet Dailey and Barbara Cartland appear to present a spectrum of views about the essence of romantic fiction. Neither romanticizing nor condescendingly critical, this skillful documentary invites viewers to reflect on matters ranging from their own romantic dreams and creative impulses to the place of romantic writing in the lives of women and in the culture at large. Modern science established its hegemony in Western thought during the last decades of the 19th century marginalizing the influence of religion. Psychiatry, developing in this context, brought a scientific perspective to bear on some of the issues religion once handled. Today the theoretical foundations of science and psychiatry have begun to show flaws. A new, emerging holistic perspective in diagnosis and therapy considers the person as a whole in relation to society and environment. Religion is again becoming more central, although the new context is multi-religious and multicultural. Dr. Paulos Mar Gregorios, internationally known religious thinker and writer, and



former President of the World Council of Churches, outlines three areas for cooperation in this new context between religion and the healing arts, including psychiatry. The first is reconceptualization of the theoretical construct of the human person to include body, mind, spirit, society and environment. Religious perceptions and rituals often embody this complex matrix, and their meanings can be elucidated in collaboration between religious thinkers and sensitive psychiatrists and psychologists. Second, the analytical and diagnostic functions of psychiatry can be enhanced by creative interpretation of the archetypes that recur in religious experiences, myths and dreams. Third, religion and psychiatry can cooperate in establishing supportive, healing communities superior to today's hospitals and clinics. Dr. Gregorios, formerly known as Father Paul Verghese, received his Greek name at the time of his consecration as Metropolitan of Delhi, India, in the Orthodox Syrian Church of the East. In addition to his leadership role in the Church, Dr. Gregorios is President of the Synodal Committee for Inter-Church Relations and of the Inter-Religious Federation for World Peace. He is also Principal of the Orthodox Theological Seminary in Kottayam, Kerala, India. He is the author of more than 100 periodical articles and 14 books, including *Science for Sane Societies* and *The Human Presence*. His latest book, *Too Bright a Light*, was published in 1991. He is the recipient of numerous awards, including the Man of the Year Award in 1990 from the American Biographical Institute. Dr. Gregorios was educated at Goshen College in Goshen, Indiana, Princeton Theological Seminary, and Yale University. He received his doctorate in theology from Serampore University in India.

\$156 million in fiscal year 1992 to provide special housing assistance for people with AIDS. He serves on several House committees, including the Human Resources Subcommittee, the Social Security Subcommittee and the Committee on the District of Columbia's Fiscal Affairs and Health Subcommittee. He is Co-Chair of the International AIDS Task Force and Co-Chair of the Urban Caucus. For 15 years before coming to Washington, D.C., Rep. McDermott served in the Washington State Legislature, first as Representative (1971-72) and then as Senator (1975-87). Among his major legislative accomplishments as a State Senator were the Nursing Home Reform Act of 1973, Comparable Worth Funding in 1985, and the Basic Health Care Act of 1987. The latter put into effect the first state program in the country to provide affordable health insurance to the unemployed and working poor. In 1987 Rep. McDermott left politics, continuing in public service as a Foreign Service Medical Officer based in Zaire, providing psychiatric services to Foreign Service, AID and Peace Corps personnel in sub-Saharan Africa. Politics beckoned him back when the 7th District seat in the U.S. Congress opened. Rep. McDermott has been a member of several national commissions and councils, including the Pew Health Professions Commission and the National Advisory Panel on Elementary and Secondary School Finance. He graduated from Wheaton College in Wheaton, Illinois, and received his medical degree from the University of Illinois Medical School in Chicago. He completed residencies in adult psychiatry at the University of Illinois Hospitals in Chicago and in child psychiatry at the University of Washington Hospitals in Seattle.

**Torture: A Threat to Democracy,  
a Challenge to Psychiatry**

Torture is one of the most effective weapons against democracy. Its aim is to destroy the personality of influential people such as student leaders, politicians, union leaders, journalists and representatives of ethnic minorities, creating anxiety and thereby repression in the entire society. In the 1960s, medical researchers developed recognition of the symptomatology produced by torture. Inge Kemp Genefke, M.D., founder and Medical Director of the International Rehabilitation and Research Centre for Torture Victims in Copenhagen, describes the development of medical treatment for survivors of torture. In the late 1970s, interest focused on physical and psychological methods of torture and their effects on the individual survivor. This focus later grew to include the survivor's family with the realization that children could be severely affected by their parent's trauma. The treatment of torture survivors gradually became understood as a public health issue. General awareness of torture as a global problem is of utmost importance. In particular, doctors and other health care personnel have an ethical duty to treat the sequelae of torture and to enlighten the public about its tragic consequences. A co-founder and active member of the Danish Medical Group of Amnesty International, Dr. Genefke is former President of Amnesty International's Medical Advisory Board. She is a co-founder and member of the Board of the International Scientific Society Anti-Torture Research. She has authored several scientific works on the physiological and psychological effects of torture. Her work in advancing human rights has been recognized with several awards, including the International Press Center's Dane of the Year Award in 1982, the Right Livelihood Honorary Award in 1988, and the Lis and Leo Eltinger Prize in 1989. Dr. Genefke received her medical degree from the University of Copenhagen and completed postgraduate work in medical and technical biochemistry at Strasbourg University in France. She completed a fellowship in pharmacology at the University of Copenhagen and trained in neurology at University Hospital, also in Copenhagen.

**America and the New World Order:  
Trials of a Lonely Superpower**

In the post-Soviet era, America is the world's sole superpower—a role it is reluctant to assume. In this lecture, Charles Krauthammer, M.D., will focus on the need for a bold and assertive American foreign policy to shape the new world. Such a policy he believes, is as necessary today as it was in 1947 but it is threatened by a rising tide of American isolationism. The alternative to American world leadership, or unipolarity, is not multipolarity but chaos. The end of the Cold War does not abolish history but instead ushers in an age of radically new dangers, from the acquisition of nuclear weapons by outlaw states to the possibility of virulent nationalism emerging in the territories of the old Soviet empire. Since 1983 Dr. Krauthammer has contributed a monthly essay to *Time* magazine. He began writing a nationally syndicated weekly column for the *Washington Post* in 1984, which won the Pulitzer Prize for Distinguished Commentary in 1987. Dr. Krauthammer came to Washington, DC, in 1978 as a science adviser to the Carter Administration. He joined the staff of the *New Republic* in 1981, where he was an essayist and editor until 1988. His *New Republic* essays won the National Magazine Award for Essays and Criticism in 1984. A collection of his essays and columns, *Cutting Edges*, was published in 1985. His other awards include the Champion/Black Media Award for Economic Understanding in 1984, and in 1985 the First Amendment Award given by People for the American Way. Dr. Krauthammer graduated from McGill University and spent a year at Oxford University as a Commonwealth Scholar in Politics. He received his medical degree from Harvard Medical School and was Chief Resident in Psychiatry at Massachusetts General Hospital, during which time he published several papers on manic depressive illness and was awarded the Edwin Dunlop Prize for his research and clinical work.

*Open Doors* is a gripping moral thriller set in fascist Italy in 1937. A Palermo man with a narrow mouth and an odd hitch to his walk enters a government office in which he once worked as an accountant, and calmly murders his boss and the man who took his old job. He then drives into the country with his wife, rapes and murders her, goes home, kisses his little boy, and lies down on his bed to wait for the police. The man is an embezzler who was fired and took his revenge. In court he confesses to the murders and mocks anyone who wants to help him. He seems almost impatient to be put before a firing squad and generally supports the fascist government. However, the judge on the case accepts neither the surface of the story nor the general pressure to get the murderer quickly executed. As the judge relentlessly questions the witnesses, a tangled and squalid history develops that leads up to the murders. The film is the Italian entry for Best Foreign Language Film Oscar. *Open Doors* is a movie about the nature of oppressive regimes and is an eloquent brief against the death penalty. The film is explicit and upsetting, yet sensitive at the same time.

In *Silence of the Lambs*, a brutal serial killer appears to be randomly targeting women. In order to track the killer, a rookie FBI agent is recruited to consult a psychiatrist to gain some insight into the perpetrator's motivation. But she isn't sent to just any expert. She's required to interview Hannibal Lector, M.D. (Anthony Hopkins), who is secured in a forensic facility after his own killing spree. Jodie Foster portrays the agent who must confront her own personal demons, as well as Hannibal the Cannibal, in the process of trying to bring the killer to justice. A popular success, *Silence of the Lambs* raised questions about the portrayal of violence in today's movie, as well as the characterization of psychiatrists in film. Mental Health and the Environment

Psychiatry operates on a multifactorial model of disease etiology, yet macro-level variables in the civilized and natural environment have not received their deserved scientific attention. Despite conceptual shortcomings in the research of environmental parameters, systematic consideration of relationships between these parameters and both individuals and populations can elucidate many aspects of psychiatric disorder. Hugh L. Freeman, D.M., summarizes recent findings about the relationship between mental health and the environment. Among the topics analyzed are climate (including its role in seasonal affective disorder), migration, architecture (particularly high-rise buildings), urban-rural differences, and ecological and temporal variations in morbidity. Other areas examined include the effects of industrialization and cultural change, social networks and support, inner-city stresses, and crime, and the relationship of genetic to environmental factors. Findings highlight the need for architecture and planning that are more sensitive to the mental health consequences of environmental factors. Dr. Freeman is Honorary Professor in the Department of Sociology and Anthropology at the University of Salford, England, and Honorary Consultant Psychiatrist for the Salford Health Authority. He is editor of the *British Journal of Psychiatry* and co-editor of *Current Opinion in Psychiatry*. A consultant to the World Health Organization (WHO), he convened the WHO Psychiatric Editors' Group. He has edited four books and authored more than 100 articles and chapters on social psychiatry, community-based interventions, and the pharmacological treatment of schizophrenia and other serious mental illnesses. He is a member of the international advisory boards of several publications, including *Excerpta Medica*, *Community Mental Health Journal*, and *Culture, Medicine and Psychiatry*. A member of the Council of the Royal College of Psychiatrists and Chairman of its Journal Committee, Dr. Freeman is Secretary-General of the public policy section of the World Psychiatric Association. He is a recipient of several awards, including a Distinguished Service Commendation from the U.S. National Association of Community Mental Health Centers. Dr. Freeman was educated at St. John's College, Oxford, at Manchester Royal Infirmary, and at the Institute of Psychiatry in London.

Conduct Disorder as a Precursor to  
 Adult Violence and Substance Abuse:  
 Can the Progression Be Halted?

The increasing prevalence of violent behavior in the United States and the role of mental and addictive disorders in such behavior challenge psychiatry to develop sound prevention and intervention strategies. These strategies should focus on the developmental antecedents of adult violent and impulsive behavior, including substance abuse. Improvements in the reliability of diagnosis of disruptive behavior disorders in childhood have now made feasible broad epidemiological studies to define individual and environmental factors predictive of adult violent behavior. Frederick K. Goodwin, M.D., will address the need for research to further differentiate genetic from other familial influences, and to study how specific environmental factors may amplify a particular biological vulnerability. He will underscore the extent to which diagnostic labels may obscure etiologic considerations that may be independent of disorders as presently understood: for example, the contribution of dysregulation of serotonin to reduced control of impulsive behavior. Dr. Goodwin will outline future directions in animal and clinical research aimed at developing psychosocial and pharmacological interventions specific to individual determinants of violent behavior, and will urge psychiatrists to avoid pitfalls that have previously undermined the credibility of psychiatry in the arena of social problems. From 1988-92 Dr. Goodwin was Administrator of the Alcohol, Drug Abuse, and Mental Health Administration (ADAMHA). He is currently the Director of the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH). An authority on research and treatment of major depression and manic-depressive illness, Dr. Goodwin was first to report the antidepressant effects of lithium in a controlled study, and was a leader in the development of safe, effective clinical techniques for measuring changes in brain chemistry. Dr. Goodwin has received major research awards, including the A.C. Bennett Award from the Society of Biological Psychiatry, the International Anna-Monika Prize for Research in Depression, and the Edward A. Strecker Award. In 1986 President Reagan conferred on Dr. Goodwin the Presidential Distinguished Executive Award. In addition to serving on several editorial boards, Dr. Goodwin is founder and Co-Editor-in-Chief of *Psychiatry Research*, and Associate Editor of the *Journal of Neuropsychiatry and Clinical Neuroscience*. Dr. Goodwin is the author of more than 375 publications. In 1990 his comprehensive textbook, *Manic-Depressive Illness*, co-authored with Kay R. Jamison,

Ph.D., was the first psychiatry book to win the Association of American Publishers Award for Most Outstanding Book in the Biomedical Sciences. A graduate of Georgetown University, Dr. Goodwin received his medical degree from St. Louis University and completed his psychiatric residency at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill.

Adopted when he was three, Michael's development was unremarkable until preadolescence when he began to have problems at home and at school. After referral, his therapist, Dr. Hugh Leichtman of Wediko Children's Services, found in addition to depression and hostile behavior, a preoccupation with his birth mother and an ambivalence about his adoptive family. When several therapeutic strategies failed, a reunion with his birth mother was planned with the goal of allowing him to resolve the conflicted loyalties that were interfering with his development. This tape is a record of that encounter. Although all participants were carefully prepared, the emotional impact of the procedure is evident. *Trouble Behind* and *The Deep North* are two extremely well-made films that help viewers confront the roots and persistence of racism in America, a disturbingly common phenomenon. Our discussant participated in the production of one of these films and appears in it. *Trouble Behind* graphically uncovers the origins of racism in the history of a seemingly typical American small town, Corbin, Kentucky, during World War I, when 200 Blacks migrated to fill railroad jobs. They were subsequently run out of town by a racist mob, leaving Corbin currently an all-white town. The second part of the film explores, with many *cinema verite* methods, how Corbin's present citizens evade and deny their "whites only" reputation, as well as the fearful reaction by Blacks living near and passing through Corbin.

Fundamental changes in health care delivery have created ethical dilemmas, including rationing, the "right" to health care, cost containment, and the role of the physician in the "business" of medicine. Physicians have had to reexamine and redefine their relationships with patients in the evolving system. Some studies have shown that biases exist in the delivery of health care. These biases include age, gender, socioeconomic status and race. Carol C. Nadelson, M.D., will use gender as an example of bias in health care delivery and will consider its role in policy development. She will focus on some of the inherent contradictions and biases that must be addressed if ours is to be an empathic society. Since 1979 Dr. Nadelson has been Director of Training and Education for the Department of Psychiatry at the New England Medical Center in Boston and Professor of Psychiatry at Tufts University School of Medicine. At Tufts she is also Vice Chair of Academic Affairs for the Department. Since 1986 Dr. Nadelson has been Editor-in-Chief of the American Psychiatric Press, Inc. She has been very actively involved in the APA for the past two decades, serving as APA Vice President from 1981 to 1983. In 1984 she was the first woman to be elected APA President Elect. Among her many awards are the American Medical Women's Association 1985 Elizabeth Blackwell Award for her efforts on behalf of women in the field of medicine. Most recently she received an APA Special Presidential Commendation for her many contributions as Editor-in-Chief of the American Psychiatric Press. She has served on the Editorial Boards of several journals, including *Hospital and Community Psychiatry*, the *Journal of Marital and Family Therapy* and the *Journal of Psychosomatic Obstetrics and Gynecology*. Dr. Nadelson has written more than 180 articles and book chapters and is co-editor of 13 books. Her most recent book is *Women and Men: New Perspectives on Gender Differences*. Dr. Nadelson graduated from Brooklyn College and received her medical degree from the University of Rochester. She completed psychoanalytic training at the Boston Psychoanalytic Institute and Society.

**Reactive Depression: Its Place in the Classification of Affective Disorder**

Reactive depression is a depressive state caused by an external situation or by life stress, such as the death of a loved one. For more than two decades Paula J. Clayton, M.D., has studied bereavement, normal grief and reactive depression. She will describe reactive depression among several hundred recently widowed men and women she has studied. In addition to describing the symptoms and the syndrome of reactive depression, Dr. Clayton will discuss its course and its relationship to family history. She will examine factors affecting both positive and negative outcomes, particularly the outcome of a chronic depressive syndrome, and review biological parameters and data from the few controlled treatment studies. Her lecture will uphold some old beliefs and dispel others. Since 1980 Dr. Clayton has been Professor and Head of the Department of Psychiatry of the University of Minnesota Medical School in Minneapolis. She has served on several national advisory groups on mental health policy and research, including the U.S. National Committee for Prevention and Treatment of Depression, and on advisory panels to the MacArthur Foundation, the Department of Veterans Affairs, the American Medical Association, the National Foundation for Depressive Illness and the National Institute of Mental Health, where she has helped develop the Depression/Awareness, Recognition, and Treatment Program. Dr. Clayton is active in many professional associations: she is Past President of the Society of Biological Psychiatry (1986-87), the American Psychopathological Association (1980-81) and the Psychiatric Research Society (1977-78), and has been a Councillor of the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology. In 1991 she received the Lifetime Research Award from the National Depressive and Manic-Depressive Association. She serves on many Editorial Boards, including the *Journal of Clinical Psychiatry*, *Journal of Affective Disorders*, and *Biological Psychiatry*. She was formerly Associate Editor of the *American Journal of Psychiatry*. Dr. Clayton is the author of more than 150 articles and book chapters and has written or edited four books. She received her medical degree from Washington University in St. Louis and completed her psychiatric residency at Barnes and Renard Hospitals, Washington University School of Medicine.

**Hope and Morale:****Critical Elements in Organizational Function**

Hope has been defined as the fundamental knowledge and feeling that there is a way out of difficulty. Morale has been termed as a barometer of an individual's or group's capacity to respond to the tasks they face. W. Walter Menninger, M.D., uses case examples from clinical settings to illustrate three factors critical to morale: certainty, mastery and hope. Uncertainty, loss of control over one's situation, and loss of hope significantly contribute to poor morale and increase an organizational vulnerability to dysfunction and disruption. Management's responsibility to understand and manage factors affecting morale includes helping individuals to recognize the shared goal of the work, to agree that the goal is worthwhile, and to sense that their contribution is essential to achieving the goal. Lack of clear, consistent direction from leadership threatens the morale of line personnel, and their performance deteriorates. In clinical settings, the cost is compromised patient care. Dr. Menninger is President, Chief Executive Officer, and Chief of Staff of the Menninger Clinic in Topeka, Kansas, and Trustee of the Menninger Foundation. He is a member of the faculty of the Menninger School of Psychiatry, the Topeka Institute for Psychoanalysis, and the University of Kansas Medical Center School of Medicine in Kansas City. Dr. Menninger has had an extensive career in forensic psychiatry. Consultant to the Topeka Police Department, the Federal Bureau of Prisons and the U.S. Secret Service, he was a member of the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence convened by President Johnson in 1968, and a member of the Advisory Committee to the U.S. Sentencing Commission on Alternatives to Imprisonment. In 1991 he was appointed to chair the Kansas Governor's Criminal Justice Advisory Commission. Dr. Menninger has written extensively for both professional and lay audiences, authoring five books and pamphlets, seven book chapters, and more than 50 journal articles. From 1975 to 1985 he was author of the nationally syndicated news feature, "In-Sights," on psychological aspects of personal and social issues. A graduate of Cornell University Medical College, Dr. Menninger received his psychiatric training at the Menninger School of Psychiatry and his psychoanalytic training at the Topeka Institute for Psychoanalysis.

**The Devil Bis Due:****Who's Who in Michelangelo's Creation of Adam**

Michelangelo's *Creation of Adam*, recycled for commercial and political purposes in an endless flow of ads, cartoons, lampoons, and art reproductions, ranks among the world's best known images. Yet the economy of perception is so restrictive that most of the picture remains unseen, and most of its meaning unsuspected. Art historian Leo Steinberg, Ph.D., examines why it has taken hundreds of years to register and recognize what is plainly given in the fresco. Dr. Steinberg, Professor Emeritus of the History of Art at the University of Pennsylvania, has published and lectured widely on Renaissance and 20th-century art. His collected writings on modern art were published in 1972 under the title *Other Criteria*. His more recent books are *Michelangelo's Last Paintings* (1975); a revision of his earlier work on Borromini (1977); and *The Sexuality of Christ in Renaissance Art and in Modern Obsession* (1984). Other recent writings include studies of Leonardo, Pontorno, Guercino and Picasso. A Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and of the University College, London, Dr. Steinberg became the first art historian to receive an Award in Literature from the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters in 1983. He is a recipient of the MacArthur Foundation Fellowship and the Frank Jewett Mather Award for Distinction in Art and Architectural Criticism from the College Art Association of America. He received his doctorate in art history from the Institute of Fine Arts at New York University.

Black Monday's Children: A Multi-Cultural  
Agenda for the 21st Century

By the first decade of the 21st century a significant percentage of youth between the ages of 16 and 25 in the United States will be functionally illiterate. Unable to participate in the highly technological society, they will not be prepared to contribute to an economy already burdened by the need to support a large elderly population. A majority of such youth will be newly arrived immigrants or members of minority groups. Gloria Johnson-Powell, M.D., will update the status of minority children as we approach the 21st century. She will discuss the critical importance of a multicultural agenda if our social, educational and health care institutions are to promote the psychosocial development of youth in our culturally diverse population. Dr. Johnson-Powell is Professor of Child Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School and Director of the Camille Cosby Ambulatory Care Center of the Judge Baker Children's Center in Boston. The author of *Black Monday's Children: A Study of the Effects of School Desegregation on the Self-Concepts of Southern Children*, she has served as consultant to more than 30 school districts on school desegregation. She has also written extensively on the effects of child sexual abuse, and her work in prevention and treatment of child abuse was recognized with the 1989 Rosa Parks Award for Humanitarian Services in Child Abuse and Sexual Assault from the Martin Luther King, Jr. Legacy Foundation. She was the senior editor of *The Psychosocial Development of Minority Group Children*, which was named the best academic book of 1986 by CHOICE, the association of academic publishers. A graduate of Meharry Medical College in Nashville, Dr. Johnson-Powell received her training in child psychiatry at UCLA Neuropsychiatric Institute.

## Eating Disorders and Femininity

Returning to a topic on which she has previously written, female sexuality, Dr. Janine Chassequet-Smirgel will now

discuss it in the context of eating disorders. Past psychoanalytic research on integration of the body ego and the psychic ego has not received much attention. Dr. Chassequet-Smirgel will describe the link in some cases between female pubertal development and a violent wish to escape the biological order, a wish that expresses itself in an eating disorder. The pubescent girl experiences confusion between her own body and her mother's body. The adolescent boy disentangles himself from his mother's femininity at puberty as he acquires secondary sex characteristics. For the girl it is otherwise. She feels her body is persecuting her; its transformations are experienced as proof of the mother's domination over it. Hatred of her own femininity is not due to narcissistic injury related to her lack of a penis, but to an inescapable confusion between herself and her mother. Dr. Chassequet-Smirgel will attempt to show that eating disorders aimed at creating an autarchical system originate in disorders of precocious infantile auto-eroticism. She will support her views with clinical material and will discuss a parallel between eating disorders, which are found mostly in females, and the perversions, which appear almost exclusively in males. Dr. Chassequet-Smirgel, a training analyst in Paris, is the author of seven books. Five have been translated into English, including *New Researches on Female Sexuality*, now in its third edition, *The Ego Ideal, Freud or Reich?*, *Creativity and Perversion* and *Sexuality and Mind*. She is Past President of the Paris Psychoanalytical Society and former Vice-President of the International Psychoanalytical Association. As a Professor at University College in London, she held the Freud Memorial Chair (1982-83). In 1988 the Federal Republic of Germany recognized her work by presenting her with the Alexander von Humboldt Award. Dr. Chassequet-Smirgel has a Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology and received a Doctorat d'Etat es Lettres et Sciences Humaines from the Sorbonne in Paris.

## Psychiatry and Scientology

Scientology began as Dianetics, a pseudoscientific healing cult whose tenets were outlined in a 1950 book by L. Ron Hubbard, a science fiction writer. In 1954 Hubbard transformed Dianetics into the Church of Scientology, which later grew into a multimillion-dollar, multinational enterprise that openly offered cures for psychiatric and psychosomatic disorders while remaining relatively immune from statutes governing the healing arts and from the oversight of ethics committees in the health professions. Although Scientology portrays itself as a victim of persecution, its

policy has been to attack its critics aggressively. Psychiatry, particularly its physiological and pharmacological treatments, has been the target of especially hostile Scientology attacks. Louis John West, M.D., discusses Scientology's battles with psychiatry and the church's effects on the lives of its members and their families. He points out that many persons are emerging damaged from the cult, and he urges mental health professionals to apply their knowledge in the legitimate care of the cult's many victims. Dr. West is Professor of Psychiatry at UCLA School of Medicine and Director of the newly created Preventive Psychiatry Center at UCLA. From 1969 to 1989 he was Director of the UCLA Neuropsychiatric Institute and Psychiatrist-in-Chief at UCLA Medical Center. An active advisor to the Department of Veterans Affairs for more than 35 years, Dr. West currently serves as consultant to three VA medical centers in the Los Angeles area. He is the author of more than 120 articles and has served on the editorial boards of several journals, including *Directions in Psychiatry* and *Violence, Aggression, and Terrorism*. His many awards include APA's Seymour D. Vestermarck Award for his contributions to psychiatric education and the Leo J. Ryan Award of the Cult Awareness Network. Dr. West was educated at the Universities of Wisconsin, Iowa and Minnesota. He completed his residency in psychiatry at Payne Whitney Clinic at New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center and trained in psychoanalysis at Topeka Psychoanalytic Institute.

*So Long Silence* is a documentary video about the educational and social needs of deaf teenagers. It features Michelle Lennert, an extraordinary yet representative senior at the California School for the Deaf in Fremont, California, where deaf children from preschool through high school are taught in an all-sign-language environment. In addition to being a top student, Michelle is active in theater, sports (she played first-string tackle on the boys football team), and other organizations on campus. We see Michelle with friends, classmates and family, and it becomes clear that although she and other deaf teenagers are in most ways very much like teenagers who can hear, their deafness also presents them with some very unique needs. The video also touches on the trauma that parents undergo when they learn that their baby is deaf. One mother tells of being shut off from her little boy until he learned sign language when he was eight years old; only then was he able to express his sadness and guilt for having accidentally killed the family's pet bird five years earlier when he was just three years old.

With the United States struggling to control soaring health care costs and 37 million Americans not covered by health insurance, the Canadian system of national health insurance looks attractive. *Borderline Medicine* takes a close look at how health care is delivered to both sides of the border. The videotape begins by comparing prenatal care in both countries. A San Diego woman who has insurance through Medicaid called sixty obstetricians and could not find one who would care for her. In Vancouver, a high-risk obstetric patient faces no financial barriers to having a closely monitored pregnancy. While routine medical care is more accessible in Canada, there are often waiting lists for elective surgery. Canadian patients with coronary artery disease often cross the border for surgery in the United States. The last section examines the diagnosis and treatment of cancer. In British Columbia, mammograms are covered by insurance, and there is a population screening program which may reduce breast cancer mortality by as much as one third. Yet high technology diagnostic procedures are much more available in the United States, and Canadian patients may be subjected to older, more dangerous diagnostic tests. Narrated and hosted by Walter Cronkite, and to comple-

ment the powerful patient stories, health care experts and business leaders like Lee Iococca comment on the medical and financial implications of both systems.

This videotape documentary will present basic concepts of Jungian analysis of dreams, practical techniques and new ways of looking at the manifest dream. An interview with a 91-year-old analysand of C.G. Jung reflects on her use of dreams in her analysis and her practice. The interview was done in London, England, November 1990, for feature use in the symposium, *Dream: One Third of Your Life*, presented at the Institute for the Humanities at Salado, Texas, October 24-27, 1991. *Blood in the Face* is a compelling documentary film about the white-supremacy, radical right-wing in North America. Consisting largely of interviews with no voice-over narration, the film lets the leaders of the American Nazi Party, Ku Klux Klan, and the Aryan Nations (among others) speak for themselves about their beliefs, including anti-semitism, racism, extreme nationalism, and the denial of the Holocaust. What emerges is a paranoid realm where violence is seen as an inevitable and legitimate revolutionary tool. Through their eyes we see their heroes of the past, Adolf Hitler and George Lincoln Rockwell, founder of the American Nazi Party. We witness their contemporary activities, meeting and organizing, marrying at the

burning cross, creating a home video network, and running for office (David Duke). Finally, we explore their vision of the future, an apocalyptic landscape of race warfare, alien invasion, the "balkanization" of America into separate racial nation states, and the collapse of ZOG (the satanic Zionist Occupational Government in Washington, DC). Their shocking racist discourse is cut against remarkable historical footage, unusual home video propaganda tapes and contemporary news footage.

#### The Formation of the Mind: Implications for the Prevention of Autism and Disorders of Thought and Affect

The mind forms in early childhood through several stages during which one may observe the contributions of biological factors, constitutional and maturational variations, family and environmental factors, and interactional patterns between caregiver and child. Certain types of psychopathology appear to be associated with specific combinations of these variables. Children with autistic spectrum disorders often show marked difficulties in auditory processing, motor tone and motor planning, and sensory over- or under-reactivity. These maturational variations, coupled with certain caregiver patterns, begin to derail development during the fourth stage of mental organization, between 14 and 18 months of age. Disorders of thought and affect are seen most prominently in the fifth and sixth stages, when representational systems are ascendant. Stanley I. Greenspan, M.D., describes how pinpointing children's level of mental organization, maturational variations, and interactions with caregivers can be used to develop new strategies for prevention and early treatment. Dr. Greenspan is Clinical Professor of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences and of Pediatrics at George Washington University Medical School in Washington, DC, and Supervising Child Psychoanalyst at the Washington Psychoanalytic Institute. His books include *The Clinical Interview of the Child, Infancy and Early Childhood: The Practice of Clinical Assessment and Intervention with Emotional and Developmental Challenges*, and *First Feelings: Milestones in the Emotional Development of Your Baby and Child*. His formulation of emotional milestones and related strategies to facilitate emotional growth have



been incorporated into the American Academy of Pediatrics' guidelines for well baby care. They were featured in the PBS-NOVA documentary *Life's First Feelings*, which received the American Psychological Association's 1996 award for Best Educational Program. A graduate of Yale University Medical School, Dr. Greenspan received his psychiatric training at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center in New York City and Children's Hospital in Washington, DC.

Martin Duberman, Ph.D., will draw on his extensive experiences as a patient in psychotherapy in the 1950s and 1960s—some of which he has described in his recent book, *Cured: A Gay Man's Odyssey*—to explore changing definitions of homosexuality in American culture and within the psychotherapeutic profession. Dr. Duberman will present findings from the emerging field of gay and lesbian studies and will encourage therapists to study history and anthropology so that they may critically examine their own assumptions and understand them as culture-bound and subject to change. Dr. Duberman is Distinguished Professor of History at the Graduate School and University Center of the City University of New York. Author of articles and reviews for scholarly and lay audiences, he has written 14 books and plays, including *About Time: Exploring the Gay Past*. He wrote the biography, *Paul Robeson*, received the Bancroft Prize for the biography *Charles Francis Adams, 1807-1886*, and was a National Book Award finalist for the biography *James Russell Lowell*. He earned the Vernon Rice/Drama Desk Award for his first play, *In White America*, and a special award from the National Academy of Arts and Letters for his contributions to literature. Dr. Duberman graduated from Yale University and received his doctorate from Harvard University.

Paleontologist Stephen Jay Gould, Ph.D., Professor of Geology and of Zoology at Harvard University and Curator of Invertebrate Paleontology at Harvard's Museum of Comparative Zoology, has written many books and essays illuminating the fields of evolutionary biology and the history of science for the general public. His columns for *Natural History* have been collected in the best-selling books, *Ever Since Darwin*, *The Panda's Thumb*, *Hen's Teeth and Horse's Toes* and *The Flamingo's Smile*. Among his many honors are the American Book Award for *The Panda's Thumb*, the National Book Critics Circle Award and the American Educational Research Association's Outstanding Book Award for *The Mismeasure of Man* and several awards for his contributions to the public's understanding of science, including *Discover* magazine's Scientist of the Year Award in 1981. His recent book, entitled *Wonderful Life: The Burgess Shale and the Nature of History*, won the Forkosch Award from the Council on Democratic Humanism for the best book on a humanistic subject. Dr. Gould is a member of the Board of Editors of *Science*, a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He was a recipient of the MacArthur Foundation Prize Fellowship in 1981. After graduating from Amherst College with a degree in Geology, Dr. Gould received his doctorate from Columbia University.

**Suicide and Attempted Suicide in a Developing Country: The Case of Barbados**

Attempted and completed suicide are phenomena that defy simple explanation, especially in the complex context of continuing socioeconomic development. The Caribbean island-nation of Barbados gained independence from Britain in 1966 and has since undergone considerable urbanization. The changes have been accompanied by social

dislocation, including unemployment, increased drug use and greater emulation of North American values. George E. Mahy, M.B., will present data describing trends in Barbadian parasuicide and suicide over the last 25 years and will advance hypotheses to explain the findings. He will also describe preventive psychiatric and public health measures. Since 1982 Dr. Mahy has been a Senior Lecturer in Psychiatry on the Faculty of Medical Sciences of the University of the West Indies, Cave Hill Campus, Barbados. He is also on the Faculty of Social Sciences in the Department of Government and Sociology and an Associate Consultant Psychiatrist for the Barbados Ministry of Health at two public hospitals. He has a private practice as Consultant Psychiatrist at the Belleville Medical Centre in Barbados. In recent years, Dr. Mahy has consulted on mental health and substance abuse in the Caribbean to international and regional groups, including the Pan American Health Organization, the Caribbean Community Secretariat (CARICOM), Project Hope and the Ministries of Health of Grenada, the British Virgin Islands and St. Kitts-Nevis. He has traveled throughout the Caribbean region lecturing, particularly on drug abuse, and conducting training sessions for community groups. He is Past President of the Windward and Leeward Islands Medical Association, the Caribbean Psychiatric Association and the Barbados Association of Medical Practitioners, as well as Past Chair of the Inter-American Council of Psychiatric Associations. Dr. Mahy, a Fellow of the Royal College of Psychiatrists and a member of the World Federation for Mental Health, is author of more than 50 published articles, book chapters and reports. He received his medical training at the University of the West Indies in Jamaica and at Royal Edinburgh Hospital in Scotland.

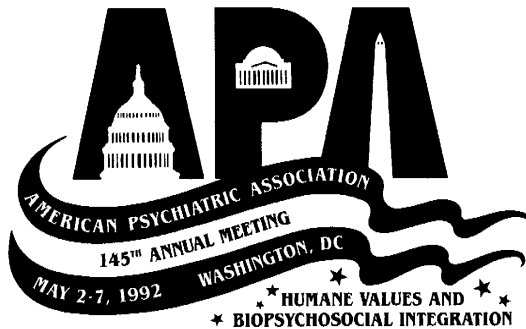

1990's surprise blockbuster, *Pretty Woman*, reads as a shrewd reinvention of the Pygmalion myth for the post-Reagan era. It features a love affair between Edward (Richard Gere), an uptight corporate raider, and Vivian (Julia Roberts), a beautiful, freespirited hooker he hires for a week, then tumbles for. *Pretty Woman* was widely hailed as a rebirth of screwball comedy-romance, but also taken to task for a position on women's issues some critics deemed to the right of Bluebeard. Discussion will take up the thread of Dr. Greenberg's previous study of *Working Girl* (1989). *Pretty Woman* is analyzed as a subgenre of "pseudo-engaged" movie which covertly mocks, subverts, or co-opts the very progressive developments of the 1960s and 1970s it would seem to be reaffirming. The film's questionable notions about feminine rescue fantasies and mutual rescue between the sexes will be explored. Its impact upon subsequent "Hollywood feminist" pictures like *Sleeping With The Enemy* and *Thelma and Louise* (1991) will also be addressed.

## Shame and Humiliation in the Clinical Encounter

Visiting the hospital and the clinician's office entails physical and psychological exposure. Patients often perceive their disorders as defects or inadequacies. Thus, in any clinical encounter, patients are at high-risk of experiencing shame and humiliation. Aaron Lazare, M.D., will discuss patients' responses to the experience of shame and humiliation, which include avoiding the clinician, withholding information, complaining and suing. Clinicians also experience shame and humiliation, which may result in their counterhumiliation of patients and in their dissatisfaction with clinical practice. Greater awareness of these issues may help clinicians minimize the shame experience for

their patients and themselves. In 1991 Dr. Lazare was appointed Chancellor of the University of Massachusetts Medical Center in Worcester. Since 1990 he has served as Dean of the University of Massachusetts Medical Center, where he has been Professor and Chair of the Department of Psychiatry since 1982. Under Dr. Lazare's leadership, the Department has become a model for the collaboration of academic psychiatry and public-sector agencies, winning two national awards. Before his association with the University of Massachusetts, Dr. Lazare was Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School and Director of Outpatient Services at Massachusetts General Hospital. He is the editor of the first textbook on outpatient psychiatry, *Outpatient Psychiatry: Diagnosis and Treatment*, now in its second edition, which was selected by the *American Journal of Nursing* in 1990 as a Book of the Year. He has won teaching awards both at Harvard Medical School and at the University of Massachusetts Medical Center. In 1988 the University of Massachusetts recognized his leadership by presenting him with the Award for Distinguished Professional Public Service. Dr. Lazare has written or edited six books, the most recent entitled *The Medical Interview*. He is the author of more than 60 articles and book chapters. Since 1981 he has served on the Editorial Board of *Contemporary Psychiatry*. Dr. Lazare graduated from Oberlin College and received his medical degree from Case Western Reserve University.

## Thinking About Thinking: Recent Molecular Biological Insights into Learning and Memory

The operation of the neuron can be described as a chemical mechanism in which enzymes move electrically charged ions in and out of the nerve cell to prepare it for action and then allow these ions to undergo a rapid and controlled redistribution that causes the neuron to fire. Communication between adjacent nerve cells and between nerve cells and their target tissue, such as muscle, is mediated by the manufacture and release of small molecules that serve as neurotransmitters. In the last five years, this model has yielded significant progress in understanding the molecular basis of learning and memory. Researchers have examined propagation of signals and release of neurotransmitters in specific neural networks both before and after a well-defined learning experience. After the learning experience, specific changes can be detected in the function of particular ion channels and in the potential for neurotransmitter release. In addition, the number of synaptic



connections in the learned pathway increases. David Dressler, Ph.D., discusses these chemical and cellular changes, both short-term and long-term, which constitute initial insights into the physical basis of memory. Dr. Dressler is Lecturer in Neurobiology at Harvard Medical School. Recipient of the Camille and Henry Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Award and a Guggenheim Fellowship, Dr. Dressler has conducted extensive research on DNA replication and recombination, and on the structure of viral chromosomes. His most recent book, *Discovering Enzymes*, co-authored with his colleague, Dr. Huntington Potter, includes a chapter on recent findings about the nervous system's molecular biology and its relationship to mental function. Dr. Dressler graduated from Columbia University and received his doctorate in biochemistry and molecular biology from Harvard University.

Mental Disorders of Childhood and Adolescence. She is a recipient of the American Speech, Language and Hearing Association's Certificate of Appreciation for her contributions to the profession of speech-language pathology and audiology. After graduating from New York University, Dr. Tatal earned her doctorate in experimental psychology from Cambridge University in England. She received post-doctoral training at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine.

The discussion will cover the contemporary approach and compare what progress has been made in treating the disorder during the past 50 years. The case was reported in 1943, 1948 and 1980. Eva, a 25-year-old married, white woman was admitted to the Cincinnati General Hospital in July 1941 because of amnesia attacks. Initially diagnosed with conversion hysteria, she was treated with hypnosis and intensive uncovering psychotherapy which revealed prolonged incestuous relationships with both her father and brother. While hospitalized, two very different states were observed. The differences between Eva and her alter "Hilda" were studied exhaustively, and some of the findings will be illustrated in the 1941 video. During her hospital stay, the diagnosis was hysteria, then dissociated personality and finally schizophrenia. In June 1942 she was transferred to a state hospital for two months, after which she was followed in the psychiatric clinic. From 1951 to 1975 she was treated with supportive psychotherapy and the diagnosis was changed to multiple personality. During this period she divorced her husband, raised two children, lived with her mother, and held two excellent jobs. She was seen by Dr. Milton Rosenbaum in December 1978, and followed until her death in 1986. Remarkably, her functioning at work was excellent. She was outgoing, friendly, popular and considered perfectly normal, but her private life was severely constricted and social contacts limited to her immediate family. Dr. Teresita McCarty will present the case and video and discuss how Eva would be diagnosed and treated today.

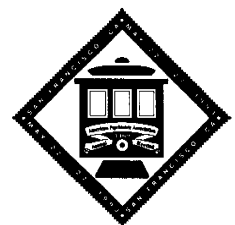

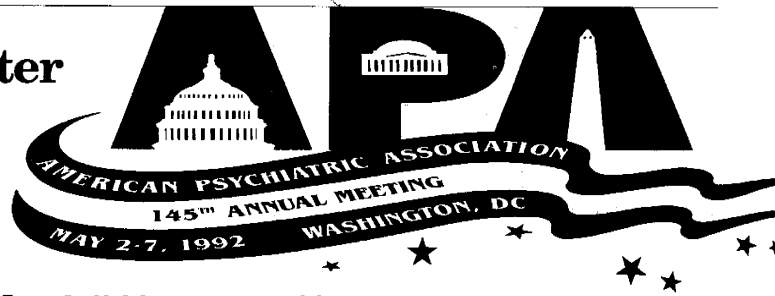
