# **Position Statement on Human Trafficking**

#### Issue:

There are estimated to be 50 million, or nearly one in every 150 people in the world, victims of human trafficking worldwide.<sup>1</sup> In the United States, forced labor and sex trafficking are the two predominant forms of recognized human trafficking.<sup>2</sup> One study indicates that 88% of human trafficking victims have been seen by a medical provider while in captivity.<sup>3</sup> Those who are identified have high rates of mental illness.<sup>3,4</sup>

#### **APA Position:**

Human trafficking is a legal, social, economic, education and public health issue with profound mental health consequences affecting individuals of all ages and genders both domestically and internationally. Adequate community-based resources for mental health treatment for victims of trafficking are required.
