

Registration fees are waived only for CME Course Faculty, APA Honorary or Distinguished Fellows (does not include APA Life Fellows or Fellows), all medical students (with proper identification), District Branch Executive Staff (who are not APA members), active members of the Association of Mental Health Clergy (with proper identification), and nonmember program participants (only for the day(s) they present).

NONMEMBER PSYCHIATRIC RESIDENTS, REGULAR FULL-TIME STUDENTS, AND MENTAL HEALTH

CLERGY (who are <u>not</u> members of the Association of Mental Health Clergy) must present documentation of their qualifications to register in their respective category and qualify for the reduced fee. (Examples include: a valid full-time [12 + hrs. per semester] student ID; a letter from your instructor or director of training verifying your status as a psychiatric resident; or similar documentation).

NONPSYCHIATRIST PHYSICIANS FROM FLORIDA: M.D.'s or D.O.'s who are NOT psychiatrists AND who permanently reside in the State of Florida qualify for the reduced registration fee (same as the APA member fee).



published elsewhere in any form and not being considered for publication elsewhere. Five copies are required.

Persons who wish to contact editors or reporters of *Psychiatric News* should inquire at the APA Staff Office, located in Rooms B121/B122, Level 1, Convention Center, where an editor can be paged. They may also leave written announcements, suggestions for articles, or letters to the editor for the newspaper's consideration.

CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION CREDIT

The American Psychiatric Association is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) to sponsor continuing medical education for physicians. The APA designates this continuing medical education activity for up to 66 credit hours in Category 1 of the Physician's Recognition Award of the American Medical Association and for the CME requirement of the APA.

The content of CME is that body of knowledge and skills generally recognized and accepted by the profession as within the basic medical sciences, the discipline of clinical medicine, and the provision of health care to the public. Sessions not meeting the definition of CME are not eligible for CME credit.

The scientific sessions of the official Annual Meeting program, with some exceptions, meet the criteria for Category 1 CME credit. Sessions in the following program formats are designated as Category 1: Advances in Research, Clinical Case and Continuous Clinical Case Conferences, CME Courses, Debates, Forums, Industry Supported Symposia, Lectures, Media Sessions, Medical Updates, New Research Oral/Slide Sessions, Paper Sessions, Presidential Symposium, Review of Psychiatry, Symposia, and Workshops. Other sessions are designated as Category 2; these include Clinical and Research Consultations With, Discussion Groups, New Research Poster Sessions, the Video Production Clinic, and some Lectures, Media Sessions and Workshops.

To document CME credit earned at the Annual Meeting, participants should record the sessions attended on the back page of the Certificate of Attendance found in the front of the 1995 Annual Meeting CME Syllabus & Proceedings Summary Book. Credit is earned on an hour-for-hour basis. Please note: APA members are required to maintain their own record of CME hours throughout the three-year reporting cycle. Reporting of CME credit is on an honor basis. APA members should report their CME activities once they have accumulated 150 hours (with a minimum of 60 hours in Category 1) in a three-year reporting period. CME report forms may be obtained from the Office of Education at the APA. The Certificate of Attendance (or copy) may be forwarded to other organizations requiring verification of participation in the APA Annual Meeting. Staff will be available in the Office of Education booth at the APA Resource Center to answer any of your questions about CME.

CME NEEDS-ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

Annual Meeting attendees can participate in a computerized needs-assessment program that will collect information on members' educational needs. Those completing the self-administered assessment will receive a CME certificate of participation indicating the number of Category 1 hours they have earned at the meeting. Located at the Office of Education exhibit in the APA Resource Center, the needs-assessment project is sponsored by the APA Committee on Continuing Education and supported by an educational grant from Janssen Pharmaceutica and Research Foundation.

ANNUAL MEETING EVALUATION

TAPE RECORDING AND VISUAL REPRODUCTION POLICIES

Audiotape recording is only permitted for personal use. Registrants are welcome to use their own small, portable audiotape recorders to record any session except the Clinical Case Conferences and the Continuous Clinical Case Conference, or unless prohibited by the presenters. Larger professional tape recorders, however, are not permitted other than those utilized by personnel representing the professional taping firm authorized by APA to audiotape sessions. The badges of personnel representing this firm will clearly identify them. Registrants are not permitted to videotape any session because the intrusive nature of the recording may disrupt the session.

SMOKING POLICY

There will be NO SMOKING in scientific sessions or in the exhibit hall. Smoking will only be permitted in designated areas.



CHILD CARE SERVICES

Child Care Service will be available during the 1995 Annual Meeting and will be located in the Miami Beach Convention Center. Hours of operation will be 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Sunday, May 21, through Thursday, May 25, 1995. The program has been developed and will be operated by the YWCA of Greater Miami, under the direction of Michelle W. Rosen, M.Ed., LCSW, Director, Child Care Services, and Rita Turk, M.S., Assistant Director, Early Childhood Education. The program has been approved by the South Florida Psychiatric Society and the Task Force on Local Arrangements for the 1995 Annual Meeting.

All YWCA staff meet state mandated HRS criminal and abuse clearance, as well as all HRS training standards. The Child Care Service staffing ratio will be 1:8 (staff to children). Snacks and box lunches will be provided and a developmentally appropriate program of educational and recreational activities will be provided on-site. The children will not leave the Convention Center area.

The center will accept children starting at two-and-one-half years of age who are toilet-trained, through twelve years of age. ADVANCE REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED and the cost is \$55.00 per child per day and \$35.00 per child per half day. On-site registration can only be accepted on a "space available" basis.






CONVENTION CENTER LEVEL 2




FONTAINEBLEAU LEVEL 1






FONTAINEBLEAU LEVEL 2

FORMAT DESCRIPTIONS

ADVANCES IN RESEARCH

This two-hour session is traditionally chaired by the Chairperson of the Council on Research, and co-chaired by the Chairperson of the Scientific Program Committee. After a brief overview of major advances in research in psychiatry, and a preview of selected research presentations scheduled at the Annual Meeting, leading clinical researchers present the latest developments in four different clinically relevant areas of research.

AIDS EDUCATION PROGRAM

APA's AIDS Project Office presents a clinical update on HIV/AIDS; discussion of HIV-related CNS complications; and presentations on HIV-related mood, anxiety and sleep disorders, as well as pain syndromes.

CLINICAL CASE CONFERENCES

Clinical material is presented by videotape or the treating therapist. One or more experts then discuss the case. THESE SESSIONS ARE OPEN TO APA MEMBERS ONLY. BLUE REGISTRATION BADGE OR APA MEMBERSHIP CARD REQUIRED FOR ADMITTANCE.

CLINICAL CONSULTATIONS WITH

This format offers an informal setting for members to present their own clinical dilemmas to an expert. There are no formal presentations. Psychiatrists are encouraged to bring their problem cases for an informal discussion. This is the only format at the meeting where there will be an expert to respond to specific clinical cases. These sessions are limited to 25-30 participants on a first-come, first-served basis.

CONTINUOUS CLINICAL CASE CONFERENCES

The presenters will review the progress of psychotherapy in two successive three-hour sessions on consecutive days, Monday-Tuesday, beginning at 9:00 a.m. Audience participation will be encouraged throughout. Participants are requested to attend both sessions in their entirety. THESE SESSIONS ARE OPEN TO APA MEMBERS ONLY. BLUE REGISTRATION BADGE OR APA MEMBERSHIP CARD REQUIRED FOR ADMITTANCE.

COURSES

Courses are designed to emphasize learning experiences that actively involve participants and include the opportunity for informal exchange with the faculty. Offered in four-hour (half-day) and six-hour (full-day) sessions, courses either review basic concepts in a special subject area or present advanced material on a circumscribed topic. Enrollment is limited, and participants must purchase tickets to attend.

DEBATES

Controversial topics in psychiatry will be debated by experts in the field, including psychiatrists and non-psychiatrists. The debate format allows for members to hear both pro and con views about important, interesting and timely concerns for our members. Debates are moderated by someone who has expertise in the particular area. A portion of the time is allocated for questions from the audience to the presenters with active participation by participants.

DISCUSSION GROUPS

This format allows small groups to meet informally with selected experts in psychiatry to discuss topics selected by the experts. Several of these are reserved for residents only. These sessions are limited to 25-30 participants on a first-come, first-served basis.

DSM-IV UPDATE

This program highlights selected topics that are relevant to the *DSM-IV* and are of interest to psychiatrists. Speakers and panel members are chosen for their expertise and leadership in psychiatry.

FORUMS

These are flexible parts of the program that afford the opportunity to highlight and select topics that are of timely interest to psychiatrists. Speakers and panel members are chosen for their expertise and leadership in the field.

LECTURES

Lectures feature a small number of distinguished speakers on scientific and cultural topics. They extend our understanding beyond the usual limits of clinical psychiatry. Lecturers are invited by the Program Committee.

MEDIA PROGRAMS

A media program may involve the showing of a videotape, 16mm film, or computer software demonstration, followed by discussion. Specialized sessions focus on production or consumer/family issues.

MEDICAL UPDATES

These sessions are presented to provide psychiatrists with the latest clinical developments in other areas of medicine. Topics may range from subspecialty areas of adult or pediatric medicine (infectious disease, cardiology, gastroenterology, etc.) to new techniques or procedures in surgery or radiology. The interface between psychiatry and these areas is not necessarily emphasized. The intent is to give participants an update from a physician in a particular specialty.

NEW RESEARCH

This format allows for presentation of the very recent findings obtained from ongoing research. Three types of presentations include: Oral/Slide, twelve-minute presentation with three minutes for discussion; Posters, visual, self-explanatory presentations; and Young Investigators' Sessions, with presentations from young investigators, residents, medical students, and research or clinical fellows.

NIMH WORKSHOP

This workshop clarifies the grantmaking process for psychiatrists contemplating applying for an NIMH grant. During the first half of the workshop, NIMH representatives present a practical, hands-on approach and description of successful grantwriting. The second half of the workshop presents successful recipients of federal grants who discuss their experience in pursuing federal research and research training grants.

PAPER SESSIONS

Paper sessions are oral presentations of papers prepared for submission for publication. In the discussed format, three papers are presented on a similar topic, followed by commentary by a distinguished discussant selected by the Scientific Program Committee. In brief communications, papers are grouped by topic, with floor discussion from the audience following the presentation of each paper. There is no specific discussant for brief communications.

PRESIDENTIAL SYMPOSIUM

This three-hour session, organized by the President or a designee, generally highlights an aspect of the presidential theme for the Annual Meeting.

RESEARCH ADVANCES IN MEDICINE

This new format presents an overview of cutting-edge research in various aspects of medicine. As opposed to the Medical Update series, which is more clinically focused, this session will help participants keep pace with the rapidly expanding knowledge base and technology in various branches of medicine. Several speakers, authorities in their fields, will present on their topics.

RESEARCH CONSULTATIONS WITH

This format provides an opportunity, in a small group setting, for participants to obtain consultations around problems in research from outstanding senior researchers. Participants should come prepared to present a specific problem in research, whether it's one of research design, methodology, subject selection or data analysis, etc., which could be presented briefly to the consultant. These sessions are limited to 25-30 participants on a first-come, first-served basis.

REVIEW OF PSYCHIATRY

There are five, three-and-one-half hour sessions presented each year based on the annual American Psychiatric Press Review of Psychiatry. Each session is chaired by a section editor from the volume, and includes an abridged presentation by each senior author from each of the chapters in each section. The topics are selected each year by the overall editors of the volume, to represent areas of new research, new developments in clinical care, and special issues of importance to APA members.

SOCIAL SECURITY WORKSHOP

Social Security Administration (SSA) officials present the history/background of SSA disability programs (including new legislative initiatives), describe how psychiatrists can best serve applicants for benefits, and review the clinical information required to expedite the disability determination process. Time is allocated for group discussion of evaluation of impairments, what constitutes adequate evidence to support disability decisions, etc.

SYMPOSIA

Symposia are three-hour sessions consisting of four to six presentations that are thematically linked and focus on a specific topic relevant to clinical psychiatry. They are designed to provide comprehensive treatment of a topic or discussion of the topic from several points of view by the participants and stimulate discussion with the audience. Some symposia are supported by industry and are designated as "Industry Supported Symposium" in the *Program Book*.

WORKSHOPS

Workshops are one-and-one-half hour sessions that typically involve brief presentations from individual panel members, followed by the opportunity for lively and informative discussion. This format provides for substantial audience participation and should be highly interactive.

WORKSHOP ON PRIVATE PRACTICE ISSUES

Workshop participants will hear six focused presentations on building and maintaining a private practice, followed by a dialogue between participants and panel members on the "delights and dilemmas of private practice."



Use of the insanity defense in highly publicized cages, especially those in which the defendant's "facqual guit" acoma clear, triggera public outrage and galvanizes societal fears, concerns and ambivalones about the role of psychiatry in the criminal justice system. Michael L. Perlin, J.D., argues that for a clear understanding of how the insanity defense achially works, insight about public attibutes may be more important than examination of technical legal isaues.

Mr. Perlin is Professor of Law at New York Law School in New York City. He formerly was Director of the Division of Montal Haalth Advocacy in the New Jersey Department of the Public Advocate and Deputy Public Defender in charge of the Mercer County (N.J.) Office of the Public Defender. His three-volume treatise, Mental Disability Law, Civil and Criminal, won the 1990 Walter Jeffords Writing Prize. He is also the author of The Jurisprudence of the Insanity Defense and Law and Mental Disability, as well as numerous articles and book chapters. and is Editor in Chief of the bimonthly neweletter, Report on Mental Disability Law. Mr. Perlin sits on the Board of Directors of the International Academy of Law and Mental Health and on the National Advisory Board of the Institute on Mental Disability and Law. He is a graduate of Rutgers University and the Columbia University Law School, where he was a Harlon Piske Stone Scholar

Unfortunately, minorities and women are often underrepresented in psychopharmacological trials. This symposium will explore the data on ethnic and gender variation in pharmacokinetics and pharmacological response, different prescribing patterns and compliance variability in response across genderace, and the issue of accessibility in the pharmacotherapies for minorities.



As it surveys the Beat Generation of the '40s and '50s, the wild energy of the '60s, the disillusionment of the '70s, and the cynicism and confusion of the '80s and '90s through Ginsberg's eyes, the film leaves an indelible portrait of the poet and the eras in which he played a key part in shaping.

Over ten years, filmmaker Jerry Aronson accumulated more than 100 hours of film chronicling Ginsberg's life, including previously unseen material from Ginsberg's archive. He also filmed exclusive interviews with Ginsberg's contemporaries, as well as Ginsberg himself, whose collective voices and images lay bare the essence of the poet, thereby making *The Life and Times of Allen Ginsberg* as unique as Ginsberg's own unflinching view of the world.

Psychiatry at a Crossroad: Our Role in Primary Care

Chp.: Stefan P. Stein, M.D. Co-Chp.: M. Philip Labor, M.D.

The abortam of generalist physicians is a major issue health systems roturn must address, and psychiatry must reevaluate its role in primary care in light of this shortage. Because they are often the only physicians with whom seriously mentally ill people have regular contact, paychintriata should be able to medically evaluate and provide basic primary medical services for patients who lack access to general health care. James H. Share, M.D., describes a new curricular model for primary care training in general paychiatry programs that would prepare public psychiatrists to evaluate and treat the 20 most frequently encountered physical disorders in general practica. He also discusses new opporfunities for dual or triple board certification that combine adult and child psychiatry with primary care pediatrics, family practice, general internal madicine and neurology

Dr. Shore is Professor and Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center and Superintendent of the Colorado Psychiatric Hospital. He is a Director of the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology and in 1994 was its President. He also is Chairperson of the APA Council on Medical Education and Career Development.

A former President of the American Association of Chairmen of Departments of Psychiatry and former Chairman of the Psychiatry Residency Review Committee of the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education, Dr. Shore has been active as a consultant or committee member for the National Institute of Montal Health, the Oregon and Colorado State Mental Health Divisions, and the Indian Health Service. He is the nuther of more than 100 scientific publications and is a member of the Editorial Board of Psychiatric Services (formerly Hospital and Community Psychiatry), A Follow of the American College of Psychiatrists, he received the Commendation Medal from the United States Public Health Service and the AFA's Foundations' Fund Prize for Resourch in Paychiatry. Dr. Shore received his medical degree from Duke University in Durham, North Carolina, completed his medical internality at the University of Utah in Sait Lake City, and completed his residency in psychiatry at the University of Washington in Seattle.

Time, Work and Money: Escaping the Cycle of Work and Spend

Since the end of World War II, Americans have used all the economy's productivity growth to increase the quantity of goods and services for consumption, and none of it to increase leisure time. Since 1969, working hours for employed Americans have risen substantially, leading to a time squeeze in American families. Many Americana are caught in a cycle of 'work and spend," in which employers channel productivity growth into higher income and workers spend and become habituated to increasing standards of living. Juliet B. Schor, Ph.D.; discusses the dynamics of "work and spend" from psychological and economic perspectives. The issues of status consumption, addictive spending and attitudes toward consumption will be addressed using data from a survey of Americans' behaviors and uttitudes in the areas of time, work and money Dr. Schor also discusses "voluntary simplicity," a pattern of consumption adopted by some Americans who roject "work and spend" in favor of increased control over time and reduced Aleming,

Dr. Schor is Senior Lecturer on Economics and Director of Studies for Women's Studies at Harvard University. She is the author of The Overworked American: The Unexpected Decline of Laisure, which was chosen for Princeton University Library's Noteworthy Books in Industrial Relations and Labor Economics in 1991. The book was recognized in 1992 as one of the year's notable books by Hasiness Week, the Los Angeles Times, the Boston Globe, the New York Times and The Progressive. Dr. Schor is also the editor of three books, including The Golden Age of Capitalism, with Stephen A. Marglin, and the author of several professional and popular articles on amployment, consumption and development economics. Currently a member of the Editorial Board of the International Journal

of Applied Economics and of the Advisory Board of the Center for the Study of Commercialism in Washington, D.C., she formerly was Research Advisor on the Project on Global Macropolicy at the United Nations World Institute for Development Economics Research. Dr. Schor received her doctoral degree in economics from the University of Massachusetts.

Ferguson, M.D. Even as health care reform is abandoned nationally, the question remains about the effect of state level reform on psychintric services, and particularly on Black providers and consumers. Policy decisions are made with little input from people of color, and the trend toward managed care and privatization shifts attention to access more than to equity, to cost-containment more than to quality. June Jackson Christmas, M.D., discusses how psychiatry can more effectively contribute to improving the mental health of poor, Black, urban families. Mental health services that address the health, broadly defined, of African-Americans can help ameliorate public health crises, including AIDS, drugs and violence.

Dr. Christmas is the Founder, Chair and Interm Director of the Orban Isaues Group, a research institute conducting policy analysis from the perspective of New Yorkors of African descent. She is Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgions, Professor Emeritie of Behavioral Science at the City University of New York, and a practicing psychintrist. Her research in health services has influenced the development of models for community based psychosocial echabils From 1972 to 1980, Dr. Christmus itation. served as New York City Commissioner of Mental Health, Mental Rotardation and Alcoholism Dr. Christmas hondad Prisident Services. Carter's Transition Group developing policy options for the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and was Executive Coordinator of the Task Panel on Community Support Systems of the President's Commission on Mental Health. She currently sorves on the National Advisory Council of the Center for Mantal Health Services.

A Founding Member of the Hiack Psychiatriats of America, Dr. Christmas is a former President of the American Public Health Association and a former Vice President of the American Psychiatric Association. A Life Follow of the APA, she received the American Public Health Association's Award for Excellence and the award for Outstanding Administrator from the National Association of Health Services Executives, The author of several papers and hook chapters, Dr. Christmas has also written extensively for the general public. She received her medical degree from Boston University School of Medicine and completed her residency in psychiatry at Bellevuo Hospital in New York City. Parallel Processing of Form, Color, Motion and Depth: Anatomy, Physiology, Art and Illusion

Although vision can plausibly be divided into percepts of form, color, depth, movement and other qualities, our perception of any scene usually seems unified. Physiological research on the visual system of primates and studies with dysloxics suggest that visual information processing is indeed subdivided into several largely independent, parallel pathways with distinct functions in the brain. Margaret S. Livingstone, Ph.D., discusses her work in clarifying these distinctions, particularly her findings that fast, low-contrast visual information is carried by the magnocellular subdivision of the visual pathway and slow, high-contrast information by the parvocellular subdivision.

Dr. Livingstone is Professor of Neurobiology at Harvard Medical School. The author of numerous publications on neurotransmitters and the organization of the primate visual system, she has received the Presidential Young Investigator Award, the National Institutes of Health Research Career Development Award, and the Office of Naval Research Young Investigator Award. Dr. Livingstone graduated from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and received her doctorate in neurobiology from Harvard University.

Psychiatric Education and the Future of Psychiatry

Third-party involvement in service delivery has eagead massive alterations in treatment paradigms and practicalities, and these changes have in turn affected education, recruitment and practierne paychlatriata' antiafaction. Some expects question whother psychiatry will curvive, stating that psychiatrists' work can be done by general physicians and nonphysician mental health practitioners, Monrobite, the field has gained remarkable strongth through advances in neuroscience, epidemiology, diagnosis and treatment efficacy, evidence of the cost-effectiveness of treatment and a decrease in the stigma of mental illness. Carolyn B. The story is told through the eyes of Lowell Handler, a photojournalist with TS who traveled around the world taking pictures of others like himself with Tourette's. His photographs and storytelling form the portals for the film's journey into the lives of the people fighting. surviving, and eventually transcending TS, creating a unique perspective of this disorder "from the inside out." The people we meet range from an artist and an actress to an NBA basketball player and a Mennonite lumberiack.

Henry Durger: In the Realms of the Unreal

Henry Darger (1892-1973) lived a double life; by day, junitor, diahwashor, loner; by night, man of action, creator, unread author, unseen artist. Poorly educated, without artistic training, he invented his own narrative and artistic forms to depict the epic history of a parallel universe in which he could be the person he knew himself to be intelligent, creative, compassionate, heroic and truthful. Art historian John M. MacGregor, Ph.D., discusses Darger's life and the work revealed after his death; the vast 15,145 page opic in seven typowritten and hand-bound volumes and eight piles of manuscript, more than 300 watercolor illustrations on tens to 12 foots long acrolls, and an autobiographical novel of more than 10,000 pages written in longhand, as well as a collection of weather journals, books of elippings, disries and letters,

Dr. MacGregor has devoted his teaching and research carear to interdisciplinary studies in psychiatry, psychosnalysis and art. Former Professor of the Psychology of Art at the Ontario College of Art in Thronto, Dr. MacGregor has, since 1995, specialized in the study of psychiatric art and the related fields of l'art brut and outsider art. He is the author of numerous essays, scholarly articles and exhibit catalogues, and two books: The Discovery of the Art of the Insune Princeton University Press, 1989), the only extended study of the history of psychintric art. and Dwight Mackintosh: The Boy Who Time Forgot (Creative Growth Press, 1992), an exploration of mental retardation and art. In 1987 Dr. MacGregor was awarded a Pro Helvetja fellowship to study the work of Adolph Wolfli, the great psychotic artist, in Switzerland. He also received the Ernat Kris Prize of the American Society of the Paychopathology of Expression. Dr. MacGregor received his doctorate from Princeton University. His postdectoral training included atudy at the School of Psychiatry of the Menninger Foundation in Topcka, the C.G. Jung Institute in Zurich, the Taviatock Clinic in London, and with the late Anna Freud at the Hampstend Clinic in Landon. Contribución de los Iberoamericanos a la Historia de la Psiquiatria

Durante los siglos XV y XVI, los ibercamericanos produjeron extensas contribuciones al desarrollo del pensamiento psiquiátrico y a su práctica, que no son bien conocidas en el mundo de habla inglesa. El Dr. Rubén D. Humbaut, M.D., examina sus contribuciones y explora — en su trabajo pionero en este campo — los antecedentes de cuestiones contemporaneas como la de quienes no tienon hogares y las institucionalizaciones que sufrieron.

Los escritos del español Juan Luis Vives, "padre de la psicología moderna", distinguieron los conceptos psicológicos, de los de superstición y religiosidad mal enfocada. Juan de Dios Huarto de San Juan, considerado el primer psicólogo diferencial, realizó tempranas contribuciones en el ámbito de la investigación mental. Gilabert Jofré estableció, en Valencia, España, en 1410, el primer hospital psiquiátrico del mundo occidental. Los Hospitalarios de San Juan, orden religiosa fundada hace más de cuatro siglos por Juan Ciudad Duarte, de Portugal, continúan operando instalaciones psiquiátricas en todo el mundo. En México, Bernardino Alvarez fundó el primer hospital mental del Nuevo Mundo en 1567.

Dr. Kumbout es Profesor Emérito de Psiquiatria en la Facultad de Medicina de Baylor College, sito en Houston. Es además consultor de la Offeina de Audiencias y Apelaciones de la Administración de Seguridad Social, de Houston. Miembro Vitalicio de la American l'avchiatric Association (APA) y Emérito de la American College of Psychiatrists, of Dr. Rumbaut fue parte del Grupo de Estudio Nacional (APA) sobre el Patado de Salud Mental de Hispano-habiantos regidentes en Estados Unidos y también actua romo representante minoritario en la Asambioa de las Sucursales de Distrito, de la APA. En 1982, fue honrado por sus servicios como editor de Newsletter of Hispanic Psychiatrists do la APA (Boletin de Paiquiatras Hispanos) con la L'laca de Reconocimiento de Servicios Abnegados. El Dr. Rumbaut es autor de articulos, capitulos de libros, y criticas bibliográficas sobre temas

científicos e bistóricos, escritos en español e inclés. Es, asimismo, un consumado poeta cuyos trabajon fueron seleccionados para cuatro antologías de la mejor poesia castellana, publicadas por El Editor Latinoamericano en Buenos Aires. En 1994, fue elegido Presidente del Capitulo de Houston del Panamerican Circle of Culture. El Dr. Rumbaut recibió au titulo mèdico on la Universidad de La Habana y completó su capacitación como preceptor en psiquiatria bajo la tutela del psicognalista José Curri, M.D. Asimismo se graduó en la Escucia Nacional de Perjodismo do Cuba y, luego de au llegada a Batadoa Unidos en 1960, continuó su capacitación superior en palquiatria en la Escuela Menninger de Pelouiatria de Topolos. rsta sesión será audiograbada.

What is Paychiatey All About?

Psychiatry has struggled throughout its history to decide what it is about. Various psychiatric echople take different positions, highlighting brain, society, higher human purposes such as goals or ideals, and lower once such as drives or instincts. Psychiatry's most striking clinical aderrasos — foinit vo treatments for the effects of neurosyphilis and for psychoses related to vitamin deliciencies — occurred early in this century, and were largely coded to naurology and medicine. Leston Havens, V.D., examines psychiatry's continued struggle to deline itself. In the 1980s the debate centers on a rapidly evolving neuroscience that may soon provide graphic measures of normal psychological functions and inspire respect for symbolic formations

Dr. Havens is Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School, Principal Psychiatrist and Director of the Psychiatric Residency Training Program at Cambridge Hospital, and Faculty Member at the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Insutute. His first publication in 1955 described his discovery of ammonia psychosis. He received the first A.B. Bennett Award from the Society of Biological Psychiatry in 1958, and shortly after, he and Dr. Gerald Klerman published the initial studies on the offects of phenothiazines on normal subjects. Dr. Havens is the author of more ikan 100 scientific papers, bask chapters and reviews. His six books include Approaches to the Mind: Movement of the Psychiatric Schools From Sects Toward Science, Making Contact: Uses of Language in Psychotherapy and Coming to Life. He is a member of the Editorial Boards of the Hillside Journal of Clinical Psychiatry and the American Journal of Psychotherapy. A graduate of Cornell University Medical School, Dr. Havens completed an internship in internal medicine at New York Hospital and residency in

psychiatry at Boston Psychopathic Hospital. He received his psychoanalytic training at the Boston Psychoanalytic Society and Institute.

Childhood Trauma and Psychodynamic Psychiatry: A Timely Reunion

One hundred years ago, psychodynamic psychiatry began its evolution with Freud's seminal work on hysteria. Freud regarded childhood seduction as a causative factor, and treatment relied on this theory of traumatic cliplogy. In the 20th century, dynamic psychiatry spread widely from its roots in trauma, for many years focusing on the rele of fantagy. In discussing the current reunion of childhood trauma and paychodynamic psychiatry, Glan O. Carbard, M.D., focuses on the unique contributions of psycholymamic understanding and treatment to adult psychiatric patienta who have experienced childhood trauma. in addition, transference and countertransference in the doctor-patient relationship provide a laboratory in which to directly observe unconscious, repetitive patterns of internal object relations.

Dr. Gabbard is Bessie Walker Callaway Distinguished Professor of Psychoanalysis and Education at the Karl Menninger School of Psychiatry and Mental Health Sciences. He is also Training and Supervising Analyst at the Topoka Institute for Psychoanalysis and Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Kansas School of Medicine in Wichita.

He has written or edited nine books, including Management of Countertransference with Borsterline Patients and Sexual Reploitation in Professional Relationships. He served as Editor-in-Chief of Treatments of Psychiatric Disorders: The DSM-IV Edition. Dr. Cabbard is the author of more than 120 scientific papers and book chapters. He currently serves as Associate Editor of the Journal of the American Psychoanalytic Association and as a member of the Editorial Board of American Psychiatric Press, Inc., among others. He is a member of the Ethics Committee and the Committee on the Practice of Psycho-

therapy of the American Psychiatric Association, and the Task Force on Sexual Misconduct of the American Medical Association. His numerous awards and honors include the 1994 Edward A. Strecker Award of the Institute of the Pennsylvania Hospital and the Sigmund Freud Award of the American Society of Psychoanalytic Physicians. Dr. Gubbard received his medical degree from Rush Medical College in Chicago, completed his revidency in psychiatry at the Karl Menninger School of Psychiatry, and received his psychoanalytic training at the Topeka Institute for Psychoanalysis.

41 Love Makes a Family: Gay Parents in the 90s (16 minutes)

Our concepts of what a family is have been undergoing radical changes in recent years. If the image of the hardworking husband with his nurturing wife and their 2.4 children, dog and station wagon ever really was the norm, it is so no longer. More and more women are working, and more men are getting involved in childcare and homemaking. Some parents are having fewer children, or are having them later in life, and a great many more children are growing up in single parent families. We are also learning that some families are, and probably always have been, composed of gay parents and their children.

In this new video documentary, we meet a lesbian single mother who shares parenting with the gay father of her son; a lesbian couple, one of whom is deaf, who care for the children of one of them by a previous marriage; and a gay male couple with two adopted sons. Also interviewed are a clinical psychologist and a therapist who deal with gay families and their children. The program will be enormously supportive of any family which has members who are gay, and will be a valuable tool for increasing the awareness and understanding of the general public.

42 Other Families

(49 minutes)

This provocative new video explores the perceptions and feelings of seven adults, from ages 18 to 40, who were raised by lesbian mothers. It confronts the question so frequently asked by skeptics of today's new (or newly acknowledged) family structures: "Sure, it looks fine now, but how are the kids going to turn out?" At least to judge by these seven interviews, the answer is that they've turned out just fine: with some problems, to be sure, but the only problems that all seven share are those arising from the need they or their parents felt to keep secrets from a society that did not accept their kind

of family. Three of those interviewed are themselves gay, four identify themselves as heterosexual. Producer Dorothy Chvatal is a nurse, a social worker, and the coparent of a grown daughter. As she says, "I think you create your family. Some of them may be blood and some of them may be relationships you've worked on over the years. It's who you love and who supports you and nurtures you: That's family."

43 From a Secret Place

(40 minutes)

Adolescence is a turbulent time for anyone, but it may be particularly difficult for teenagers struggling to come to terms with gay or lesbian sexual identities. In this new video, six young people speak eloquently about the process of coming out. Some were rejected by friends or harassed at school, yet others were surprised at the acceptance they received. All now express a growing pride and increased self-esteem. Also interviewed are three supportive parents and a psychotherapist. This is an outstanding tool for sensitizing parents, educators and the public to the unique struggles of this population, and provides helpful perspectives for other gay and lesbian teens.

When Women Kill is a powerful documentary that places the personal stories of three battered women in a legal/historical context. Ann Jones, an authority on women and criminal justice and author of Women Who Kill, explains the evolution of society's attitude towards women who murder abusive spouses. In 18th century England, such women were considered to have committed treason and burned at the stake. In the Victorian era, women who poisoned their husbands were declared insane and acquitted on that defense. The battered women's syndrome, first formulated in 1979, is still the old insanity argument in new language. By focusing on the "helpless woman," it does not address the many women who try to leave their relationships and It does not focus on the continue to be harassed. violence of the batterers.

In this video we meet three women who tell why they killed. One speaks from prison where she is serving a seven-year sentence. Their stories are horrific as they relate the years of beatings, torture, humiliations and violent attacks on their person and property.

There are also sequences of counselling groups for violent men, which provide trenchant insight into why male violence continues and why initiatives taken by the police and the courts often fail. This shatteringly powerful film exposes the obstacles facing women who live with batterers and challenges the social and legal institutions that confront the widespread pattern of violence against women.

You won't see them on street corners, hand held out for change. At first glance you would not even realize that they are women without homes. They are clean, educated, well-groomed and articulate. They live invisibly throughout society, the hidden homeless.

It Was a Wonderful Life follows the stories of six different hidden homeless women as they struggle to survive, one day at a time, and find a place for themselves in a society ill-equipped to deal with the "used to haves."

Many of the women were left in financial straits following a divorce, loss of a job or a long illness, and were reduced to living out of their cars. Their clothes, dogs and whatever remains of their former lives are packed in the back seat. Few receive welfare or any other form of assistance. They eke out an existence picking up bits of work here and there. The women avoid public shelters where they might be raped or robbed, preferring to sleep in their cars, or find temporary shelter with friends.





Psychiatric practice must contend with paradigmatic shifts that have occurred in its organization and financing, in the settings in which it takes place, and in definitions of expertise and appropriate professional relationships. Despite these changes, clinical practice still relies on knowledge of patients' assets and problems and a dedication to healing. In this presentation Boris M. Astrachan, M.D., discusses these onduring foundations of clinical practice and suggests ways psychiatric leaders and educators can meet the challenging changes in practice while retaining the values and remaining constants of the profession.

Dr. Astruchan is Professor and Head of the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Illinois in Chicago. Recent Discoveries in Schizophrenia

The past decade has soon a striking increase in the quality and quantity of research on schizophrenia. William E. Funney, Jr., M.D., discusses recent advances in three major areas: 1) evidence for a neurodevelopmental defect associated with schizophrenia; 2) brain circuitry and associated structures related to psychosis; and 3) the interactive role of the critical neurotransmittens, dopamine and glutamate in schizophrenia.

Dr. Bunney is Olstinguished Professor and Director of Research in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of California at Irvine College of Medicine. At the National Institute of Mental Health, where he held several positions from 1960 until 1982, his research helped establish the therapeutic usefulness of lithium carbonate in manic-dongasiva ilmass. He serves on the Mon-(a) Haulth Advisory Council for the World Health Organization, the Scientific Advisory Boards of tha National Alliance for Research in Schlzaphre: nia and Depression and the National Depressive and Manic Depressive Association, and the Extramural Science Advisory Board of the National Institute of Mental Health. The nuthor of more than 300 scientific articles and book chapters and the editor of several books. Dr. Bunney is the Associate Editor of The Neuroscientist and serves on the Editorial Boards of several journals, including Psychlatry Research, Human Neurobiology and *Neuropsychopharmacology*. An independent survey of 15 years of scientific citations (1965 to [980) reported that Dr. Bunney was one of only five psychiatrists among the 1,000 most frequently cited researchers from all fields. Dr. Burney is a recipiont of the APA's Rush Gold Medal Award and Holheimer Research Award, the McAlpin Mantal Health Association Research Achievement Award, the Distinguished Service Modal from the United States Public Health Service, and the International Anna-Monika Award for Paychiatric Research. He is a Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and the American College of Neuropsychophar. macology, a Follow of the Collegium Internationale Neuro-Psychopharmacologicum, and Past President of the latter two organizations. He was elected to the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences in 1986 and served as Co-Chair of the Institute's Division on Bio-

A Morning with Jamaica Kincaid

Jamaica Kincald is a novelist and author of essays and short stories. Her work has appeared in The New Yorker, Rolling Stone and The Paris Review. Born and educated in Antigua, in the West Indies, Ms. Kincaid came to the United States at age 16 and worked as an au pair in New York City. She studied photography at the New School for Social Research in New York City and at Franconia College in New Hampshire. In the early 1970s she established herself as a writer when several magazines for teenagers published her articles. She became a staff writer for The New Yorker in 1976.

Ms. Kinemid's first book, At the Bottom of the River (Farrar, Straus, & Giroux, 1983), a series of short stories, won the Morton Dauwen Zabel Award from the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters and was nominated for the PEN/Faulkner Award. The book includes one of her most popular stories, "Girl," a langthy single sentence that consists almost entirely of a mother's preachy instructions and reminders to her daughtor. The story was first published in *The New Yorker* in 1978. Although Mw. Kincaid's work draws on her childhood in Antigua, particularly her emotional bond with her mother, her direct, unsentimental depictions of the inner experience of growing up transcend the bounduries of place and time. These thomas carry through in her other book-length works of fiction: Annie John, a short-story cycle about a girl's coming of age in Antigua (Farrar, Straus, & Giroux, 1985), which was one of three finalists for the 1985 Ritz Paris Hemingway Award; and Lucy (Parrar, Straus, & Ciroux, 1990), a novel about a West, Indian girl living as an au pair in the United States. Ms. Kineald is also the author of the nonfiction work, A Small Place (Farrer, Straus, 1988), an extended casny about the harmful effects of colonialism in Antigua. She liven with her husband and children in Vermont.

Poet Patrick Lane grew up with an emotionally distant father, with whom he never had a single conversation. He set fire to his father's wheat field, glad to endure the beating just to get his father's attention for once. A mysterious disorder that is sapping away the energy of its victims, altering lives and ruining careers, is gradually being recognized, if not understood. Named Chronic Fatigue Syndrome, it affects men and women of all ages. The symptoms include disabling fatigue, sore throat, enlarged spleen, muscular pain, sleep disturbances and headaches. Patients go from doctor to doctor, often getting conflicting diagnoses.

Betty Johnson, a former executive vice president at IBM, has had it for 11 years. When she had trouble getting out of bed and was becoming forgetful, she realized she had better retire from the working world. As many other victims, she suffers from depression, loss of selfesteem and despair.

Doctors from Toronto to Boston to Glasgow are wrestling with the elusive disorder. They are still unsure if it is caused by bacteria, fungus or virus, and what its relationship is to sleep and immune system disorders. Some progress has been made in alleviating the symptoms, and research continues. Health and mental health professionals will find this a useful presentation to understand how it affects patients' lives and what the current research has uncovered.

When Behavior Mirrors DNA: Huntington's Disease As a Teacher

Huntington's Disease is one of a group of neurological disorders caused by expanding trinucleotide repeats in DNA. Carriers of the gene for Huntington's Disease can be identified with great accuracy, but the disease itself remains untreatable. Nancy S. Wexler, Ph.D., describes recent findings in research on Huntington's Disease and discusses issues in counseling families in which the gene for the Disease appears.

Dr. Wexler is Higgins Professor of Neuropsy: chology in the Departments of Neurology and Psychiatry of the College of Physicians and Surgeons at Columbia University and President of the Hereditary Disease Foundation. Her most important scientific contributions have been family studies of Huntington's Disease, which led to the discovery of the gene for the Disease and to the development of a test that identifies carriers of the gene before the onact of symptoms. Dr. Waxler is a Member of the Advisory Committee to the Human Genome Conter at Lawrence Herkeley Laboratories and Chair of the Joint Ethical, Legal, and Social Issues Working Group on the Human Genome of the National Institutes of Health and Department of Energy. She is also a Member of the External Advisory Committee for the Human Genome Organization and cochairs the organization's Ethical, Legal, and Social Issues Committee: A Fellow of the Hastings Center, Dr. Wexler is a Member of the Board of Directors of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and a Trustee of the Foundation for Care and Cure of Huntington's Disease. She has been awarded the Fulbright Fellowship, the National Institutes of Health Directors Award, the Living Legacy Award from the Women's International Society, the Albert Lasker Public Service Award, and the J. From 1936 to 1984 Basie led one of the most enduring swing bands of all time. Today his legacy lives on, his band still on the road, generating the good time, foottapping atmosphere that has always been synonymous with his name.

Looking for a Space examines the cultural, political and historical reasons behind the persecution of lesbians and gay men during the early years of the Revolution, and takes a fresh look at this issue from the perspectives of Cubans who are living on the island today.

We meet a diverse group of people, from a wide range of age groups and occupations, who express differences of opinion. Older people recall the repression of the late 1960s when gay people were sent to "UMAP" camps for "re-education." During the Mariel boatlift of 1980, many gay people were seen as "counterrevolutionary" for fleeing the country. Neurodevelopmental Insights into Psychiatric Disorders

Research with psychiatrically ill children progents advantages for understanding paychiatric linese in adults, including less learned behavior among child subjects, less heterogeneity of samples, and botter access to data about family cuthology. Pediatric studies allow researchers to examine brain atructure and function during a period of continuing central nervous system meturation, providing more direct exploration of neurodevelopmental theories of adult-onset disorder that predict alterations in developmental trajectories, Judith L. Rapoport, M.D., discussos research on attention-delicit/hyperactivity disorder and on childhood onset achizophrenia that shows highly specific and marked distortion of normal anatomical development of the brain. Of particular interest are striking patterns of abnormality in the basal ganglia, suggesting new roles for the highly avolved brain structures.

Dr. Rapoport is Chief of the Child Psychiatry Branch of the Division of Intramural Research Programs at the National Institute of Mental Health, Clinical Professor of Psychiatry and Pediatrics at Georgetown University Medical School, and Professor of Paychiatry at George Washington University School of Medicine in Washington, D.C. She has written or coauthored three professional books and more than 250 research journal articles. Her book on OCD, The Boy Who Couldn't Stop Washing (1989), was a New York Times Best Seller and greatly furthered public and professional awareness of the disorder. She is Associate Editor of Psychopharmacology Bulletin, Corresponding Editor of the Journal of Child Psychology and Psychiatry and Allied Disciplines, and serves on the Editorial Hoards of several journals, including the American Journal of Psychiatry, Archives of General Psychiatry and Journal of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry. A Fellow of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology, Dr. Rapoport received the APA's Dianche F. Ittleson Award for Regearch in Child Psychiatry and the APA Award for Research in Psychiatry A graduate of Harvard Madical School, Dr. Rapoport received her clinical training in paychiatry at the Massachusetts Mental Health Center in Boston and at Children's Hospital in Washington, D.C., and her research training at the Karolinska Hospital in Stockholm and at the Laboratory of Psychology at the National Institute of Mental Haalth in Betheada, Maryland.

Fitness to Practice Medicine: A Question of Impairment, Not Mental Illness

Medical examiners have the right to inquire about physicians' character and fitness to practice, but many examining boards incorrectly equate inquiries in these areas with inquiries about mental illness and a history of consulting mental boulth professionals. Advences in psychiatric diagnosis and epidemiology indicate that about 28 percent of the population suffers from a mental disorder. About one-half of those persons consult with a mental health professional, and about one-third have some functional impairment. Half of those who seek consultation from mental health professionals have no mental illness. Ronald A. Shellow, M.D., discusses the implications of these distinctions for medical

licensuro. Because fitness to practice is affected by impairment, not by mental illness per se, questions about mental illness on licensing applications are inappropriate.

Dr. Shellow, Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Miami School of Medicine, has been in the solo practice of paychistry since 1961. A Past Speaker of the Assembly of the American l'avchiatric Association. Dr. Shollow is committe Chair of APA's Joint Commission on Government Relations, a member of APA's Work Group on the Harvard Resource-Based Relative Value Scale Study, and Vice-Chair of the American Medical Association's Section Council on Psychiatry, A Fellow of the American College of Paychiatrists. he has been President of his local and state psychiatric societies. This videotape series is an educational initiative of the South Texas Area Health Education Center to increase the cultural sensitivity of mental health providers of rural areas of Texas, with its focus on the city of Laredo. Although targeted at the population of the Rio Grande Valley, the information and tools presented can be applied to Hispanics in other regions of the country. The series is composed of four videotapes and a manual. Videotape I (Hispanics) provides background information and describes the particular characteristics of the population of Laredo, using a semi-ethnographics approach through the interview of key informants (lay public, community leaders, teachers, and health providers). Videotape II (Psychosis) and Videotape III

(Depression) illustrate important aspects of the crosscultural interview and identify salient cultural variations in the expression of psychopathology. A multidisciplinary team composed of psychiatrists, psychologists, nurses and social workers discusses each clinical vignette and draws upon clinical experience to identify practical tools to improve communication. Videotape IV (Interpreters) demonstrates the appropriate use of interpreters. To provide a culturally syntonic atmosphere, the work of local Mexican-American artists (writers, painters and musicians) was included.

63 Cross-Cultural Therapeutic Alliance: The African-American Client

The most critical instrument in the therapy process is the relationship that develops between patient and therapist. In the initial engagement, patient and therapist come together in hopes of developing a rapport based upon trust, a sense of safety and empathic understanding. When the patient and therapist are of different races, establishing this rapport can be difficult. This video offers strategies for recognizing and dealing with factors that may interfere with establishing this therapeutic alliance. Irma J. Bland, M.D., associate professor of psychiatry at Louisiana State University Medical Center, discusses the elements that may be unrecognized or unresolved and their impact on the therapy process.

Critical stages in the formation of the therapeutic alliance are illustrated in a case study involving an African-American client and a White therapist. Demonstrated are ways to recognize when perceptions or previous experiences of racism may negatively influence the therapeutic process.

This video shows Dr. Tinnin conducting a brief videotherapy, *Time-Limited Trauma Therapy*, with a patient who survived a serious auto accident. This treatment is designed not only for traumatized patients

with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, but also Dissociative Disorder, Borderline Personality Disorder, Somatization Disorder, Conversion Disorder, or Post-Traumatic Psychosis. It is based on the concept of traumatic dissociation originally described by Pierre Janet. The first phase of treatment is designed to resolve the patient's traumatic memories. The second phase addresses the trauma-related behavior patterns.

The brevity of this approach is made possible by the use of videotechnology to concentrate the therapeutic therapy sessions. The videotherapy begins with a form of trauma work, recursive anamnesis, that uses the video camera and VCR as basic therapeutic tools. Dr. Tinnin demonstrates the initial dissociative anamnesis and shows how the review of the tape of this session is videotaped and recursively reviewed to promote conscious assimilation of the trauma narrative. He also demonstrates the nonverbal anamnesis using the patient's drawings. Excerpts from the final six sessions of trauma psychotherapy dealing with the patient's victim mythology complete the videotape demonstration.

traces the complex social and political factors that shaped America's passive response to the Holocaust. The video relates America's reaction to European Jews clamoring for rescue through the moving story of Kurt Klein, who struggled with State Department red tape to free his parents from Eastern Europe.

68 A Place to Save Your Life: The Shanghai Jews

Juxtaposing interviews with survivors with archival photographs, this film recounts the days when Jews lived in China under Japanese rule. Although the Japanese forced the exiles into a ghetto, they did not follow Hitler's extermination plan. Shanghai indeed became a place of refuge.





Brain Waves and Brain Wiring

Neural connections in the adult central nervous system are highly precise, but they develop from an immature pattern of wiring that only grossly approximates the adult pattern. For example, at the beginning of fetal development, the various neural structures in the visual system are quite distant from one another. Yet, as they grow, they array themselves in the correct topographic fashion, and initially diffuse connections are fine-tuned. Carla J. Shatz, Ph.D., discusses research about how the connections between the retina, the lateral genicultate nucleus, and the primary visual cortex are established during prenatal life.

Dr. Shatz in Class of 1943 Professor of Neurobiology at the University of California, Berkeley. Her basic research in brain development and function has implications for a better underutanding of what goes awry during human fetal development and for deciphering the roots of neurological disordera such as cerebral palsy. epilepsy and dyslexia. She has received many honors in recognition of her work, including the Society for Neuroscience Young Investigator Award and the Silvio Conte Award from the National Foundation for Brain Research. Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, Dr. Shatz is currently President of the Society for Neuroscience. She is also a Howard Hughes Medical Institute Investigator, an honor reserved for the nation's top 275 blomedical researchers. Dr. Shatz is the author of numerous acientific articles and the editor of two booklength works: Development of the Visual System (MIT Press, 1991) and Nauronal Cell Death (a special issue of the Journal of Neurobiology, 1992). A member of the Editorial Boards of several journals, including Trends in Neuroscience. International Journal of Neuroscience and Cerebral Cortex, she is also a member of the Commission on Life Sciences of the National Research Council. Dr. Shatz received her doctorate in neurobiology and received her postdoctoral training at Harvard University.

Cognitive Dysfunction in Adolescents with Conduct Disturbance: Implications for Treatment

Adolescents with conduct disorders have a high incidence of comorbid attention-defict/hypersectivity disorder and learning disorders, lioth of which have genetic and organic components. Clinical observations suggest that adolescents with conduct disorders also may have cognitive dysfunctions that interfere with judgment, interpersonal relationships and behavior. William H. Ayres, M.D., examines the value of individual psychotherapy using cognitive behavioral techniques as part of a multimodal approach to helping adolescents with conduct disorder master their behavioral difficulties.

Dr. Ayres is Clinical Associate Professor at the University of California at San Francisco and is in private prectice, limited to adolescente and thair families, in San Mateo, California, Current President of the American Academy of Child and Adoloscont Psychiatry, Dr. Ayres is also a member of the American Psychiatric Association's Steering Committee on Practice Guidelines and of the APA's Work Group on Codes and Reimbursements and Work Group on the Harvard Resource Based Relative Value Scale Study. Taking the Psyche Out of Psychiatry: The Case of Hindu Medicine

The poet-philosophers of ancient India were intrigued by the nature of the experience of the body and the self. Ancient Indian medicine, Avuryeda, developed in tandem with philosophical and religlous thought, but the religious and medical systems eventually separated and became antagonistic. The Ayurvedic physician viewed the treatment of psychiatric iliness in humoral terms. Organic therapeutic interventions sought to restore the balance of humoral and hodily substances, whereas psychotherspectic interventions fell outside the medical arena. The task of addressing the mind and the self belonged to the religious elite and aptribud hanlars. Indian traditions for restoration of the self through meditative reflection yielded profound insights into the human condition, but these practices had little affect on psychiatric medicine. Prakash N Deant, M.D., discusses the development of ancient Indian modicing as a case example of what happens when the payche is taken out of paychiatric medicine.

Dr. Desai is Professor of Psychiatry and Associate Dean of the Culiege of Medicine at the University of Illinois in Chicago. He is also Chief of Staff at the Veterans Affaira Weat Side Medical Center in Chicago. A Follow of the American Psychiatric Association, Dr. Desai is Chairperson of the APA's Caucus of International Medical Graduates and a member of the APA's Committee on International Education and Committee on Veterans Affairs. He is the author of Health and Medicine in the Hindu Tradition (Crossroads, 1989), as well as several hook chapters and scientific papers. A former president of both the National Association of VA Chiefs of Psychiatry and the American Association of South Asian Psychiatriats. Dr. Dosni has been a consultant to the Office of the Prime Minister of India on Tochnology Missions. Dr. Desai received his medical degree from the University of Baroda in India and completed his residency in psychiatry at Northwestern University in Chicago.




