On behalf of the Scientific Program Committee I should like to welcome you to the 135th Annual Meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. The quality and quantity of your submissions have made it a most rewarding year for the Scientific Program Committee.

I am happy to announce that there will be both Film and Video programs this year. Also, because they were so successful last year, three formats introduced in New Orleans will be included in this year's program: the Scientific Debates, the Discussion Groups, and the New Research Poster Sessions.

Two programs will be introduced for the first time this year. One is the Annual Review Program which will present half-day and full-day in-depth discussions of five topics in psychiatry each year. The *American Journal of Psychiatry* does not hold first refusal rights for any papers presented at the Annual Meeting, including special lectures and papers presented at regular sessions, new research sessions, issue workshops, or evening panels; however, authors may submit them for publication if they wish. The *Journal* will accept for review only papers that are in final form and conform to the requirements listed in "Information for Contributors" (in the January and April 1982 issues and available on request).

Hospital & Community Psychiatry, APA's interdisciplinary journal, is directed primarily at professional staff members in mental health facilities and agencies. *H&CP* welcomes the submission of Annual Meeting papers, either singly or with the papers of other symposium participants for consideration as a special section. All papers must be in final form, ready for blind peer review. The journal's "Information for Contributors" is published several times a year in *H&CP* and is also available on request.

It is the policy of both journals to publish only original material that has not been published elsewhere in any form and that is not being considered for publication elsewhere.

TO PARTICIPATE IN THE 1983 ANNUAL MEETING

To present a scientific paper, request a symposium, course, issue workshop, video, or film at the 1983 APA Annual Meeting in New York City, April 30-May 6, 1983, obtain a Form for Proposed Contributions in the publications display of the Membership Resource Center or the Scientific Program Office. The form contains complete instructions. However, PLEASE NOTE NOW that all proposals for the 1983 meeting must be in the Office of the Chairperson of the Scientific Program Committee by **August 16, 1982**. Otherwise they cannot and will not be processed for the Committee's consideration. Also, the full text and abstract must accompany the proposed paper submission.

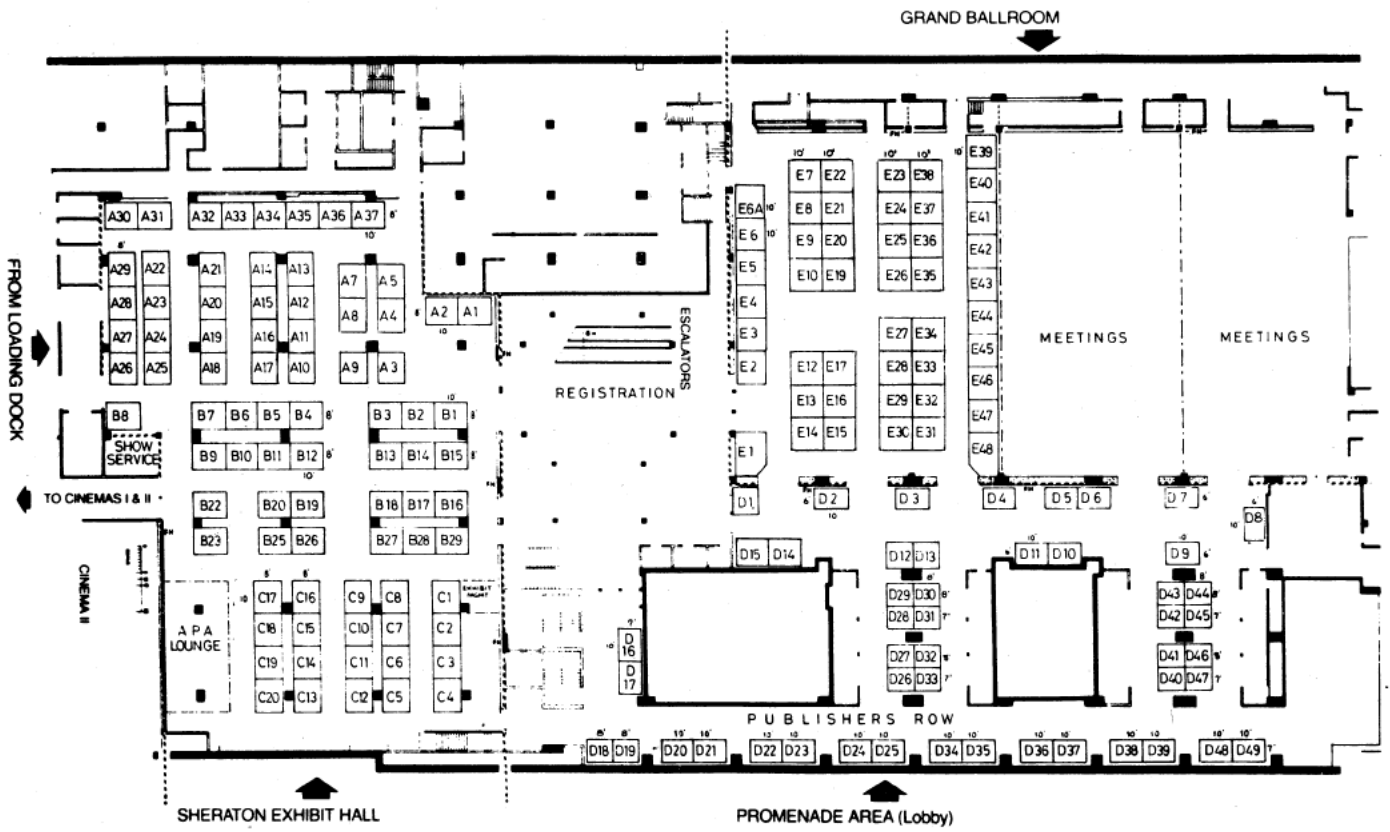
CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT

The American Psychiatric Association is accredited by the Accreditation Council on Continuing Medical Education (ACCME) to sponsor continuing medical education for physicians, and the official Annual Meeting program, with a few exceptions, meets the criteria for continuing medical education Category I credit. One hour of credit may be claimed for each hour of participation. As an organization accredited for continuing medical education activities, the American Psychiatric Association certifies that the continuing medical education activities designated as Category I meet the criteria for Category I for the Physician's Recognition Award of the American Medical Association. Continuing medical education sessions are open to all meeting registrants.

All program activities are designated either Category I or Category II; these include courses, symposia, paper sessions, special lectures, panels, and issue workshops. Two 2-day and one 1½-day courses on Saturday-Sunday, May 15-16, six courses and nine symposia on Sunday, May 16, may also be taken for additional Category I credit. Half-day courses have been scheduled throughout the week from 8:00 A.M. to 12 Noon and/or 2:00 P.M. to 6:00 P.M. Full-day courses will be offered on Sunday from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., and on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 10:15 A.M. to 5:15 P.M. An additional 1½-day course will be offered on Thursday from 10:15 A.M. to 5:15 P.M., and on Friday from 8:00 A.M. to 12 Noon. All full-day courses have a one-hour break for lunch.

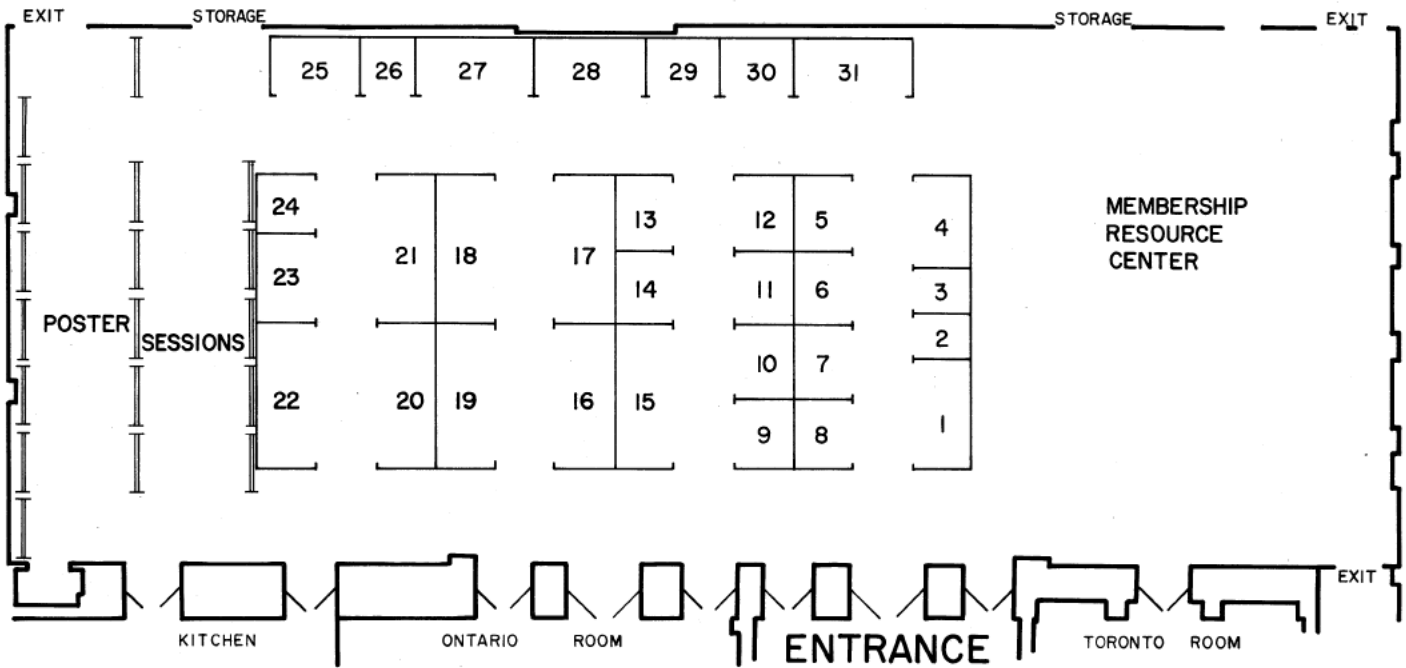
TAPE RECORDING POLICY

PSYCHOPHYSIOLOGIC AND BIOBEHAVIORAL FACTORS AND SUDDEN DEATH

Bernard Lown, M.D.

Dr. Lown is Professor of Cardiology at the Harvard School of Public Health and Physician at the Brigham and Women's Hospital. A graduate of the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine, he obtained his clinical training at Yale and the Montefiore Hospital in New York before beginning a research and teaching career at Harvard over 25 years ago.

His work has led to current understanding in managing heart attack victims and to more precise use of the cardiac drug, digitalis. He introduced DC defibrillation for cardiopulmonary resuscitation, cardioversion for the termination of diverse arrhythmias, thump-version for dealing with cardiac arrest, and lidocaine for control of ventricular arrhythmias in the victims of myocardial infarction. Dr. Lown also introduced the concept of transient risk factors which trigger ventricular fibrillation. His research has generated extensive data in support of a role for biobehavioral and psychophysiologic factors in sudden cardiac death.

She has completed her studies towards a doctoral degree at the University of Paris, and has spent time conducting applied social research. After serving as Executive Secretary of the Royal Commission on the Status of Women in Canada, she was appointed to the Cabinet as Minister of National Revenue, which led, one year later, to appointment as Minister of National Health and Welfare.

Her priorities as Minister include the reform of the pension system, the improvement of health care for natives, an increase in child benefit programs and the preservation and strengthening of Canada's Medicare system, as well as continuing support for medical research.

Dr. MacLean has been Chief of the Laboratory of Brain Evolution and Behavior at NIMH since 1971, where his investigations have focused on forebrain mechanisms underlying genetically constituted emotional behaviors. This activity follows on earlier research at Yale on brain mechanisms of emotion. Dr. MacLean's pathway into medicine originated in philosophy and philosophical studies of the human mind at Yale. After a year of study in Edinburgh, he returned to Yale and completed his M.D. in 1940. World War II found him in New Zealand doing research on the diphtheria bacillus as a cause of tropical ulcers. He also conducted research on psychomotor epilepsy and published a paper on the "visceral brain," now known as the "limbic system," a term he introduced in 1952.

One of the only "English" Canadian films to garner significant American success, *Duddy Kravitz* is based on Mordecai Richler's fictional remembrances of Montreal's St. Urbain Street, a Jewish ghetto in the 40's. The novel created a minor scandal upon its release. Just as many American Jews objected to Philip Roth's *Portnoy*, members of the Canadian Jewish community took strong exception to Richler's astringent portrait of a Montreal Sammy Glick, hustling his way out of his narrow environs. Elsewhere, Jewish and Gentile critics alike hailed *Duddy Kravitz* as a graphic account of the Canadian immigrant experience, a theme not often dealt with in Canadian *belles lettres* at that time. *Duddy Kravitz* quickly became a best seller, and is now regarded as a classic and required reading in schools. A friend of Richler's, Ted Kotcheff, with whom he shared

Produced by the National Film Board of Canada, this film is a thought-provoking chronicle of two women, Bonnie Sherr-Klein, the director of the film, and Linda Lee Tracey, a Montreal stripper who set out together to explore the world of peep shows, strip joints, and sex supermarkets. Both are motivated by the desire to know more about pornography—why it exists, the forms it takes and how it affects the relations between men and women. The film contains interviews with people who earn their living in the porn trade, and with some of the most outspoken critics.

Not A Love Story is clearly a voice against pornography. The film contains some sexually explicit scenes, all carefully chosen to illustrate what is available and to give the viewer an opportunity to evaluate the impact of pornographic imagery on our society. When the robber attempts to intimidate his 'silent partner' into parting with his end of the take, the teller resists with unexpected craftiness. The impact of his adversary's sinister persona mobilizes latent reserves of courage, criminality, and carnality in the hero, until he triumphs over middle-class morality in a quirky final shoot-out.

The film stars Elliot Gould, Christopher Plummer, Sarah Miles, and a sensationally sensual Canadian actress, Celine Lomes. A bracing remedy to the recent glut of empty super-productions, *The Silent Partner* offers the rewards of the well-crafted small "B" pictures of the 40's—strong characterizations, a suspenseful story line, something poignant and not a little subversive to say about trapped people trying to break free from an oppressive status quo.

The Silent Partner received several major awards in Canada, where it was produced and filmed. It opened and closed quickly to mixed American reviews, then acquired a strong underground reputation. One brief scene of violence will be problematic for the sensitive viewer. The film also contains some strong language and sexual material. Not recommended for children.

In a not too distant future, the "Nostromo," an intergalactic towing vessel, returns to Earth from a mining mission. An acoustic beacon is encountered, beaming a distress signal from a nearby planetoid. An exploring party stumbles upon an eldritch menace within a strange space craft, and an even more monstrous secret is disclosed lurking within the crew's midst. Tautly directed and edited, *Alien* features a fine cast of largely unknown actors, and spectacular special effects including the most believable and frightening extraterrestrial ever assembled.

Alien cunningly re-invents the stylistic conventions and psychological concerns of earlier weird masterpieces in outer space. It is also an elegant representative of an immensely popular sub-genre of 'cruel' or 'hardcore' horror films, pictures which are unsparingly hurtful to the viewer, and often derisively nihilistic in their appraisal of traditional American virtues. Other examples of cruel cinema to be discussed will include *Psycho*, *The Exorcist*, *The Omen*, *Halloween*, *Friday The Thirteenth*, *Texas Chainsaw Massacre*, and the George Romero *Dead Trilogy*.

Although *Alien* contains little on-screen mayhem, two brief sequences may be extremely distressing to sensitive viewers. The film is not recommended for children.
