Position Statement on Newborn Infant Adoptions

The American Psychiatric Association strongly recommends that decision making in the newborn adoptive process should be made in the best interest of the child according to the current knowledge of child development.

The decision to relinquish a newborn child for adoption should take into account the biological parent's competence to make the decision and their need for adequate time and support to make the appropriate decision.

It must also take into account the adoptive parents' and child's needs to build secure attachments and stable relationships with each other as early as possible.

Finalization of the adoption must be as timely as possible. Once the adoption is finalized, it should be inviolate. Disruption of the adoptive family relationship must be considered only under the same criteria applied to disruptions in a biologically intact family.
