Dear Colleagues and Guests:

On behalf of the Scientific Program Committee, I should like to welcome you to the 134th Annual Meeting of the American Psychiatric Association. It has been a difficult year for the Committee because of the intense conflict the ERA boycott has aroused in so many of its members. We are also saddened by the events which have made it impossible for some of our colleagues to attend this meeting.

The Subcommittee on Film, after much soul-searching, decided that it could not in good conscience participate, so there will be no film program this year. Video sessions have also been cancelled this year because of our growing dissatisfaction with the way the drug company which has supported the video program continues to insist in using this format as a medium for advertising.

Despite these difficulties, we believe that the program is a most exciting one. Although there were fewer submissions than last year, their quality more than made up for the loss in numbers. In fact, so many excellent proposals were submitted that we felt compelled to increase the number of symposia we had originally planned to present. In addition, three new formats have been added to the program: the Scientific Debates, the Discussion Groups, and the New Research Poster Sessions. And the New Research format has been reorganized so that we now have one session on psychosocial research and three on biological research.

As in the past, we would like to hear your opinions about the program during the meeting; our office is located in the Cambridge Room at the New Orleans Hilton Hotel. We are particularly interested in your response to the new formats. Our ability to improve the program each year depends largely on the assistance you provide through the evaluation questionnaires and your personal comments and letters.

The Journal does not hold first refusal rights for papers presented at regular sessions, new research sessions, morning workshops or evening panels; however, authors may submit them for publication if they wish.

It is the policy of the *Journal* to publish only original material that has not been published elsewhere in any form and that is not being considered for publication elsewhere.

TO PARTICIPATE IN THE 1982 ANNUAL MEETING

To present a scientific paper, request a symposium, course, issue workshop, evening panel, video, or film at the 1982 APA Annual Meeting in Toronto, Canada, May 15-21, 1982, obtain a **Form for Proposed Contributions** in the publications display of the Membership Resource Center (South Hall, Rivergate Convention Center). The 1982 theme is: Science in the Service of the Ill. This form was mailed to the entire membership in May.

The form contains complete instructions. However, PLEASE NOTE NOW that all proposals for the 1982 meeting must be in the Office of the Chairperson of the Scientific Program Committee by August 14, 1981. Otherwise they cannot and will not be processed for the Committee's consideration. Also, the full text and abstract must accompany the proposed paper submission.

CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT

The official annual meeting program, with a few exceptions, meets the criteria for continuing medical education Category I credit. One hour of credit may be claimed for each hour of participation. As an organization accredited for continuing medical education activities, the American Psychiatric Association certifies that the continuing medical education activities designated Category I meet the criteria for Category I for the Physician's Recognition Award of the American Medical Association. Continuing medical education sessions are open to all meeting registrants.

All program activities are designated either Category I or Category II; these include courses, symposia, paper sessions, special lectures, panels, and issue workshops. Three two-day courses on Saturday, May 9, and Sunday, May 10, nine courses, and seven symposia on Sunday, May 10, may also be taken for additional Category I credit. Half-day courses on Monday, Wednesday, and one Thursday, will be held from 2 P.M. to 6 P.M. and on Tuesday and Wednesday from 8 A.M. to 12 Noon. Full-day courses will be offered on Sunday from 9 A.M. to 5 P.M. and on Wednesday, and Thursday from 10:15 A.M. to 5:15 P.M. Three day-and-a-half courses will be offered Thursday 10:15 A.M. to 5:15 P.M. and Friday 8 A.M. to 12 noon. All full-day courses have a 1-hour break for lunch.

TAPE RECORDING POLICY

Members and guests at the Annual Meeting and new reporters are welcome to carry their own small tape recorders to any program session they wish. Larger professional tape recorders, however, will not be admitted to any sessions other than those carried by personnel representing the professional taping firm, namely Audio Digest Foundation of Los Angeles, California. APA has arranged with this firm to tape selected continuing education courses, and symposia. Cassette recordings of these will be made available to all interested persons for continuing education purposes at a later date. The badges of personnel representing this firm will clearly identify them.

SELECTED AUDIO TAPES AVAILABLE

On a pilot basis this year, audio tapes of selected special lectures will be available within hours of the presentation. Order forms and a list of all tapes will be available in those rooms where the lectures are being taped, and in the registration area.

Orders will be taken at the special desk in the registration area at Rivergate. All tapes delivered at the meeting must be paid for by cash or check.

MEMBERSHIP RESOURCE CENTER

All of APA's services to members will be centrally located in the South Hall of the Rivergate Convention Center. At the APA Membership Resource Center, open during all registration hours, registrants may browse through APA publications, listen to audio cassettes, and discuss insurance and retirement needs with staff of the APA Office of Member Benefits and companies that underwrite APA plans. Other services include the APA Office of Education, with areas for Continuing Education and DSM-III, the APA Membership Division with a terminal for members to access their records, the APA Library demonstrating its capabilities for MEDLINE and other automated data bases, a display featuring new APA Headquarters, and an area to view AMA's CME Video Clinics, which are indepth study courss on medical tapes.



HYPOTHALAMIC HORMONES AND THEIR APPLICATION IN MEDICAL PRACTICE

Andrew V. Schally, M.D.

In 1955, Dr. Schally jointly achieved the first experimental demonstration of a hypothalamic hormone, corticotropin-releasing factor (CRF). Subsequently, he and his collaborators first succeeded in isolating, sequencing, and synthesizing porcine thyrotropin-releasing hormone (TRH), and then luteinizing hormone-releasing hormone (LH-RH). He has done fundamental clinical and physiological research on these hormones and others. In 1977, he was awarded the Nobel Prize in medicine and physiology.

Dr. Schally, a native of Poland, is a naturalized American citizen. He is Professor of Medicine at Tulane University and Chief of the Endocrine and Polypeptide Laboratory of the New Orleans V.A. Hospital. His bibliography includes some 1200 contributions to the literature and he has received many international awards.

The applicability of four conceptual models (medical, social-social breakdown, developmental, adaptational) will be discussed in relation to each phase. Interventions will be presented as specific, timely, goal-oriented psychotherapeutic and rehabilitation tasks rather than as broad therapy modalities. Doris A. Howell, M.D., Chairperson, Department of Community Medicine, and Professor of Pediatrics, University of California, La Jolla, CA

Dr. Howell was Chairperson of Pediatrics at the Medical College of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, from 1963 to 1973. She is a well-known educator in the problems of dying children and their families, and was one of the founding physicians of *Ars Moriendi*, an organization founded to promote the formal teaching of death and dying to medical students.

Dr. Howell was instrumental in the development of a children's hospice in Philadelphia called *Butterfly Hill*, and has been prominent in the hospice movement nationally.

Dr. Howell is a regular speaker to health and lay groups in the greater Philadelphia community, and is an active participant in maternal and child health, and public health groups at both the local and state levels.

Her basic interest remains the education of tomorrow's physicians.

PCP in blood was correlated with a variety of psychiatric symptoms and signs not previously linked to PCP intoxication. Psychiatric patients intoxicated with PCP manifested at least one symptom or sign of toxic psychosis. Methods for diagnosis and treatment of inpatients and outpatients with various PCP intoxication syndromes will be taught. Fee \$40.

THE UNCONSCIOUS IN THE USSR: THE MEANING OF TBILISI

In October, 1979 an International Symposium was held in Tbilisi, USSR, on "The Problem of Unconscious Mental Activity." This conference was the outgrowth of the work of the Georgian Academy of Science and the Tbilisi University in collaboration with French psychiatrist Léon Chertok, M.D. Several years of work and planning went into the conference and 3 volumes of scientific papers were published in advance of the symposium and the 4th volume is in progress. The theory of "set" or ustanovka developed by D.N. Uznadze (1886-1950) provided a scientific bridge between Soviet scientific traditions and psychology, and Freudian or psychoanalytic conceptions of the unconscious. Many aspects of the problem of the unconscious were explored at the symposium, which was attended by large numbers of Western and Eastern European psychologists and psychiatrists.

The Symposium was an important event in the development of Soviet psychology and the scientific relations between the Soviet Union and Western schools of psychology. There has been a desire expressed on all sides to continue the exchange of ideas initiated in Tbilisi, and this forum was developed to further that purpose. We will be joined by Professor A.E. Sherozia, one of the Georgian architects of the conference. The forum will include the following presentations by the American participants: 1) an overview of the conference and its background; 2) a discussion of the emotional climate surrounding the symposium; 3) a history of psychoanalysis in the USSR; 4) a presentation on the Uznadze school and its significance for Soviet psychology and Western concepts; 5) a discussion of Soviet and Western approaches to the understanding of the unconscious.

THERAPY AND THEORY

Hilde Bruch, M.D.

Hilde Bruch graduated from the University of Freiburg, Germany in 1928 with an M.D. degree. She trained in physiology at the University of Kiel and in pediatrics in Leipzig. She left Germany in 1933 and came to the United States in 1934 after one year in London. She began her studies of childhood obesity while working at the Babies Hospital in New York. This work led to her seeking psychiatric training at Johns Hopkins Hospital and psychoanalytic training at the Baltimore-D.C. Psychoanalytic Institute. After her return to New York she practiced psychoanalysis until 1964 and worked as Psychotherapeutic Supervisor at the New York State Psychiatric Institute. She continued to be interested in obesity and became involved in the study of anorexia nervosa. In 1964 she moved to Houston as Professor of Psychiatry at Baylor College of Medicine, where she still works as Professor Emeritus. She has published more than 200 papers in scientific and professional journals, and six books. of which Eating Disorders (1973), Learning Psychotherapy (1974), and The Golden Cage: The Enigma of Anorexia Nervosa (1978) are the most recent.

The development of clonidine treatment for the opiate withdrawal syndrome rests on several lines of basic research and illustrates rational pharmacotherapeutics, simultaneously providing a new treatment, a possible mechanism of action, and a new understanding of the nature of the disorder. Clonidine's development also illustrates the interplay between and integration of a number of areas of current research which can provide psychiatrists with exposure to techniques and methods being used to develop tomorrow's psychopharmacology. Basic research studies in neuroanatomy, neuropharmacology, and neurophysiology will reveal actions of opiates and clonidine from the molecular-biochemical level to the behavior of intact nonhuman primates. The speakers will describe where opiates, norepinephrine (NE), and clonidine act in the brain, the effects of activation of the locus coeruleus (LC) in higher primates, description of the opiate withdrawal syndrome and the first demonstration of its suppression by clonidine, and evidence for noradrenergic mediation of opiate withdrawal syndrome in humans using a gas-chromatography-mass spectroscopy technique to measure the NE metabolite, MHPG, in plasma.

This symposium uses the development of a new clinical treatment for opiate addiction to describe current basic research techniques and neuropharmacological strategies which are also being applied to the study of anxiety, Tourette's syndrome, depression and schizophrenia. The presentations should also increase understanding of brain endorphin and norepinephrine systems in emotion and behavior.

Dr. Ebert was born in Minneapolis, Minnesota in 1914. He received both baccalaureate and medical degrees from the University of Chicago. A Rhodes Scholarship provided the opportunity to obtain a Doctor of Philosophy degree at Oxford University in England for work done in experimental pathology with Professor Florey, who subsequently received the Nobel Prize for the development of penicillin. Dr. Ebert received his training in Internal Medicine on the Harvard services at the Boston City Hospital. After serving in the Navy during World War II, he returned to the University of Chicago to work in the

Department of Medicine. In 1956 he became Professor and Head of the Department of Medicine at Western Reserve. In 1964 he was appointed Jackson Professor of Clinical Medicine at Harvard and Head of the Department of Medicine at the Massachusetts General Hospital. A year later he was appointed Dean of the Harvard Medical School, a position which he held for 12 years. In 1978 he become President of the Milbank Memorial Fund.
